- *A standard or model or pattern regarded as typical.*



Synonyms of "Norms" as a noun (1 Word)

Reduction in the amount payable under an insurance policy, e.g. in respect of **average** partial loss.

*They take about thirty minutes on **average**.*

Associations of "Norms" (30 Words)

acceptation	A particular sense or the generally recognized meaning common acceptance of a word or phrase.
accepted	Generally believed or recognized to be valid or correct. <i>The accepted consensus within the church.</i>
average	Amount to or come to an average without loss or gain. <i>They take about thirty minutes on average.</i>
common	Having no special distinction or quality widely known or commonly encountered average or ordinary or usual. <i>Common misspellings.</i>
criterion	A principle or standard by which something may be judged or decided. <i>They award a green label to products that meet certain environmental criteria.</i>
dissimilarity	Difference; variance. <i>The similarity or dissimilarity between humans and other animals.</i>

habitual	Commonly used or practiced; usual. <i>His habitual comment.</i>
homogenization	Preparation of a suspension of cell constituents from tissue by physical treatment in a liquid. <i>The mechanical homogenization of leaf tissue.</i>
layperson	Someone who is not a clergyman or a professional person. <i>His highly successful lectures were meant for an audience of laypersons interested in the natural sciences.</i>
median	Denoting the middle term or mean of the middle two terms of a series arranged in order of magnitude For example the median number of the series 55 62 76 85 93 is 76. <i>The median income for the year was 15 000.</i>
mediocre	Poor to middling in quality. <i>The caliber of the students has gone from mediocre to above average.</i>
mediocrity	A person of mediocre ability. <i>The team suddenly came good after years of mediocrity.</i>
mid	Used in combination to denote the middle. <i>In mid 1958.</i>
middlebrow	A middlebrow person. <i>Middlebrow fiction.</i>
midst	The middle part or point. <i>He left his flat in the midst of a rainstorm.</i>
moderating	Lessening in intensity or strength.
normal	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Until her accident Louise had been a perfectly normal little girl.</i>
normalcy	Expectedness as a consequence of being usual or regular or common.
ordinary	Those parts of a Roman Catholic service, especially the Mass, which do not vary from day to day. <i>Not out of the ordinary.</i>
preponderance	The quality or fact of being greater in number, quantity, or importance. <i>The least preponderance in either pan will unbalance the scale.</i>
prevail	Persuade (someone) to do something. <i>The champion prevailed though it was a hard fight.</i>

prevalent	Widespread in a particular area or at a particular time. <i>The social ills prevalent in society today.</i>
qualification	The qualification stage of a sporting event. <i>I welcome without qualification the Minister's statement.</i>
standard	Conforming to or constituting a standard of measurement or value or of the usual or regularized or accepted kind. <i>Standard car equipment.</i>
touchstone	A piece of fine-grained dark schist or jasper formerly used for testing alloys of gold by observing the colour of the mark which they made on it. <i>They tend to regard grammar as the touchstone of all language performance.</i>
typical	Exhibiting the qualities or characteristics that identify a group or kind or category. <i>The typical car owner drives 10 000 miles a year.</i>
uncharacteristically	In uncharacteristic manner. <i>He hesitated uncharacteristically.</i>
unexceptional	Not out of the ordinary; usual. <i>A unexceptional incident as can be found in a lawyer's career.</i>
unimpressive	Not capable of impressing. <i>He was a man of unimpressive appearance.</i>
yardstick	A standard used for comparison. <i>On what kind of yardstick is he basing his judgment.</i>
