- *Not supporting or favoring either side in a war, dispute, or contest.*
- *Not supporting or helping either side in a conflict, disagreement, etc.; impartial.*
- *Having no net electric charge.*
- *Possessing no distinctive quality or characteristics.*
- *Belonging to an impartial group or state.*
- *Lacking distinguishing quality or characteristics.*
- *Of or denoting a pale grey, cream, or beige colour.*
- *Having only a limited ability to react chemically; chemically inactive.*
- *Having no personal preference.*
- *Having no hue.*
- *Neither acid nor alkaline; having a pH of about 7.*
- *Having neither a positive nor negative electrical charge.*

- *Having no strongly marked or positive characteristics or features.*

achromatic	Relating to, using, or denoting lenses that transmit light without separating it into constituent colours. <i>The achromatic gloom.</i>
<u>anodyne</u>	Not likely to cause offence or disagreement and somewhat dull. <i>The anodyne properties of certain drugs.</i>
<u>bland</u>	Lacking strong features or characteristics and therefore uninteresting. <i>A bland little drama.</i>
clinical	Relating to the observation and treatment of actual patients rather than theoretical or laboratory studies. <i>He spoke in the clipped clinical monotones typical of police testimony.</i>
commonplace	Not interesting or original; trite. <i>Commonplace everyday activities.</i>

detached	Not fixed in position. <i>She may be detached or even unfeeling but at least she is not hypocritically effusive.</i>
disinterested	Having or feeling no interest in something; uninterested. <i>Her father was so disinterested in her progress that he only visited the school once.</i>
dispassionate	Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice. <i>She dealt with life's disasters in a calm dispassionate way.</i>
electroneutral	Having no net electric charge.
equitable	Fair to all parties as dictated by reason and conscience. <i>The equitable distribution of resources.</i>
<u>everyday</u>	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>Everyday chores like shopping and housework.</i>
fair	Lacking exceptional quality or ability. <i>Today will be fair and warm.</i>
fair-minded	Of a person; just and impartial; not prejudiced.
impartial	Treating all rivals or disputants equally. <i>The cold neutrality of an impartial judge.</i>
<u>impersonal</u>	(of a verb) used only with a formal subject (in English usually it) and expressing an action not attributable to a definite subject (as in it is snowing). <i>An impersonal corporation.</i>
indifferent	Not good; fairly bad. <i>What others think is altogether indifferent to him.</i>
<u>inert</u>	Lacking vigour. <i>She lay inert in her bed.</i>
inoffensive	Not causing anger or annoyance. <i>A shy inoffensive and sensitive girl.</i>
objective	(of a person or their judgement) not influenced by personal feelings or opinions in considering and representing facts. <i>Objective art.</i>
open-minded	Ready to entertain new ideas.
ordinary	Not exceptional in any way especially in quality or ability or size or degree. <i>An ordinary day.</i>

pale	(of a person or their complexion) having less colour than usual, typically as a result of shock, fear, or ill health. <i>The late afternoon light coming through the el tracks fell in pale oblongs on the street.</i>
pastel	Delicate and pale in color. <i>Pastel pink.</i>
removed	(with reference to cousins) separated in relationship by a particular number of steps of descent. <i>A cousin once removed.</i>
run-of-the-mill	Not special in any way.
unaffiliated	Not affiliated. <i>Unaffiliated one day events.</i>
unaligned	Not placed or arranged in a straight line, in parallel, or in correct relative positions. <i>Unaligned diagonals.</i>
unallied	Not allied; having no allies.
unbiased	Without bias. <i>They give clear unbiased advice.</i>
unemotional	Unsusceptible to or destitute of or showing no emotion. <i>A flat unemotional voice.</i>
unexceptionable	Completely acceptable; not open to exception or reproach. <i>A judge's ethics should be unexceptionable.</i>
uninvolved	Showing lack of emotional involvement. <i>Convicted killers in documentaries sound uninvolved and mechanical.</i>
unobjectionable	Free from objectionable elements; fit for all observers. <i>The bail conditions were unobjectionable as far as he was concerned.</i>
unprejudiced	Free from undue bias or preconceived opinions. <i>An unprejudiced reading of the New Testament.</i>
unremarkable	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>An unremarkable house.</i>

impartial	Showing lack of favoritism. <i>The impartial eye of a scientist.</i>
impartiality	An inclination to weigh both views or opinions equally. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure impartiality in the judging process.</i>
impersonal	(of a place or organization) featureless and anonymous. <i>An impersonal tower block.</i>
interim	An interim dividend profit etc. <i>In the interim I'll just keep my fingers crossed.</i>
intermediate	An intermediate thing. <i>A pathway leading to the formation of reactive intermediates.</i>

level	Become level or even. <i>You can easily take a character to level 20 in less than 15 hours and finish the campaign.</i>
median	The median value of a range of values. <i>The median duration of this treatment was four months.</i>
mediocre	Of only average quality; not very good. <i>The caliber of the students has gone from mediocre to above average.</i>
<u>middle</u>	In cricket tennis etc strike the ball with the middle of the bat racket or club. <i>Rain during the middle of April.</i>
middlebrow	A middlebrow person. <i>Middlebrow fiction.</i>
midst	The location of something surrounded by other things. <i>He left his flat in the midst of a rainstorm.</i>
midway	Equally distant from the extremes. <i>A midway path is chosen between the diverging aspirations of the two factions.</i>
moderate	A person who holds moderate views especially in politics. <i>Moderate success.</i>
<u>modest</u>	Marked by simplicity; having a humble opinion of yourself. <i>Modest dress means that hemlines must be below the knee.</i>
neuter	The neuter gender. <i>A neutered tomcat.</i>
neutrality	Absence of decided views, expression, or strong feeling. <i>The structure has overall electrical neutrality.</i>
<u>objectivity</u>	Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices. <i>The piece lacked any objectivity.</i>
unbiased	Showing no prejudice for or against something; impartial. <i>They give clear unbiased advice.</i>
unprejudiced	Not having or showing a dislike or distrust based on fixed or preconceived ideas. <i>An unprejudiced reading of the New Testament.</i>
