- *(of a person or manner) feeling or appearing casually calm and relaxed; not displaying anxiety, interest, or enthusiasm.*



Synonyms of "Nonchalant" as an adjective (27 Words)

- airy** Open to or abounding in fresh air.
Airy gauze curtains.
- blasé** Uninterested because of frequent exposure or indulgence.
- breezy** Abounding in or exposed to the wind or breezes.
*The text is written in a **breezy** matter of fact manner.*
- calm** Free from storm or wind.
*She had to keep **calm** at all costs.*
- carefree** Free of trouble and worry and care.
*The **carefree** days of the holidays.*
- casual** Without or seeming to be without plan or method; offhand.
*A **casual** attitude to life.*
- composed** Serenely self-possessed and free from agitation especially in times of stress.
*I felt calm and more **composed** than I had in a long time.*

easy	Less in demand and therefore readily obtainable. <i>Satisfied with easy answers.</i>
equable	Not varying. <i>An equable temper.</i>
equanimous	Calm and composed.
free and easy	Unconstrained or not chemically bound in a molecule or not fixed and capable of relatively unrestricted motion.
free from care	Able to act at will; not hampered; not under compulsion or restraint.
free from worry	Completely wanting or lacking.
frivolous	Not having any serious purpose or value. <i>The frivolous fun loving flappers of the twenties.</i>
happy-go-lucky	Having or bringing good fortune.
heedless	Showing a reckless lack of care or attention. <i>Heedless of the child s crying.</i>
indifferent	Being neither good nor bad. <i>Was indifferent to their acceptance or rejection of her invitation.</i>
insouciant	Marked by blithe unconcern. <i>An elegantly insouciant manner.</i>
lacking concern	Inadequate in amount or degree.
light-hearted	Carefree and happy and lighthearted.
relaxed	Without strain or anxiety. <i>The relaxed atmosphere of the hotel.</i>
<u>serene</u>	Calm, peaceful, and untroubled; tranquil. <i>Serene skies and a bright blue sea.</i>
<u>unconcerned</u>	Showing a lack of worry or interest, especially when this is surprising or callous. <i>Readers unconcerned with style.</i>
unruffled	Not disordered or disarranged. <i>Robbie seemed unruffled by her words.</i>
<u>unserious</u>	Not serious; light-hearted. <i>He defended himself with an unserious disingenuousness.</i>
untroubled	Free from fear or doubt; easy in mind. <i>A man untroubled by a guilty conscience.</i>
<u>unworried</u>	Not anxious or uneasy. <i>Foreign investors are largely unworried by the government s fall.</i>

carefree

Free from anxiety or responsibility.
*The **carefree** days of the holidays.*

casual

A youth belonging to a subculture characterized by the wearing of expensive casual clothing and frequently associated with football hooliganism.
*An ideal coat for **casual** occasions.*

chilly

Appreciably or disagreeably cold.
*He got a **chilly** reception from Republican activists.*

composure	The state or feeling of being calm and in control of oneself. <i>He accepted their problems with composure and she with equanimity.</i>
cool	Great coolness and composure under strain. <i>Keep cool.</i>
easy	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. <i>Promises of an easy life in the New World.</i>
effortless	Requiring or apparently requiring no effort. <i>I went up the steps in two effortless bounds.</i>
facile	(of a person) having a superficial or simplistic knowledge or approach. <i>Facile generalizations.</i>
halcyon	A mythical bird said to breed at the time of the winter solstice in a nest floating on the sea and to have the power of calming the winds and waves. <i>The halcyon days of the clipper trade.</i>
happy-go-lucky	Occurring by chance.
indifferent	Neither good nor bad; mediocre. <i>Most workers were indifferent to foreign affairs.</i>
informal	Having or fostering a warm or friendly and informal atmosphere. <i>The guys wore very informal clothes.</i>
insouciant	Marked by blithe unconcern. <i>An elegantly insouciant manner.</i>
leisurely	Without hurry. <i>He traveled leisurely.</i>
mellow	In a mellow manner. <i>She was hypnotized by the mellow tone of his voice.</i>
pacify	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>The U N troops are working to pacify Bosnia.</i>
peaceful	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i>They settle their disputes by peaceful means.</i>
relaxed	(of a muscle or other body part) not tense. <i>Make sure that your jaw is relaxed.</i>
seemingly	From appearances alone-Thomas. <i>The child is seemingly healthy but the doctor is concerned.</i>
serene	Completely clear and fine. <i>Her eyes were closed and she looked very serene.</i>
slack	The part of a rope or line which is not held taut; the loose or unused part. <i>I picked up the rod and wound in the slack.</i>

<u>unconcerned</u>	Lacking in interest or care or feeling. <i>The average American is unconcerned that his or her plight is the result of a complex of personal and economic and governmental actions beyond the normal citizen s comprehension and control.</i>
<u>undisturbed</u>	Not disturbed. <i>A quiet weekend of undisturbed tranquillity.</i>
unflappable	Having or showing calmness in a crisis. <i>I prided myself on being unflappable even in the most chaotic circumstances.</i>
unhurried	Moving, acting, or taking place without haste or urgency. <i>He began opening the drawers of his desk in an unhurried way.</i>
uninterested	Not having or showing interest. <i>An uninterested spectator.</i>
unmolested	Not pestered or molested; left in peace. <i>They allowed him to pass unmolested.</i>
untroubled	Not beset by troubles or disturbance or distress. <i>Untroubled times.</i>
