## **Nomad as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Nomad" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “nomad” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person who does not stay long in the same place; a wanderer.*
- *A member of a people who have no permanent home but move about according to the seasons.*
- *A member of a people that travels from place to place to find fresh pasture for its animals and has no permanent home.*



## Synonyms of "Nomad" as a noun (9 Words)

**bedouin** A member of a nomadic tribe of Arabs.

A member of a people originating in South Asia and traditionally having an itinerant way of life, living widely dispersed across Europe and North and South America and speaking a language (Romani) that is related to Hindi; a Romani person.

**gypsy**

*Why should she choose to wander the world with a penniless **gypsy** like me.*

**itinerant**

A laborer who moves from place to place as demanded by employment.

***Itinerant** traders.*

**migrant**

An animal that migrates.

**roamer**

Someone who leads a wandering unsettled life.

**rover**

A player who has a rover ball.

*A lunar **rover**.*

**traveller** A member of a community traditionally having an itinerant way of life, in particular an Irish Traveller.  
*Business **travellers**.*

**wanderer** A computer program that prowls the internet looking for publicly accessible resources that can be added to a database; the database can then be searched with a search engine.  
*He is a longtime seaman a rootless **wanderer**.*

**wayfarer** A traveler going on a trip.



## Usage Examples of "Nomad" as a noun

- *The withering of their grasslands forced the nomads of the Sahara to descend into the Nile valley.*
- *Dolly was a nomad who had finally taken root in Hawaii.*
- *The nomads who roam the borderlands of Afghanistan.*
- *The Magyars were a nomad people of the steppes.*

<b>agrarian</b>	Relating to rural matters. <i>The <b>agrarian</b> reforms.</i>
<b>aimlessly</b>	Without aim; in an aimless manner. <i>We wandered <b>aimlessly</b> round Venice.</i>
<b>beggar</b>	Reduce to beggary. <i>This <b>beggars</b> description.</i>
<b>countryside</b>	The inhabitants of countryside areas. <i>The political influence of the <b>countryside</b> remains strong.</i>
<b>cow</b>	Subdue, restrain, or overcome by affecting with a feeling of awe; frighten (as with threats). <i>What does he see in that <b>cow</b>.</i>
<b>cowhand</b>	A person employed to tend cattle or to run a ranch.

<b><u>drift</u></b>	Be carried slowly by a current of air or water. <i>The pilot had not noticed any appreciable <b>drift</b>.</i>
<b><u>farming</u></b>	Relating to farming or agriculture. <i>Land was enclosed for arable <b>farming</b>.</i>
<b>gad</b>	Go from place to place in the pursuit of pleasure. <i>He had heard that I was <b>gadding</b> about with an airline stewardess.</i>
<b>gallivant</b>	Go around from one place to another in the pursuit of pleasure or entertainment. <i>She quit her job to go <b>gallivanting</b> around the globe.</i>
<b>idyll</b>	An episode of such pastoral or romantic charm as to qualify as the subject of a poetic idyll. <i>The rural <b>idyll</b> remains strongly evocative in most industrialized societies.</i>
<b>itinerant</b>	A laborer who moves from place to place as demanded by employment. <i><b>Itinerant</b> labor.</i>
<b><u>ministry</u></b>	Building where the business of a government ministry is transacted. <i>The soldiers were no less in need of his <b>ministry</b>.</i>
<b>nomadic</b>	Living the life of a nomad; wandering. <i><b>Nomadic</b> herdsmen.</i>
<b>pastoral</b>	(used with regard to idealized country life) idyllically rustic. <i><b>Pastoral</b> and doctrinal issues.</i>
<b>peripatetic</b>	Aristotelian. <i>The <b>peripatetic</b> nature of military life.</i>
<b>ramble</b>	Walk for pleasure in the countryside. <i>Roses climbed <b>rambled</b> hung over walls.</i>
<b><u>rambling</u></b>	Tending to depart from the main point or cover a wide range of subjects. <i>Scott's letter was long and <b>rambling</b>.</i>
<b>roam</b>	Move about or travel aimlessly or unsystematically, especially over a wide area. <i>Did you get to explore the city or have a <b>roam</b> around Bath.</i>
<b>rove</b>	(of a person's eyes) look in changing directions in order to see something thoroughly. <i>A new exhibit will electrify campuses on its national <b>rove</b>.</i>
<b>rover</b>	A player who has a rover ball. <i>A lunar <b>rover</b>.</i>
<b><u>rural</u></b>	Living in or characteristic of farming or country life. <i>An economy that is basically <b>rural</b>.</i>

- vagabond** Wander about as or like a vagabond.  
*Pirate ships were **vagabonds** of the sea.*
- wander** An act or instance of wandering.  
*Her mind **wanders**.*
- wanderer** Someone who leads a wandering unsettled life.  
*He is a longtime seaman a rootless **wanderer**.*
- wandering** Travelling about without any clear destination.  
*The river followed its **wandering** course.*
- yeoman** A member of the yeomanry force.
