### **Definitions of "Norms" as a noun**

### **Synonyms of "Norms" as a noun (1 Word)**

## Associations of "Norms" (30 Words)

<b>acceptation</b>	A particular sense or the generally recognized meaning common acceptance of a word or phrase.
<b>accepted</b>	Generally believed or recognized to be valid or correct. <i>The <b>accepted</b> consensus within the church.</i>
<b>average</b>	Amount to or come to an average without loss or gain. <i>They take about thirty minutes on <b>average</b>.</i>
<b>common</b>	Having no special distinction or quality widely known or commonly encountered average or ordinary or usual. <i><b>Common</b> misspellings.</i>
<b>criterion</b>	A principle or standard by which something may be judged or decided. <i>They award a green label to products that meet certain environmental criteria.</i>
<b>dissimilarity</b>	Difference; variance. <i>The similarity or <b>dissimilarity</b> between humans and other animals.</i>

<b>habitual</b>	Commonly used or practiced; usual. <i>His <b>habitual</b> comment.</i>
<b>homogenization</b>	Preparation of a suspension of cell constituents from tissue by physical treatment in a liquid. <i>The mechanical <b>homogenization</b> of leaf tissue.</i>
<b>layperson</b>	Someone who is not a clergyman or a professional person. <i>His highly successful lectures were meant for an audience of <b>laypersons</b> interested in the natural sciences.</i>
<b>median</b>	Denoting the middle term or mean of the middle two terms of a series arranged in order of magnitude For example the median number of the series 55 62 76 85 93 is 76. <i>The <b>median</b> income for the year was 15 000.</i>
<b>mediocre</b>	Poor to middling in quality. <i>The caliber of the students has gone from <b>mediocre</b> to above average.</i>
<b>mediocrity</b>	A person of mediocre ability. <i>The team suddenly came good after years of <b>mediocrity</b>.</i>
<b>mid</b>	Used in combination to denote the middle. <i>In <b>mid</b> 1958.</i>
<b>middlebrow</b>	A middlebrow person. <i><b>Middlebrow</b> fiction.</i>
<b>midst</b>	The middle part or point. <i>He left his flat in the <b>midst</b> of a rainstorm.</i>
<b>moderating</b>	Lessening in intensity or strength.
<b>normal</b>	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Until her accident Louise had been a perfectly <b>normal</b> little girl.</i>
<b>normalcy</b>	Expectedness as a consequence of being usual or regular or common.
<b>ordinary</b>	Those parts of a Roman Catholic service, especially the Mass, which do not vary from day to day. <i>Not out of the <b>ordinary</b>.</i>
<b>preponderance</b>	The quality or fact of being greater in number, quantity, or importance. <i>The least <b>preponderance</b> in either pan will unbalance the scale.</i>
<b>prevail</b>	Persuade (someone) to do something. <i>The champion <b>prevailed</b> though it was a hard fight.</i>

<b>prevalent</b>	Widespread in a particular area or at a particular time. <i>The social ills <b>prevalent</b> in society today.</i>
<b>qualification</b>	The qualification stage of a sporting event. <i>I welcome without <b>qualification</b> the Minister's statement.</i>
<b>standard</b>	Conforming to or constituting a standard of measurement or value or of the usual or regularized or accepted kind. <i><b>Standard</b> car equipment.</i>
<b>touchstone</b>	A piece of fine-grained dark schist or jasper formerly used for testing alloys of gold by observing the colour of the mark which they made on it. <i>They tend to regard grammar as the <b>touchstone</b> of all language performance.</i>
<b>typical</b>	Exhibiting the qualities or characteristics that identify a group or kind or category. <i>The <b>typical</b> car owner drives 10 000 miles a year.</i>
<b>uncharacteristically</b>	In uncharacteristic manner. <i>He hesitated <b>uncharacteristically</b>.</i>
<b>unexceptional</b>	Not out of the ordinary; usual. <i>A <b>unexceptional</b> incident as can be found in a lawyer's career.</i>
<b>unimpressive</b>	Not capable of impressing. <i>He was a man of <b>unimpressive</b> appearance.</i>
<b>yardstick</b>	A standard used for comparison. <i>On what kind of <b>yardstick</b> is he basing his judgment.</i>
