nosy Offensively curious or inquisitive.
***Nosy** neighbours.*

prying Offensively curious or inquisitive.
*She felt there was no place where she could escape from the **prying** eyes.*

snoopy Offensively curious or inquisitive.
*The **snoopy** neighbor watched us all day.*

Associations of "Nosey" (30 Words)

ask Require or ask for as a price or condition.
*Has he **asked** you out yet.*

busybody A meddling or prying person.
*Others considered him an interfering **busybody**.*

bystander	A nonparticipant spectator. <i>Water cannons were turned on marchers and innocent bystanders alike.</i>
curiosity	A strong desire to know or learn something. <i>Curiosity got the better of me so I called him.</i>
curious	Strange; unusual. <i>Traffic was slowed by curious rubberneckers.</i>
dubious	Not convinced. <i>What one found uncertain the other found dubious or downright false.</i>
enquire	Have a wish or desire to know something.
incredulous	Not disposed or willing to believe; unbelieving. <i>An incredulous gasp.</i>
inquire	Inquire about. <i>I inquired about their special today.</i>
inquiring	A request for information. <i>An inquiring mind.</i>
inquisitive	Having or showing an interest in learning things; curious. <i>I didn't like to seem inquisitive.</i>
interested	Having an interest or involvement; not impartial. <i>Seeking views from all interested parties.</i>
interfere	Cause interference to a broadcast radio signal. <i>Light pulses interfere constructively in a fibre to emit a pulse.</i>
interfering	(of a person) tending to interfere in other people's affairs. <i>An interfering old woman.</i>
interrogative	Some linguists consider interrogative sentences to constitute a mood. <i>An interrogative adverb.</i>
interrogatory	Relating to the use of or having the nature of an interrogation. <i>She abandoned her interrogatory monologue.</i>
interrupt	Terminate. <i>Please don't interrupt me while I'm on the phone.</i>
intervene	Be situated between things. <i>Why did the U S not intervene earlier in WW II.</i>
marvel	Be amazed at. <i>We marvelled at the child's linguistic abilities.</i>
meddle	Touch or handle (something) without permission. <i>Don't meddle in my affairs.</i>
meddlesome	Fond of meddling; interfering. <i>Heaven rid him of meddlesome politicians.</i>

<u>query</u>	A question mark. <i>I rang the water company to query my bill.</i>
question	Pose a series of questions to. <i>We must question your judgment in this matter.</i>
questioning	The action of asking someone questions, especially in an official context. <i>There was no questioning of the decision.</i>
reply	A statement either spoken or written that is made to reply to a question or request or criticism or accusation. <i>Clough scored the first goal and Speed hit a late reply.</i>
<u>skeptical</u>	Denying or questioning the tenets of especially a religion. <i>A skeptical attitude.</i>
speculative	(of an investment) involving a high risk of loss. <i>The bonuses cannot be put at risk due to some speculative investment.</i>
<u>why</u>	The cause or intention underlying an action or situation especially in the phrase the whys and wherefores. <i>Why did he do it.</i>
wonder	Something that causes feelings of wonder. <i>How many times have I written that I wonder.</i>
<u>wondering</u>	Characterized by or expressive of a desire to know something; curious. <i>Peter listened with an air of wondering astonishment.</i>
