| imaginativeness | The formation of a mental image of something that is not perceived as real and is not present to the senses. |
| innovation | A creation (a new device or process) resulting from study and experimentation. <i>Innovation is crucial to the continuing success of any organization.</i> |
| innovativeness | Originality by virtue of introducing new ideas. |
| knickknack | Miscellaneous curios. |
| modernity | The quality of being current or of the present. <i>Hobbes was the genius of modernity.</i> |
| modernness | The quality of being current or of the present. |
| <u>newness</u> | The quality of being new; the opposite of oldness. <i>The shiny newness of the giant conference centre.</i> |
| <u>originality</u> | The ability to think independently and creatively. <i>He congratulated her on the originality of her costume.</i> |
| ornament | A quality or person adding grace, beauty, or honour to something. <i>Sense of humour is an ornament to character.</i> |
| <u>toy</u> | Any of several breeds of very small dogs kept purely as pets. <i>A toy car.</i> |
| trifle | Something of small importance. <i>Bowls of trifle followed.</i> |
| <u>trinket</u> | A small ornament or item of jewellery that is of little value. |
| unconventionality | Unorthodoxy by virtue of being unconventional. |
