Associations of "Notions" (30 Words)

assume	Suppose to be the case, without proof. <i>I assume his train was late.</i>
belief	A religious conviction. <i>Contrary to popular belief existing safety regulations were adequate.</i>
caprice	A sudden and unaccountable change of mood or behaviour. <i>A land where men were ruled by law and not by caprice.</i>
commonsensical	Exhibiting native good judgment. <i>Unlearned and commonsensical countryfolk were capable of solving problems that beset the more sophisticated.</i>
deducible	Capable of being deduced.
extrapolate	Draw from specific cases for more general cases. <i>The figures were extrapolated from past trends.</i>
extrapolation	The action of estimating or concluding something by assuming that existing trends will continue or a current method will remain applicable. <i>The figure is an extrapolation from prior data.</i>
generalize	Speak or write in generalities. <i>Attempts to generalize an elite education.</i>
idea	The aim or purpose. <i>Our menu list will give you some idea of how interesting a low fat diet can be.</i>
inductive	Characterized by the inference of general laws from particular instances. <i>Inductive reasoning.</i>
infer	Draw from specific cases for more general cases. <i>From these facts we can infer that crime has been increasing.</i>

inference	The reasoning involved in drawing a conclusion or making a logical judgment on the basis of circumstantial evidence and prior conclusions rather than on the basis of direct observation. <i>His emphasis on order and health and by inference cleanliness.</i>
logic	The system of operations performed by a computer that underlies the machine's representation of logical operations. <i>The logic of the argument is faulty.</i>
logical	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>Her logical mind.</i>
logically	According to the rules of logic or formal argument. <i>Try to stay calm and think logically about the questions.</i>
opinion	A formal statement of reasons for a judgement given. <i>That in my opinion is right.</i>
philosophical	Of or relating to philosophy or philosophers. <i>Philosophical writing.</i>
reasonable	Marked by sound judgment. <i>The guilt of a person on trial must be proved beyond reasonable doubt.</i>
reasoning	Endowed with the capacity to reason. <i>He explained the reasoning behind his decision at a media conference.</i>
sane	Reasonable or sensible. <i>Hard work kept me sane.</i>
sensible	Able to notice or appreciate; not unaware of. <i>I am sensible that the mention of such a circumstance may appear trifling.</i>
speculative	Showing curiosity. <i>Raised a speculative eyebrow.</i>
syllogistic	Of or relating to or consisting of syllogism.
tendency	An attitude of mind especially one that favors one alternative over others. <i>The shoreward tendency of the current.</i>
theory	A tentative insight into the natural world; a concept that is not yet verified but that if true would explain certain facts or phenomena. <i>The architect has a theory that more is less.</i>
thinking	Thoughts; meditations. <i>His thinking is reflected in his later autobiography.</i>

vagary	An unexpected and inexplicable change in something (in a situation or a person's behavior, etc. <i>The vagaries of the weather.</i>
<u>whim</u>	A sudden desire or change of mind, especially one that is unusual or unexplained. <i>Whimsy can be humorous to someone with time to enjoy it.</i>
whimsy	The trait of acting unpredictably and more from whim or caprice than from reason or judgment. <i>A clean slate on which to enter information in the form that suits your whimsy.</i>
wrongheaded	Obstinately perverse in judgment or opinion. <i>A wrongheaded policy.</i>
