<b>calm</b>	Free from storm or wind. <i>She had to keep <b>calm</b> at all costs.</i>
<b>carefree</b>	Free of trouble and worry and care. <i>The <b>carefree</b> days of the holidays.</i>

<b>easy</b>	Less in demand and therefore readily obtainable. <i>Satisfied with <b>easy</b> answers.</i>
<b>equable</b>	Not varying. <i>An <b>equable</b> temper.</i>
<b>equanimous</b>	Calm and composed.
<b>free and easy</b>	Unconstrained or not chemically bound in a molecule or not fixed and capable of relatively unrestricted motion.
<b>free from care</b>	Able to act at will; not hampered; not under compulsion or restraint.
<b>free from worry</b>	Completely wanting or lacking.
<b>frivolous</b>	Not having any serious purpose or value. <i>The <b>frivolous</b> fun loving flappers of the twenties.</i>
<b>happy-go-lucky</b>	Having or bringing good fortune.
<b>heedless</b>	Showing a reckless lack of care or attention. <i><b>Heedless</b> of the child s crying.</i>
<b>indifferent</b>	Being neither good nor bad. <i>Was <b>indifferent</b> to their acceptance or rejection of her invitation.</i>
<b>insouciant</b>	Marked by blithe unconcern. <i>An elegantly <b>insouciant</b> manner.</i>
<b>lacking concern</b>	Inadequate in amount or degree.
<b>light-hearted</b>	Carefree and happy and lighthearted.
<b>relaxed</b>	Without strain or anxiety. <i>The <b>relaxed</b> atmosphere of the hotel.</i>
<u><b>serene</b></u>	Calm, peaceful, and untroubled; tranquil. <i><b>Serene</b> skies and a bright blue sea.</i>
<u><b>unconcerned</b></u>	Showing a lack of worry or interest, especially when this is surprising or callous. <i>Readers <b>unconcerned</b> with style.</i>
<b>unruffled</b>	Not disordered or disarranged. <i>Robbie seemed <b>unruffled</b> by her words.</i>
<u><b>unserious</b></u>	Not serious; light-hearted. <i>He defended himself with an <b>unserious</b> disingenuousness.</i>
<b>untroubled</b>	Free from fear or doubt; easy in mind. <i>A man <b>untroubled</b> by a guilty conscience.</i>
<u><b>unworried</b></u>	Not anxious or uneasy. <i>Foreign investors are largely <b>unworried</b> by the government s fall.</i>

### carefree

Free from anxiety or responsibility.  
*The **carefree** days of the holidays.*

### casual

A youth belonging to a subculture characterized by the wearing of expensive casual clothing and frequently associated with football hooliganism.  
*An ideal coat for **casual** occasions.*

### chilly

Appreciably or disagreeably cold.  
*He got a **chilly** reception from Republican activists.*



<b>composure</b>	The state or feeling of being calm and in control of oneself. <i>He accepted their problems with <b>composure</b> and she with equanimity.</i>
<b>cool</b>	Great coolness and composure under strain. <i>Keep <b>cool</b>.</i>
<b>easy</b>	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. <i>Promises of an <b>easy</b> life in the New World.</i>
<b>effortless</b>	Requiring or apparently requiring no effort. <i>I went up the steps in two <b>effortless</b> bounds.</i>
<b><u>facile</u></b>	(of a person) having a superficial or simplistic knowledge or approach. <i><b>Facile</b> generalizations.</i>
<b>halcyon</b>	A mythical bird said to breed at the time of the winter solstice in a nest floating on the sea and to have the power of calming the winds and waves. <i>The <b>halcyon</b> days of the clipper trade.</i>
<b>happy-go-lucky</b>	Occurring by chance.
<b>indifferent</b>	Neither good nor bad; mediocre. <i>Most workers were <b>indifferent</b> to foreign affairs.</i>
<b>informal</b>	Having or fostering a warm or friendly and informal atmosphere. <i>The guys wore very <b>informal</b> clothes.</i>
<b>insouciant</b>	Marked by blithe unconcern. <i>An elegantly <b>insouciant</b> manner.</i>
<b><u>leisurely</u></b>	Without hurry. <i>He traveled <b>leisurely</b>.</i>
<b>mellow</b>	In a mellow manner. <i>She was hypnotized by the <b>mellow</b> tone of his voice.</i>
<b>pacify</b>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>The U N troops are working to <b>pacify</b> Bosnia.</i>
<b>peaceful</b>	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i>They settle their disputes by <b>peaceful</b> means.</i>
<b>relaxed</b>	(of a muscle or other body part) not tense. <i>Make sure that your jaw is <b>relaxed</b>.</i>
<b><u>seemingly</u></b>	From appearances alone-Thomas. <i>The child is <b>seemingly</b> healthy but the doctor is concerned.</i>
<b><u>serene</u></b>	Completely clear and fine. <i>Her eyes were closed and she looked very <b>serene</b>.</i>
<b>slack</b>	The part of a rope or line which is not held taut; the loose or unused part. <i>I picked up the rod and wound in the <b>slack</b>.</i>

<b><u>unconcerned</u></b>	Lacking in interest or care or feeling. <i>The average American is <b>unconcerned</b> that his or her plight is the result of a complex of personal and economic and governmental actions beyond the normal citizen s comprehension and control.</i>
<b><u>undisturbed</u></b>	Not disturbed. <i>A quiet weekend of <b>undisturbed</b> tranquillity.</i>
<b>unflappable</b>	Having or showing calmness in a crisis. <i>I prided myself on being <b>unflappable</b> even in the most chaotic circumstances.</i>
<b>unhurried</b>	Moving, acting, or taking place without haste or urgency. <i>He began opening the drawers of his desk in an <b>unhurried</b> way.</i>
<b>uninterested</b>	Not having or showing interest. <i>An <b>uninterested</b> spectator.</i>
<b>unmolested</b>	Not pestered or molested; left in peace. <i>They allowed him to pass <b>unmolested</b>.</i>
<b>untroubled</b>	Not beset by troubles or disturbance or distress. <i><b>Untroubled</b> times.</i>
