- Not supporting or favoring either side in a war, dispute, or contest.
- Not supporting or helping either side in a conflict, disagreement, etc.; impartial.
- Having no net electric charge.
- Possessing no distinctive quality or characteristics.
- Belonging to an impartial group or state.
- Lacking distinguishing quality or characteristics.
- Of or denoting a pale grey, cream, or beige colour.
- Having only a limited ability to react chemically; chemically inactive.
- Having no personal preference.
- Having no hue.
- Neither acid nor alkaline; having a pH of about 7.
- Having neither a positive nor negative electrical charge.


