Normalize as a Verb

Definitions of "Normalize" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “normalize” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Bring to a desired consistency, texture, or hardness by a process of gradually heating and cooling.*
- *(in floating-point representation) express (a number) in the standard form as regards the position of the radix point, usually immediately following the first non-zero digit.*
- *Multiply (a series, function or item of data) by a factor that makes the norm or some associated quantity such as an integral equal to a desired value (usually 1).*
- *Become normal or return to its normal state.*
- *Make normal or cause to conform to a norm or standard.*
- *Bring or return to a normal or standard condition or state.*



Synonyms of "Normalize" as a verb (21 Words)

adjust	Permit small alterations or movements so as to achieve a desired fit, appearance, or result. <i>She must be allowed to grieve and to adjust in her own way.</i>
alter	Make an alteration to. <i>Plans to alter the dining hall.</i>
anneal	Heat (metal or glass) and allow it to cool slowly, in order to remove internal stresses and make it easier to work. <i>The chimneys of annealing furnaces.</i>
balance	Bring into balance or equilibrium. <i>They are struggling to balance work and family life.</i>
calibrate	Correlate the readings of (an instrument) with those of a standard in order to check the instrument's accuracy. <i>He calibrated the thermometer for the Celsius scale.</i>

fine-tune	Make fine adjustments or divide into marked intervals for optimal measuring.
fix	Decide upon or fix definitely. <i>Let s fix the picture to the frame.</i>
make good	Be or be capable of being changed or made into.
modify	Cause to change; make different; cause a transformation. <i>Please modify this letter to make it more polite.</i>
normalise	Become normal or return to its normal state.
<u>overhaul</u>	Overtake (someone), especially in a sporting event. <i>You should overhaul your car engine.</i>
put in working order	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
regulate	Check the emission of (sound). <i>Regulate the temperature.</i>
renormalise	Make normal or cause to conform to a norm or standard.
renormalize	Apply renormalization to. <i>Physicists initially renormalized the mass to get rid of the infinity.</i>
set	Set in type. <i>I usually set my alarm clock for eight.</i>
set right	Set in type.
set to rights	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
standardize	Cause to conform to standard or norm. <i>The weights and measures were standardized.</i>
<u>temper</u>	Make more temperate acceptable or suitable by adding something else moderate. <i>She tempered her criticism.</i>
<u>tune</u>	Adjust (a receiver circuit such as a radio or television) to the frequency of the required signal. <i>Tune the engine.</i>

- *Normalize relations with China.*
- *Let us hope that relations with this country will normalize soon.*

banality	The fact or condition of being banal; unoriginality. <i>There is an essential banality to the story he tells.</i>
bland	(of food or drink) unseasoned, mild-tasting, or insipid. <i>Bland mass produced pop music.</i>
cliche	A trite or obvious remark.
common	Common sense. <i>The dwellings of common people.</i>
commonplace	A notable passage in a work copied into a commonplace book. <i>The usual commonplace remarks.</i>
conventional	Following accepted customs and proprieties. <i>Agreement on reducing conventional forces in Europe.</i>
customary	According to the customs or usual practices associated with a particular society, place, or set of circumstances. <i>Sealed the deal with the customary handshake.</i>
habitual	Commonly used or practiced; usual. <i>His habitual dress.</i>
hackneyed	(of a phrase or idea) having been overused; unoriginal and trite. <i>Hackneyed phrases.</i>
inveterate	In a habitual and longstanding manner. <i>An inveterate gambler.</i>
lackluster	Lacking luster or shine. <i>A dull lackluster life.</i>
median	The median value of a range of values. <i>The median part of the sternum.</i>
mediocre	Poor to middling in quality. <i>The caliber of the students has gone from mediocre to above average.</i>
mediocrity	The quality or state of being mediocre. <i>The team suddenly came good after years of mediocrity.</i>
mundane	Concerned with the world or worldly matters. <i>According to the Shinto doctrine spirits of the dead can act upon the mundane world.</i>
ordinary	A judge of a probate court. <i>Ordinary everyday objects.</i>
prevail	Use persuasion successfully. <i>She was prevailed upon to give an account of her work.</i>
prevalent	Widespread in a particular area or at a particular time. <i>The social ills prevalent in society today.</i>

quotidian	Denoting the malignant form of malaria. <i>His story is an aching human one mired in quotidian details.</i>
regular	A soldier in the regular army. <i>A regular electrical outlet.</i>
routine	Organize according to a routine. <i>As a matter of routine a report will be sent to the director.</i>
stereotyped	Viewed or represented as a stereotype. <i>The film is weakened by its stereotyped characters.</i>
<u>typical</u>	Showing the characteristics expected of or popularly associated with a particular person or thing. <i>The typical or normal American.</i>
unexceptional	Not special in any way; lacking distinction. <i>An unexceptional movie.</i>
<u>unimpressive</u>	Not capable of impressing. <i>Her early academic record was unimpressive.</i>
<u>unremarkable</u>	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>His early childhood was unremarkable.</i>
<u>usual</u>	Commonly encountered. <i>The child's usual bedtime.</i>
workday	A day on which work is done. <i>Saturdays were workdays for him.</i>
