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Associations of "No matter what" (30 Words)

abnegation	Self-denial. <i>Abnegation of the Holy Trinity.</i>
apophasis	Mentioning something by saying it will not be mentioned.
<u>contradict</u>	Be in contradiction with. <i>He did not contradict her but just said nothing.</i>
controvert	Deny the truth of (something). <i>Subsequent work from the same laboratory controverted these results.</i>
deniable	Capable of being denied or contradicted. <i>The government did agree to play a limited and deniable role in the rebellion.</i>
<u>denial</u>	Refusal to acknowledge an unacceptable truth or emotion or to admit it into consciousness, used as a defence mechanism. <i>The denial of insurance to people with certain medical conditions.</i>
<u>deny</u>	Deny oneself something restrain especially from indulging in some pleasure. <i>Both firms deny any responsibility for the tragedy.</i>
<u>disallow</u>	Refuse to declare valid. <i>He was offside and the goal was disallowed.</i>
<u>disavow</u>	Deny any responsibility or support for. <i>The union leaders resisted pressure to disavow picket line violence.</i>
disavowal	The denial of any responsibility or support for something; repudiation. <i>His disavowal of his previous writings.</i>
disclaim	Make a disclaimer about. <i>The school disclaimed any responsibility for his death.</i>
gainsay	Take exception to. <i>None could gainsay her.</i>

impugn	Dispute the truth, validity, or honesty of (a statement or motive); call into question. <i>The father does not impugn her capacity as a good mother.</i>
inadmissible	(especially of evidence in court) not accepted as valid. <i>Inadmissible evidence.</i>
interdict	An authoritative prohibition. <i>Army efforts to interdict enemy supply shipments.</i>
negate	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of. <i>Alcohol negates the effects of the drug.</i>
nullify	Show to be invalid. <i>Insulin can block the release of the hormone and thereby nullify the effects of training.</i>
objection	An expression or feeling of disapproval or opposition; a reason for disagreeing. <i>His view is open to objection.</i>
perjure	Wilfully tell an untruth or make a misrepresentation under oath; commit perjury. <i>She admitted that she had perjured herself.</i>
rebut	Prove to be false or incorrect. <i>But he their sharp assault right boldly did rebut.</i>
rebuttal	An instance of rebutting evidence or an accusation.
refusal	A message refusing to accept something that is offered. <i>An appeal against the refusal of a licence.</i>
refuse	Refuse to accept. <i>The old lady was refused admission to four hospitals.</i>
refutable	Able to be refuted.
refutation	The action of proving a statement or theory to be wrong or false. <i>He fails to give a clear refutation of the argument.</i>
refute	Prove to be false or incorrect. <i>The speaker refuted his opponent s arguments.</i>
reject	The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality. <i>Black people were often rejected by country clubs.</i>
rejection	The act of rejecting something. <i>Rejection of the transplanted liver.</i>
repudiate	(in the past or in non-Christian religions) disown or divorce (one's wife). <i>The minister repudiated allegations of human rights abuses.</i>

repudiation Rejecting or disowning or disclaiming as invalid.
*The **repudiation** of the debt by the city.*
