- *Oppose and mitigate the effects of by contrary actions.*
- *Make incapable of military action.*
- *Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of.*
- *Make politically neutral and thus inoffensive.*
- *Disarm (a bomb or similar weapon).*
- *Make chemically neutral.*
- *Make (an acidic or alkaline substance) chemically neutral.*
- *(in military or espionage contexts) used euphemistically to refer to killing or destruction.*
- *Make (something) ineffective by applying an opposite force or effect.*

<b>balance out</b>	Bring into balance or equilibrium.
<b>butcher</b>	Ruin (something) deliberately or through incompetence. <i>The film was <b>butchered</b> by the studio that released it.</i>

<b>counterpoise</b>	Bring into contrast. <i>They make a delightful couple his gentle intellectuality <b>counterpoised</b> by her firm practicality.</i>
<b>countervail</b>	Offset the effect of (something) by countering it with something of equal force. <i>Stereotypes are <b>countervailed</b> by more realistic assessments.</i>
<b>cut to pieces</b>	Intentionally fail to attend.
<b><u>dispatch</u></b>	Send away towards a designated goal. <i>He <b>dispatched</b> messages back to base.</i>
<b>do in</b>	Get (something) done.
<b>do to death</b>	Give rise to; cause to happen or occur, not always intentionally.
<b>eliminate</b>	Eliminate from the body. <i>A policy that would <b>eliminate</b> inflation.</i>
<b>execute</b>	Kill as a means of socially sanctioned punishment. <i>Police <b>executed</b> a search warrant.</i>
<b>knock off</b>	Deliver a sharp blow or push.
<b>liquidate</b>	Kill (someone), typically by violent means. <i>I had to <b>liquidate</b> my holdings to pay off my ex husband.</i>
<b>make up for</b>	Reach in time.
<b>massacre</b>	Inflict a heavy defeat on (a sporting opponent). <i>The Hutus <b>massacred</b> the Tutsis in Rwanda.</i>
<b>mow down</b>	Make a sad face and thrust out one's lower lip.

<b>negate</b>	Be in contradiction with. <i>Alcohol <b>negates</b> the effects of the drug.</i>
<b>neutralise</b>	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of.
<b>nullify</b>	Make of no use or value; cancel out. <i>Judges were unwilling to <b>nullify</b> government decisions.</i>
<b>offset</b>	Create an offset in. <i>His unfortunate appearance was <b>offset</b> by a compelling personality.</i>
<b>put to death</b>	Make an investment.
<b>slaughter</b>	Kill (people or animals) in a cruel or violent way, typically in large numbers. <i>They <b>slaughtered</b> their only goat to survive the winter.</i>
<b>waste</b>	Run off as waste. <i><b>Waste</b> a joke on an unappreciative audience.</i>
<b>wipe out</b>	Rub with a circular motion.

<b>abnegation</b>	Self-denial. <i>Abnegation</i> of political power.
<b>abolish</b>	Formally put an end to (a system, practice, or institution). <i>Slavery was <b>abolished</b> in the mid 19th century in America and in Russia.</i>
<b>abrogate</b>	Repeal or do away with (a law, right, or formal agreement). <i>A proposal to <b>abrogate</b> temporarily the right to strike.</i>
<b>abrogation</b>	The repeal or abolition of a law, right, or agreement.

<b><u>annihilate</u></b>	Defeat utterly. <i>The stronger force <b>annihilated</b> its opponent virtually without loss.</i>
<b>annul</b>	Declare invalid (an official agreement, decision, or result). <i>The elections were <b>annulled</b> by the general amid renewed protests.</i>
<b><u>belie</u></b>	Fail to fulfil or justify (a claim or expectation). <i>The quality of the music seems to <b>belie</b> the criticism.</i>
<b><u>cancel</u></b>	A notation cancelling a previous sharp or flat. <i>The electric fields may <b>cancel</b> each other out.</i>
<b><u>contradict</u></b>	Be in contradiction with. <i>Within five minutes he had <b>contradicted</b> himself twice.</i>
<b><u>counterbalance</u></b>	A compensating equivalent. <i>The trolley used a <b>counterbalance</b> and leverage action to reduce the effort of lifting loads.</i>
<b><u>default</u></b>	Declare a party to have defaulted and give judgement against that party. <i>All my life envy has been my <b>default</b> emotion.</i>
<b><u>delete</u></b>	(of a section of genetic code, or its product) be lost or excised from a nucleic acid or protein sequence. <i>The passage was <b>deleted</b>.</i>
<b><u>deny</u></b>	Deny formally an allegation of fact by the opposing party in a legal suit. <i>The servants are ordered to <b>deny</b> him.</i>
<b><u>disavow</u></b>	Deny any responsibility or support for. <i>Her husband <b>disavowed</b> her after 30 years of marriage and six children.</i>
<b><u>exterminate</u></b>	Kill (a pest). <i>Hitler wanted to <b>exterminate</b> the Jews Gypsies Communists and homosexuals of Europe.</i>
<b><u>invalidate</u></b>	Declare invalid. <i>A technical flaw in her papers <b>invalidated</b> her nomination.</i>
<b>misrepresent</b>	Tamper, with the purpose of deception. <i>You are <b>misrepresenting</b> the views of the government.</i>
<b>negate</b>	Make (a clause, sentence, or proposition) negative in meaning. <i>This action will <b>negate</b> the effect of my efforts.</i>
<b><u>nullify</u></b>	Make legally null and void; invalidate. <i>Judges were unwilling to <b>nullify</b> government decisions.</i>
<b><u>offset</u></b>	Create an offset in. <i>Donations to charities can be <b>offset</b> against tax.</i>
<b><u>override</u></b>	Be more important than. <i>The flash has to have a manual <b>override</b> to be useful.</i>

<b>reject</b>	Reject with contempt. <i>I <b>reject</b> the idea of starting a war.</i>
<b>repeal</b>	Revoke or annul (a law or act of parliament). <i>The House voted in favour of <b>repeal</b>.</i>
<b>repudiation</b>	The exposure of falseness or pretensions. <i>A <b>repudiation</b> of left wing political ideas.</i>
<b>rescind</b>	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually <b>rescinded</b> the directive.</i>
<b>rescission</b>	The revocation, cancellation, or repeal of a law, order, or agreement. <i>The plaintiff agreed to the <b>rescission</b> of the agreement.</i>
<b>revocable</b>	Capable of being revoked or annulled. <i>A <b>revocable</b> order.</i>
<a href="#"><u>revoke</u></a>	Fail to follow suit when able and required to do so. <i>He <b>revoked</b> the ban on smoking.</i>
<b>terminate</b>	Terminate the employment or discharge from an office or position. <i>The train will <b>terminate</b> at Stratford.</i>
<a href="#"><u>veto</u></a>	A rejection by right of veto. <i>Neither state was given a <b>veto</b> over amendments to the Act.</i>
