## Night as a Noun

### Definitions of "Night" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “night” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The darkness of night.*
- *Roman goddess of night; daughter of Erebus; counterpart of Greek Nyx.*
- *The period spent sleeping.*
- *The time after sunset and before sunrise while it is dark outside.*
- *Nightfall.*
- *The period between afternoon and bedtime; an evening.*
- *The night as the interval between two days.*
- *A shortening of nightfall.*
- *The period from sunset to sunrise in each twenty-four hours.*
- *Darkness.*
- *A period of ignorance or backwardness or gloom.*
- *An evening characterized by a particular event or activity.*
- *The dark part of the diurnal cycle considered a time unit.*
- *The time between sunset and midnight.*



## Synonyms of "Night" as a noun (6 Words)

<b>dark</b>	A dark colour or shade especially in a painting. <i>I ll be home before <b>dark</b>.</i>
<b>darkness</b>	The partial or total absence of light. <i>His lectures dispelled the <b>darkness</b>.</i>
<b>dead of night</b>	People who are no longer living.
<b>hours of darkness</b>	Distance measured by the time taken to cover it.
<b>nighttime</b>	The time after sunset and before sunrise while it is dark outside.
<b>nox</b>	Roman goddess of night; daughter of Erebus; counterpart of Greek Nyx.

- *They worked from morning to night.*
- *The door is always locked at night.*
- *Three nights later he collapsed.*



## Associations of "Night" (30 Words)

<b>afternoon</b>	In the afternoon every afternoon. <i>I telephoned this <b>afternoon</b>.</i>
<b>bedtime</b>	The usual time when someone goes to bed. <i>It was well past her <b>bedtime</b>.</i>
<b>darken</b>	Tarnish or stain. <i>The abuse <b>darkened</b> the rest of their lives.</i>
<b>dawn</b>	An opening time period. <i>We got up before <b>dawn</b>.</i>
<b>day</b>	The part of a day spent working. <i>He was a successful pianist in his <b>day</b>.</i>
<b>daybreak</b>	The time in the morning when daylight first appears; dawn. <i>She set off at <b>daybreak</b>.</i>
<b>evening</b>	Prescribed by fashion as suitable for relatively formal social events held in the evening. <i>It was seven o'clock in the <b>evening</b>.</i>
<b>friday</b>	The sixth day of the week; the fifth working day.

<b>gloaming</b>	Twilight; dusk. <i>Hundreds of lights are already shimmering in the <b>gloaming</b>.</i>
<b>hour</b>	The distance travelled in one hour. <i>The clock in the sitting room struck the <b>hour</b>.</i>
<u><b>meditate</b></u>	Focus one's mind for a period of time, in silence or with the aid of chanting, for religious or spiritual purposes or as a method of relaxation. <i>He went off to <b>meditate</b> on the new idea.</i>
<b>meditative</b>	Deeply or seriously thoughtful. <i><b>Meditative</b> techniques.</i>
<u><b>midnight</b></u>	Twelve o'clock at night. <i>Young children should not be allowed to stay up until <b>midnight</b>.</i>
<u><b>morning</b></u>	Every morning. <i>The <b>morning</b> papers.</i>
<b>nightfall</b>	The time of day immediately following sunset. <i>We had to get back by <b>nightfall</b>.</i>
<b>nocturnal</b>	Belonging to or active during the night. <i><b>Nocturnal</b> animals are active at night.</i>
<b>nocturnally</b>	At night.
<b>noon</b>	Twelve o'clock in the day; midday. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>o'clock</b>	According to the clock.
<b>sunday</b>	United States evangelist (1862-1935).
<u><b>sunrise</b></u>	The daily event of the sun rising above the horizon. <i>An hour before <b>sunrise</b>.</i>
<b>sunset</b>	Subject (a programme, agency, regulation, etc.) to a legal provision under which it is terminated automatically at the end of a fixed period unless renewed by legislative action. <i>The tax cut will <b>sunset</b> after three years unless lawmakers extend it.</i>
<b>thursday</b>	The fifth day of the week; the fourth working day.
<u><b>tomorrow</b></u>	The future, especially the near future. <i>Everyone hopes for a better <b>tomorrow</b>.</i>
<b>tonight</b>	The present or immediately coming night. <i>Are you doing anything <b>tonight</b>.</i>
<b>tuesday</b>	The third day of the week; the second working day.
<u><b>twilight</b></u>	The period of the evening when twilight is visible between daylight and darkness. <i>In the <b>twilight</b> of the empire.</i>

- wake** Be awake be alert be there.  
*His voice **wakes** desire in others.*
- wednesday** The fourth day of the week; the third working day.
- yesterday** On the day before today.  
*The decision was the result of a meeting late **yesterday** afternoon.*
