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Associations of "No matter" (30 Words)

abnegation	The denial and rejection of a doctrine or belief. <i>Abnegation of political power.</i>
apophasis	Mentioning something by saying it will not be mentioned.
<u>contradict</u>	Be in contradiction with. <i>The survey appears to contradict the industry s claims.</i>
controvert	Argue about (something). <i>The views in the article have been controverted.</i>
deniable	Capable of being denied or contradicted. <i>The government did agree to play a limited and deniable role in the rebellion.</i>
<u>denial</u>	Refusal to acknowledge an unacceptable truth or emotion or to admit it into consciousness, used as a defence mechanism. <i>The denial of insurance to people with certain medical conditions.</i>
<u>deny</u>	Deny oneself something restrain especially from indulging in some pleasure. <i>The servants are ordered to deny him.</i>
<u>disallow</u>	Command against. <i>He was offside and the goal was disallowed.</i>
<u>disavow</u>	Refuse to acknowledge; disclaim knowledge of; responsibility for, or association with. <i>Her husband disavowed her after 30 years of marriage and six children.</i>
disavowal	The denial of any responsibility or support for something; repudiation. <i>His disavowal of his previous writings.</i>
disclaim	Make a disclaimer about. <i>He disclaimed any responsibility.</i>
gainsay	Take exception to. <i>None could gainsay her.</i>

impugn	Dispute the truth, validity, or honesty of (a statement or motive); call into question. <i>The father does not impugn her capacity as a good mother.</i>
inadmissible	Not deserving to be admitted. <i>Inadmissible evidence.</i>
interdict	Impede (an enemy force), especially by bombing lines of communication or supply. <i>Society will never interdict sex.</i>
negate	Prove negative; show to be false. <i>Alcohol negates the effects of the drug.</i>
nullify	Show to be invalid. <i>Insulin can block the release of the hormone and thereby nullify the effects of training.</i>
objection	The action of challenging or disagreeing with something. <i>His view is open to objection.</i>
perjure	Knowingly tell an untruth in a legal court and render oneself guilty of perjury. <i>She admitted that she had perjured herself.</i>
rebut	Prove to be false or incorrect. <i>He had to rebut charges of acting for the convenience of his political friends.</i>
rebuttal	An instance of rebutting evidence or an accusation.
refusal	A message refusing to accept something that is offered. <i>An appeal against the refusal of a licence.</i>
refuse	Refuse to accept. <i>Again the horse refused his nostrils flaring with fear.</i>
refutable	Able to be refuted.
refutation	The speech act of answering an attack on your assertions. <i>His refutation of the charges was short and persuasive.</i>
refute	Prove (a statement or theory) to be wrong or false; disprove. <i>These claims have not been convincingly refuted.</i>
reject	The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality. <i>Black people were often rejected by country clubs.</i>
rejection	An immunological response that refuses to accept substances or organisms that are recognized as foreign. <i>His proposals were met with rejection.</i>

repudiate Refuse to fulfil or discharge (an agreement, obligation, or debt).
*Breach of a condition gives the other party the right to **repudiate** a contract.*

repudiation Refusal to acknowledge or pay a debt or honor a contract (especially by public authorities).
*The **repudiation** of the debt by the city.*
