Definitions of "Normalize" as a verb

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "normalize" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Bring to a desired consistency, texture, or hardness by a process of gradually heating and cooling.
- (in floating-point representation) express (a number) in the standard form as regards the position of the radix point, usually immediately following the first non-zero digit.
- Multiply (a series, function or item of data) by a factor that makes the norm or some associated quantity such as an integral equal to a desired value (usually 1.
- Become normal or return to its normal state.
- Make normal or cause to conform to a norm or standard.
- Bring or return to a normal or standard condition or state.


