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## Associations of "Next to" (30 Words)

<b>abut</b>	Touch or lean on. <i>A park <b>abutting</b> on an area of waste land.</i>
<b>accompanying</b>	Following or accompanying as a consequence. <i>The <b>accompanying</b> documentation.</i>
<b>adjacent</b>	Next to or adjoining something else. <i><b>Adjacent</b> rooms.</i>
<b>after</b>	At a later or future time afterwards. <i>Two hours <b>after</b> that.</i>
<b>afterthought</b>	Something that is thought of or added later. <i>The garage was an <b>afterthought</b>.</i>
<b>afterward</b>	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. <i>It didn't happen until <b>afterward</b>.</i>
<b>afterwards</b>	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. <i>The offender was arrested shortly <b>afterwards</b>.</i>
<b>alongside</b>	Side by side.
<b>contiguous</b>	Very close or connected in space or time. <i>The Southern Ocean is <b>contiguous</b> with the Atlantic.</i>
<b>ensuing</b>	Following immediately and as a result of what went before. <i>She lost track of one of her children during the <b>ensuing</b> chaos.</i>
<b>following</b>	Immediately following in time or order. <i>Tried to outrun the <b>following</b> footsteps.</i>
<b>future</b>	A verb tense that expresses actions or states in the future. <i>His <b>future</b> wife.</i>
<b>hereafter</b>	After death. <i>This court is in no way prejudging any such defence which may <b>hereafter</b> be raised.</i>

<b>incoming</b>	(of a communication) being received rather than sent. <i>Keep an account of your <b>incomings</b> and outgoings.</i>
<b>later</b>	At a time in the near future; soon or afterwards. <i>I ll see you <b>later</b>.</i>
<b>lateral</b>	Involving lateral thinking. <i>The plant takes up water through its <b>lateral</b> roots.</i>
<b>laterally</b>	In a way that involves lateral thinking. <i>Use slide steps to move <b>laterally</b>.</i>
<b>medial</b>	(of a speech sound) in the middle of a word. <i>A <b>medial</b> consonant.</i>
<b>posterior</b>	Coming after in time or order; later. <i>The <b>posterior</b> part of the gut.</i>
<b>posterity</b>	All future generations of people. <i>The victims names are recorded for <b>posterity</b>.</i>
<b>preliminary</b>	A preliminary round in a sporting competition. <i>A <b>preliminary</b> draft.</i>
<b>purlieu</b>	A tract on the border of a forest, especially one earlier included in it and still partly subject to forest laws. <i>The photogenic <b>purlieus</b> of Cambridge.</i>
<b>sequent</b>	In regular succession without gaps. <i>Some of the inferences are not <b>sequent</b> on the premises.</i>
<b>shortly</b>	In a curt, abrupt and discourteous manner. <i>To put it <b>shortly</b>.</i>
<b>subsequence</b>	Something that follows something else. <i>An affair which appeared in due <b>subsequence</b> in the newspapers.</i>
<b>subsequent</b>	Following in time or order. <i>The theory was developed <b>subsequent</b> to the earthquake of 1906.</i>
<b>subsequently</b>	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. <i>The work was accepted for inclusion in the Paris Salon of 1880 and was <b>subsequently</b> sold to an important collector.</i>
<b>successively</b>	In proper order or sequence. <i>Three letters of <b>successively</b> decreasing length.</i>
<b>superimpose</b>	Place or lay (one thing) over another, typically so that both are still evident. <i>Can you <b>superimpose</b> the two images.</i>
