- *Get rid of (someone who may be a threat) by killing.*
- *Oppose and mitigate the effects of by contrary actions.*
- *Make incapable of military action.*
- *Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of.*
- *Make politically neutral and thus inoffensive.*
- *Disarm (a bomb or similar weapon).*
- *Make chemically neutral.*
- *Make (an acidic or alkaline substance) chemically neutral.*
- *(in military or espionage contexts) used euphemistically to refer to killing or destruction.*
- *Make (something) ineffective by applying an opposite force or effect.*

assassinate	Murder; especially of socially prominent persons. <i>Anwar Sadat was assassinated because many people did not like his peace politics with Israel.</i>
balance	Bring into balance or equilibrium. <i>She has to balance work and her domestic duties.</i>
balance out	Bring into balance or equilibrium.
butcher	Ruin (something) deliberately or through incompetence. <i>The film was butchered by the studio that released it.</i>
compensate for	Make reparations or amends for.
counteract	Oppose or check by a counteraction. <i>This will counteract the foolish actions of my colleagues.</i>
<u>counterbalance</u>	(of a weight) balance (another weight). <i>The sitter's weight counterbalances the tilting pressure on the backrest.</i>
counterpoise	Bring into contrast. <i>They make a delightful couple his gentle intellectuality counterpoised by her firm practicality.</i>
countervail	Offset the effect of (something) by countering it with something of equal force. <i>Stereotypes are countervailed by more realistic assessments.</i>
cut to pieces	Intentionally fail to attend.
<u>dispatch</u>	Send away towards a designated goal. <i>He dispatched messages back to base.</i>
do in	Get (something) done.
do to death	Give rise to; cause to happen or occur, not always intentionally.
eliminate	Eliminate from the body. <i>A policy that would eliminate inflation.</i>
execute	Kill as a means of socially sanctioned punishment. <i>Police executed a search warrant.</i>
knock off	Deliver a sharp blow or push.
liquidate	Kill (someone), typically by violent means. <i>I had to liquidate my holdings to pay off my ex husband.</i>
make up for	Reach in time.
massacre	Inflict a heavy defeat on (a sporting opponent). <i>The Hutus massacred the Tutsis in Rwanda.</i>
mow down	Make a sad face and thrust out one's lower lip.

negate	Be in contradiction with. <i>Alcohol negates the effects of the drug.</i>
neutralise	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of.
nullify	Make of no use or value; cancel out. <i>Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.</i>
offset	Create an offset in. <i>His unfortunate appearance was offset by a compelling personality.</i>
put to death	Make an investment.
slaughter	Kill (people or animals) in a cruel or violent way, typically in large numbers. <i>They slaughtered their only goat to survive the winter.</i>
waste	Run off as waste. <i>Waste a joke on an unappreciative audience.</i>
wipe out	Rub with a circular motion.

abnegation	Self-denial. <i>Abnegation of political power.</i>
abolish	Formally put an end to (a system, practice, or institution). <i>Slavery was abolished in the mid 19th century in America and in Russia.</i>
abrogate	Repeal or do away with (a law, right, or formal agreement). <i>A proposal to abrogate temporarily the right to strike.</i>
abrogation	The repeal or abolition of a law, right, or agreement.

<u>annihilate</u>	Defeat utterly. <i>The stronger force annihilated its opponent virtually without loss.</i>
annul	Declare invalid (an official agreement, decision, or result). <i>The elections were annulled by the general amid renewed protests.</i>
<u>belie</u>	Fail to fulfil or justify (a claim or expectation). <i>The quality of the music seems to belie the criticism.</i>
<u>cancel</u>	A notation cancelling a previous sharp or flat. <i>The electric fields may cancel each other out.</i>
<u>contradict</u>	Be in contradiction with. <i>Within five minutes he had contradicted himself twice.</i>
<u>counterbalance</u>	A compensating equivalent. <i>The trolley used a counterbalance and leverage action to reduce the effort of lifting loads.</i>
<u>default</u>	Declare a party to have defaulted and give judgement against that party. <i>All my life envy has been my default emotion.</i>
<u>delete</u>	(of a section of genetic code, or its product) be lost or excised from a nucleic acid or protein sequence. <i>The passage was deleted.</i>
<u>deny</u>	Deny formally an allegation of fact by the opposing party in a legal suit. <i>The servants are ordered to deny him.</i>
<u>disavow</u>	Deny any responsibility or support for. <i>Her husband disavowed her after 30 years of marriage and six children.</i>
<u>exterminate</u>	Kill (a pest). <i>Hitler wanted to exterminate the Jews Gypsies Communists and homosexuals of Europe.</i>
<u>invalidate</u>	Declare invalid. <i>A technical flaw in her papers invalidated her nomination.</i>
misrepresent	Tamper, with the purpose of deception. <i>You are misrepresenting the views of the government.</i>
negate	Make (a clause, sentence, or proposition) negative in meaning. <i>This action will negate the effect of my efforts.</i>
<u>nullify</u>	Make legally null and void; invalidate. <i>Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.</i>
<u>offset</u>	Create an offset in. <i>Donations to charities can be offset against tax.</i>
<u>override</u>	Be more important than. <i>The flash has to have a manual override to be useful.</i>

reject	Reject with contempt. <i>I reject the idea of starting a war.</i>
repeal	Revoke or annul (a law or act of parliament). <i>The House voted in favour of repeal.</i>
repudiation	The exposure of falseness or pretensions. <i>A repudiation of left wing political ideas.</i>
rescind	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually rescinded the directive.</i>
rescission	The revocation, cancellation, or repeal of a law, order, or agreement. <i>The plaintiff agreed to the rescission of the agreement.</i>
revocable	Capable of being revoked or annulled. <i>A revocable order.</i>
<u>revoke</u>	Fail to follow suit when able and required to do so. <i>He revoked the ban on smoking.</i>
terminate	Terminate the employment or discharge from an office or position. <i>The train will terminate at Stratford.</i>
<u>veto</u>	A rejection by right of veto. <i>Neither state was given a veto over amendments to the Act.</i>
