## Normalize as a Verb

### Definitions of "Normalize" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “normalize” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Bring to a desired consistency, texture, or hardness by a process of gradually heating and cooling.*
- *(in floating-point representation) express (a number) in the standard form as regards the position of the radix point, usually immediately following the first non-zero digit.*
- *Multiply (a series, function or item of data) by a factor that makes the norm or some associated quantity such as an integral equal to a desired value (usually 1).*
- *Become normal or return to its normal state.*
- *Make normal or cause to conform to a norm or standard.*
- *Bring or return to a normal or standard condition or state.*



## Synonyms of "Normalize" as a verb (21 Words)

<b>adjust</b>	Permit small alterations or movements so as to achieve a desired fit, appearance, or result. <i>She must be allowed to grieve and to <b>adjust</b> in her own way.</i>
<b>alter</b>	Make an alteration to. <i>Plans to <b>alter</b> the dining hall.</i>
<b>anneal</b>	Heat (metal or glass) and allow it to cool slowly, in order to remove internal stresses and make it easier to work. <i>The chimneys of <b>annealing</b> furnaces.</i>
<b>balance</b>	Bring into balance or equilibrium. <i>They are struggling to <b>balance</b> work and family life.</i>
<b>calibrate</b>	Correlate the readings of (an instrument) with those of a standard in order to check the instrument's accuracy. <i>He <b>calibrated</b> the thermometer for the Celsius scale.</i>

<b>fine-tune</b>	Make fine adjustments or divide into marked intervals for optimal measuring.
<b>fix</b>	Decide upon or fix definitely. <i>Let s <b>fix</b> the picture to the frame.</i>
<b>make good</b>	Be or be capable of being changed or made into.
<b>modify</b>	Cause to change; make different; cause a transformation. <i>Please <b>modify</b> this letter to make it more polite.</i>
<b>normalise</b>	Become normal or return to its normal state.
<b><u>overhaul</u></b>	Overtake (someone), especially in a sporting event. <i>You should <b>overhaul</b> your car engine.</i>
<b>put in working order</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
<b>regulate</b>	Check the emission of (sound). <i><b>Regulate</b> the temperature.</i>
<b>renormalise</b>	Make normal or cause to conform to a norm or standard.
<b>renormalize</b>	Apply renormalization to. <i>Physicists initially <b>renormalized</b> the mass to get rid of the infinity.</i>
<b>set</b>	Set in type. <i>I usually <b>set</b> my alarm clock for eight.</i>
<b>set right</b>	Set in type.
<b>set to rights</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
<b>standardize</b>	Cause to conform to standard or norm. <i>The weights and measures were <b>standardized</b>.</i>
<b><u>temper</u></b>	Make more temperate acceptable or suitable by adding something else moderate. <i>She <b>tempered</b> her criticism.</i>
<b><u>tune</u></b>	Adjust (a receiver circuit such as a radio or television) to the frequency of the required signal. <i><b>Tune</b> the engine.</i>

<b>banality</b>	The fact or condition of being banal; unoriginality. <i>There is an essential <b>banality</b> to the story he tells.</i>
<b>bland</b>	(of food or drink) unseasoned, mild-tasting, or insipid. <i><b>Bland</b> mass produced pop music.</i>
<b>cliche</b>	A trite or obvious remark.
<b>common</b>	Common sense. <i>The dwellings of <b>common</b> people.</i>
<b>commonplace</b>	A notable passage in a work copied into a commonplace book. <i>The usual <b>commonplace</b> remarks.</i>
<b>conventional</b>	Following accepted customs and proprieties. <i>Agreement on reducing <b>conventional</b> forces in Europe.</i>

<b>habitual</b>	Commonly used or practiced; usual. <i>His <b>habitual</b> dress.</i>
<b>hackneyed</b>	(of a phrase or idea) having been overused; unoriginal and trite. <i><b>Hackneyed</b> phrases.</i>
<b>inveterate</b>	In a habitual and longstanding manner. <i>An <b>inveterate</b> gambler.</i>
<b>lackluster</b>	Lacking luster or shine. <i>A dull <b>lackluster</b> life.</i>
<b>median</b>	The median value of a range of values. <i>The <b>median</b> part of the sternum.</i>
<b>mediocre</b>	Poor to middling in quality. <i>The caliber of the students has gone from <b>mediocre</b> to above average.</i>
<b>mediocrity</b>	The quality or state of being mediocre. <i>The team suddenly came good after years of <b>mediocrity</b>.</i>
<b>mundane</b>	Concerned with the world or worldly matters. <i>According to the Shinto doctrine spirits of the dead can act upon the <b>mundane</b> world.</i>
<b>ordinary</b>	A judge of a probate court. <i><b>Ordinary</b> everyday objects.</i>
<b>prevail</b>	Use persuasion successfully. <i>She was <b>prevailed</b> upon to give an account of her work.</i>
<b>prevalent</b>	Widespread in a particular area or at a particular time. <i>The social ills <b>prevalent</b> in society today.</i>

<b>quotidian</b>	Denoting the malignant form of malaria. <i>His story is an achingly human one mired in <b>quotidian</b> details.</i>
<b>regular</b>	A soldier in the regular army. <i>A <b>regular</b> electrical outlet.</i>
<b>routine</b>	Organize according to a routine. <i>As a matter of <b>routine</b> a report will be sent to the director.</i>
<b>stereotyped</b>	Viewed or represented as a stereotype. <i>The film is weakened by its <b>stereotyped</b> characters.</i>
<u><b>typical</b></u>	Showing the characteristics expected of or popularly associated with a particular person or thing. <i>The <b>typical</b> or normal American.</i>
<b>unexceptional</b>	Not special in any way; lacking distinction. <i>An <b>unexceptional</b> movie.</i>
<u><b>unimpressive</b></u>	Not capable of impressing. <i>Her early academic record was <b>unimpressive</b>.</i>
