Associations of "No avail meaning" (30 Words)

abnegation	Self-denial. <i>Abnegation of political power.</i>
apophasis	Mentioning something by saying it will not be mentioned.
controvert	Deny the truth of (something). <i>The views in the article have been controverted.</i>
deniable	Capable of being denied or contradicted. <i>The government did agree to play a limited and deniable role in the rebellion.</i>
<u>denial</u>	A defense mechanism that denies painful thoughts. <i>She shook her head in denial.</i>
<u>deny</u>	Deny formally an allegation of fact by the opposing party in a legal suit. <i>Both firms deny any responsibility for the tragedy.</i>
<u>disallow</u>	Refuse to declare valid. <i>He was offside and the goal was disallowed.</i>
<u>disavow</u>	Deny any responsibility or support for. <i>The union leaders resisted pressure to disavow picket line violence.</i>
disavowal	The denial of any responsibility or support for something; repudiation. <i>His disavowal of his previous writings.</i>
disclaim	Make a disclaimer about. <i>He disclaimed any responsibility.</i>
extradite	Hand over to the authorities of another country. <i>Brazil refused to extradite him to Britain.</i>
gainsay	Speak against or oppose (someone). <i>None could gainsay her.</i>
impugn	Dispute the truth, validity, or honesty of (a statement or motive); call into question. <i>The father does not impugn her capacity as a good mother.</i>

inadmissible	(especially of evidence in court) not accepted as valid. <i>Inadmissible evidence.</i>
interdict	A court order prohibiting a party from doing a certain activity. <i>A papal interdict.</i>
negate	Prove negative; show to be false. <i>This action will negate the effect of my efforts.</i>
nullify	Declare invalid. <i>Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.</i>
objection	The speech act of objecting. <i>They have raised no objections to the latest plans.</i>
ostracism	Exclusion from a society or group. <i>The family suffered social ostracism.</i>
perjure	Knowingly tell an untruth in a legal court and render oneself guilty of perjury. <i>She admitted that she had perjured herself.</i>
rebut	Claim or prove that (evidence or an accusation) is false. <i>He had to rebut charges of acting for the convenience of his political friends.</i>
refusal	An expression of unwillingness to accept or grant an offer or request. <i>An appeal against the refusal of a licence.</i>
refuse	Refuse to accept. <i>He was severely beaten when he refused.</i>
refutable	Able to be refuted.
refutation	The action of proving a statement or theory to be wrong or false. <i>He fails to give a clear refutation of the argument.</i>
refute	Prove (a statement or theory) to be wrong or false; disprove. <i>The speaker refuted his opponent's arguments.</i>
reject	Reject with contempt. <i>She didn't want him to feel he had been rejected after his sister was born.</i>
rejection	The state of being rejected. <i>His proposals were met with rejection.</i>
repudiate	Reject as untrue, unfounded, or unjust. <i>The woman repudiated the divorce settlement.</i>
repudiation	Rejecting or disowning or disclaiming as invalid. <i>Congressional repudiation of the treaty that the President had negotiated.</i>
