### Definitions of "Noisy" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “noisy” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Stridently seeking to attract attention to one's views.*
- *Full of or characterized by noise.*
- *Making or given to making a lot of noise.*
- *Full of or characterized by loud and nonmusical sounds.*
- *Attracting attention by showiness or bright colors.*
- *Accompanied by or introducing random fluctuations that obscure the real signal or data.*



## Synonyms of "Noisy" as an adjective (28 Words)

<b>bawling</b>	Weeping or crying noisily. <i><b>Bawling</b> babies.</i>
<b>blaring</b>	Unpleasantly loud and penetrating. <i>The <b>blaring</b> noise of trumpets.</i>
<b>blasting</b>	Unpleasantly loud and penetrating. <i>The <b>blasting</b> force of the wind blowing sharp needles of sleet in our faces.</i>
<b>boisterous</b>	Violently agitated and turbulent- Ezra Pound. <i>A group of <b>boisterous</b> lads.</i>
<b>booming</b>	(of a sound or voice) loud, deep, and resonant. <i>A <b>booming</b> laugh.</i>
<b>brash</b>	Offensively bold. <i>The cafe was a <b>brash</b> new building.</i>
<b>brassy</b>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i>Her <b>brassy</b> audacious exterior.</i>
<b>cacophonous</b>	Having an unpleasant sound. <i>The <b>cacophonous</b> sound of slot machines.</i>

<b>clamorous</b>	Expressing or characterized by vehement protests or demands. <i>The <b>clamorous</b> radical wing of the party.</i>
<b>deafening</b>	(of a noise) so loud as to make it impossible to hear anything else. <i>The music reached a <b>deafening</b> crescendo.</i>
<b>fortissimo</b>	Chiefly a direction or description in music. <i>The movement ends with a <b>fortissimo</b> coda.</i>
<b>harsh</b>	Unpleasantly stern. <i><b>Harsh</b> guttural shouts.</i>
<b>loud</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i><b>Loud</b> thunder.</i>
<b>obstreperous</b>	Noisily and stubbornly defiant. <i>The boy is cocky and <b>obstreperous</b>.</i>
<b>piercing</b>	Having or demonstrating ability to recognize or draw fine distinctions. <i>The <b>piercing</b> cold of winter.</i>
<b>rackety</b>	Uncontrollably noisy.
<b>raucous</b>	Unpleasantly loud and harsh. <i>A <b>raucous</b> party.</i>
<b>resounding</b>	Unmistakable; emphatic. <i>The evening was a <b>resounding</b> success.</i>
<b>reverberating</b>	Characterized by resonance.
<b>rowdy</b>	Noisy and disorderly. <i><b>Rowdy</b> teenagers.</i>
<b>screaming</b>	So extremely intense as to evoke screams. <i>A harassed parent with a <b>screaming</b> child.</i>
<b>shrieking</b>	Making a high-pitched piercing cry or sound. <i>A <b>shrieking</b> ambulance.</i>
<b>strident</b>	Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry. <i>Public pronouncements on the crisis became less <b>strident</b>.</i>
<b>talkative</b>	Friendly and open and willing to talk. <i>The <b>talkative</b> driver hadn't stopped chatting.</i>
<b>thunderous</b>	Extremely ominous. <i><b>Thunderous</b> applause.</i>
<b>tumultuous</b>	Characterized by unrest or disorder or insubordination. <i>A <b>tumultuous</b> personal life.</i>
<b>turbulent</b>	Characterized by unrest or disorder or insubordination. <i>A <b>turbulent</b> and unruly childhood.</i>

**vociferous**

Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry.  
A **vociferous** mob.

### **amplifier**

A device consisting of an amplifier combined with a loudspeaker and used to increase the volume of the sound produced by electric guitars and other musical instruments.



<b>brassy</b>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. <i>Her <b>brassy</b> audacious exterior.</i>
<b>brouhaha</b>	Loud confused noise from many sources. <i>The <b>brouhaha</b> over those infamous commercials.</i>
<b>cackle</b>	A loud laugh suggestive of a hen s cackle. <i>The women <b>cackled</b> when they saw the movie star step out of the limousine.</i>
<b>cacophonous</b>	Having an unpleasant sound- John McCarten. <i>The <b>cacophonous</b> sound of slot machines.</i>
<b>cacophony</b>	A harsh discordant mixture of sounds. <i>A <b>cacophony</b> of deafening alarm bells.</i>
<b>clamorous</b>	Expressing or characterized by vehement protests or demands. <i>A jostling <b>clamorous</b> mob.</i>
<b>clatter</b>	Fall or move with a clatter. <i>Her coffee cup <b>clattered</b> in the saucer.</i>
<b><u>commotion</u></b>	Civil insurrection. <i>She was distracted by a <b>commotion</b> across the street.</i>
<b>deafening</b>	(of a noise) so loud as to make it impossible to hear anything else. <i>The music reached a <b>deafening</b> crescendo.</i>
<b><u>din</u></b>	A loud harsh or strident noise. <i>He <b>dinned</b> the lessons into his students.</i>
<b>dissonance</b>	Lack of harmony among musical notes. <i>The party faithful might be willing to put up with such <b>dissonance</b> among their candidates.</i>
<b>gruff</b>	Brusque and surly and forbidding. <i>Robert s <b>gruff</b> no nonsense approach.</i>
<b>hubbub</b>	A chaotic din caused by a crowd of people. <i>A <b>hubbub</b> of laughter and shouting.</i>
<b>husky</b>	Deep and harsh sounding as if from shouting or illness or emotion. <i>Paddy looked a <b>husky</b> strong guy.</i>
<b><u>jarring</u></b>	Incongruous in a striking or shocking way; clashing. <i>The telephone struck a <b>jarring</b> note in those Renaissance surroundings.</i>
<b>loud</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>They were kept awake by <b>loud</b> music.</i>
<b>noise</b>	Emit a noise. <i>Modern music is just <b>noise</b> to me.</i>

<b>obstreperous</b>	Boisterously and noisily aggressive. <i>Kept up an <b>obstreperous</b> clamor.</i>
<b>racket</b>	A snowshoe resembling a racket. <i>A squash <b>racket</b>.</i>
<b><u>rambunctious</u></b>	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i>A social gathering that became <b>rambunctious</b> and out of hand.</i>
<b><u>raucous</u></b>	Unpleasantly loud and harsh. <i>A <b>raucous</b> party.</i>
<b><u>rowdy</u></b>	Disturbing the public peace; loud and rough. <i>It was a <b>rowdy</b> but good natured crowd.</i>
<b>screech</b>	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>She hit her brother causing him to <b>screech</b> with pain.</i>
<b>sound</b>	Make a certain noise or sound. <i><b>Sound</b> the alarm.</i>
<b>strident</b>	Unpleasantly loud and harsh. <i>His voice had become increasingly <b>strident</b>.</i>
<b><u>thundering</u></b>	Extraordinarily big or impressive. <i>The <b>thundering</b> silence of what was left unsaid.</i>
<b>tumult</b>	The act of making a noisy disturbance. <i>The whole neighbourhood was in a state of fear and <b>tumult</b>.</i>
<b>uproarious</b>	Provoking loud laughter; very funny. <i>An <b>uproarious</b> party.</i>
<b>vociferous</b>	Expressing or characterized by vehement opinions; loud and forceful. <i>He was a <b>vociferous</b> opponent of the takeover.</i>
