amazingly	In a way that causes great surprise or wonder. <i>Amazingly 66 passengers and crew members survived.</i>
awfully	Very much. <i>I m awfully sorry to bother you so late.</i>
clearly	In an easily perceptible manner. <i>Could be seen clearly under the microscope.</i>
conspicuously	In a way that attracts notice or attention. <i>The signs were conspicuously displayed inside the restaurant.</i>
decidedly	In a decisive and confident way. <i>He looked decidedly uncomfortable.</i>
distinctly	To a distinct degree. <i>It s distinctly possible.</i>

especially	To a distinctly greater extent or degree than is common. <i>A new song written especially for Jonathan.</i>
exceptionally	Only in unusual circumstances. <i>The court allows half an hour in most cases one hour exceptionally for a very important case.</i>
extraordinarily	To a remarkable degree; extremely. <i>It is a simple story extraordinarily well told.</i>
extremely	To a very great degree; very. <i>Extremely unpleasant.</i>
impressively	In an impressive manner. <i>He has performed impressively in recent games.</i>
in particular	To or toward the inside of.
incredibly	Not easy to believe. <i>Behind you the coastal hills plunge to the incredibly blue sea backed by the Turkish mountains.</i>
markedly	To an extent which is clearly noticeable; significantly. <i>This advice is markedly different to that last year.</i>
noticeably	In a noticeable manner. <i>After surgery she deteriorated noticeably.</i>
outstandingly	Exceptionally. <i>Outstandingly beautiful gardens.</i>
particularly	Uniquely or characteristically. <i>He was particularly fussy about spelling.</i>
peculiarly	More than usually; especially. <i>Under peculiarly tragic circumstances.</i>
plainly	Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly. <i>A light was plainly visible.</i>
primarily	For the most part; mainly. <i>Around 80 per cent of personal computers are used primarily for word processing.</i>
principally	For the most part; chiefly. <i>He was principally a landscape painter.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>I m sorry Ruth I really am.</i>
remarkably	In a way that is worthy of attention. <i>Remarkably she hung on to her job.</i>

signally	As a signal. <i>Signally inappropriate methods.</i>
significantly	In a statistically significant way. <i>He paused significantly.</i>
singularly	In a singular manner or to a singular degree. <i>Charlotte thought her very singularly dressed.</i>
especially	For a special purpose. <i>A especially arranged dinner.</i>
spectacularly	In a spectacular manner. <i>A spectacularly stupid idea.</i>
strikingly	In a way that attracts attention by reason of being unusual, extreme, or prominent. <i>A strikingly beautiful girl.</i>
surprisingly	In a way that causes surprise; unexpectedly. <i>He rather surprisingly took up the cause.</i>
terribly	Very; extremely. <i>I m terribly sorry.</i>
unco	To a remarkable degree or extent. <i>It s got an unco fine taste.</i>
uncommonly	Exceptionally; very. <i>He is an uncommonly good talker.</i>
uniquely	So as to be unique. <i>A way of life that was uniquely British.</i>
unusually	To a remarkable or unusual extent; exceptionally. <i>She was unusually tall.</i>
very	Used as intensifiers; `real` is sometimes used informally for `really`; `rattling` is informal. <i>The very best quality.</i>

- *A diet low in animal fat protects against potentially fatal diseases, notably diabetes.*

adapted	Changed in order to improve or made more fit for a particular purpose. <i>Seeds precisely adapted to the area.</i>
defined	Clearly characterized or delimited. <i>Hills defined against the evening sky.</i>
dispensation	The act of dispensing (giving out in portions). <i>Scholarship is conveyed to a wider audience than under the old dispensation.</i>
distinct	Not alike; different in nature or quality. <i>Trenchant distinctions between right and wrong.</i>
distinctive	Capable of being classified. <i>Jerusalem has a distinctive Middle East flavor.</i>
egregious	Outstandingly bad; shocking. <i>Egregious abuses of copyright.</i>
emphasis	Special importance, value, or prominence given to something. <i>The red light gave the central figure increased emphasis.</i>
especial	Better or greater than usual; special. <i>These traditions are of especial interest to feminists.</i>
especially	In a special manner. <i>A new song written especially for Jonathan.</i>
exceptionally	To a greater degree than normal; unusually. <i>The weather was exceptionally mild for the time of the year.</i>
featured	Made a feature or highlight; given prominence. <i>This blond blue eyed regular featured queen.</i>
flagrant	(of an action considered wrong or immoral) conspicuously or obviously offensive. <i>A flagrant violation of the law.</i>
hallmark	Stamp with a hallmark. <i>The tiny bubbles are the hallmark of fine champagnes.</i>
idiosyncratic	Relating to idiosyncrasy; peculiar or individual. <i>She emerged as one of the great idiosyncratic talents of the nineties.</i>
insofar	To the degree or extent that. <i>Insofar as it can be ascertained the horse lung is comparable to that of man.</i>
junction	A place where things join. <i>At such junctions he always had an impulse to leave.</i>
noticed	Being perceived or observed. <i>An easily noticed effect on the rate of growth.</i>

particular	Used to single out an individual member of a specified group or class. <i>Very particular about how her food was prepared.</i>
particularly	To a higher degree than is usual or average. <i>A particularly gruesome attack.</i>
peculiar	Unique or specific to a person or thing or category. <i>Rights peculiar to the rich.</i>
salience	The quality of being particularly noticeable or important; prominence. <i>The political salience of religion has a considerable impact.</i>
selected	Chosen in preference to another.
singularly	In a strange or eccentric way. <i>A singularly unattractive colour.</i>
special	A special offering usually temporary and at a reduced price that is featured in advertising. <i>A special occasion.</i>
specially	To a distinctly greater extent or degree than is common. <i>A specially arranged dinner.</i>
specific	A medicine that has a mitigating effect on a specific disease. <i>The differences between them can only be on the specific level.</i>
specifically	For a particular purpose. <i>There are three genera in common but these differ specifically.</i>
specificity	The narrowness of the range of substances with which an antibody or other agent acts or is effective. <i>Host specificity of a parasite.</i>
tailored	Severely simple in line or design. <i>Tailored curtains.</i>
unique	A unique person or thing. <i>Original and unique designs.</i>
