- jab** The act of touching someone suddenly with your finger or elbow.  
*A **jab** in the stomach.*
- jog** A spell of jogging.  
*His morning **jog**.*
- poke** A look or search around a place.  
*I expect you'd prefer something with a bit more **poke**.*
- push** The force used in pushing.  
*The **pushing** is good exercise.*

## Nudge as a Verb

### Definitions of "Nudge" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "nudge" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Touch or push (something) gently or gradually.*
- *Push into action by pestering or annoying gently.*
- *Prod (someone) gently with one's elbow in order to attract attention.*
- *To push against gently.*
- *Coax or gently encourage (someone) to do something.*
- *Approach (an age, figure, or level) very closely.*

## Synonyms of "Nudge" as a verb (24 Words)

<b>approach</b>	Make advances to someone, usually with a proposal or suggestion. <i>One must <b>approach</b> the matter with caution.</i>
<b>be verging on</b>	Occupy a certain position or area.
<b>border on</b>	Provide with a border or edge.
<b><u>bump</u></b>	In a race gain a bump against. <i>She had to <b>bump</b> the pushchair down the steps.</i>
<b>bump against</b>	Knock against with force or violence.
<b><u>coax</u></b>	Obtain something from (someone) by gentle and persistent persuasion. <i>The trainees were <b>coaxed</b> into doing boring work.</i>
<b>come close to</b>	Proceed or get along.
<b>dig</b>	Create by digging. <i>She was <b>digging</b> away at her math homework.</i>
<b>elbow</b>	Move by pushing past people with one's elbows. <i>The issues which concerned them tended to be <b>elbowed</b> aside by men.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Persuade (someone) to do or continue to do something by giving support and advice. <i>His financial success <b>encouraged</b> him to look for a wife.</i>
<b>get close to</b>	Make children.
<b><u>jab</u></b>	Stab or pierce. <i>He <b>jabbed</b> the piece of meat with his pocket knife.</i>
<b>jog</b>	Run at a steady gentle pace, especially on a regular basis as a form of physical exercise. <i>This novel rambles on and <b>jogs</b>.</i>
<b>near</b>	Come near to approach. <i>The enemy army came <b>nearer</b> and <b>nearer</b>.</i>
<b><u>poke</u></b>	Poke or thrust abruptly. <i>They sniffed and <b>poked</b> at everything they bought.</i>
<b>poke at</b>	Stir by poking.
<b>prompt</b>	Supply a forgotten word or line to (an actor) during the performance of a play. <i>The violence <b>prompted</b> a wave of refugees to flee the country.</i>
<b><u>push</u></b>	Make strenuous pushing movements during birth to expel the baby. <i>She believed he was <b>pushing</b> their daughter too hard.</i>
<b>push against</b>	Approach a certain age or speed.
<b>run into</b>	Make without a miss.

<b>stimulate</b>	Cause to occur rapidly. <i>The book <b>stimulated</b> her imagination.</i>
<b>touch</b>	Used to indicate that something is avoided or rejected. <i>She was <b>touched</b> by her friend s loyalty.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Nudge" as a verb

- *We have to nudge the politicians in the right direction.*
- *Both men were nudging fifty.*
- *People were nudging each other and pointing at me.*
- *She nudged my elbow when she saw her friend enter the restaurant.*
- *The canoe nudged a bank of reeds.*

<b>aggressor</b>	A confident assertive person who acts as instigator.
<b>assailant</b>	A person who physically attacks another. <i>The police have no firm leads about the identity of his <b>assailant</b>.</i>
<b>beat</b>	Shape by beating. <i>He <b>beat</b> his own world record.</i>
<b>bludgeon</b>	Beat someone repeatedly with a bludgeon or other heavy object. <i>She was found <b>bludgeoned</b> to death in the basement.</i>
<b>clout</b>	A long distance shot that hits a clout. <i>I knew she carried a lot of <b>clout</b>.</i>
<b>crump</b>	Explode heavily or with a loud dull noise. <i>We heard the cannon <b>crumping</b>.</i>
<b>fist</b>	Clench the hand or fingers into a fist. <i>She pummelled him furiously with her <b>fists</b>.</i>
<b>hornet</b>	Large stinging paper wasp.
<b>impale</b>	Kill by piercing with a spear or sharp pole. <i>His head was <b>impaled</b> on a pike and exhibited for all to see.</i>
<b>knife</b>	Stab someone with a knife. <i>A shard of steel <b>knifed</b> through the mainsail.</i>
<b>pang</b>	A sudden sharp pain or painful emotion. <i>The snack bar will keep those hunger <b>pangs</b> at bay.</i>
<b>perforate</b>	Perforated. <i>The walls will be <b>perforated</b> with thousands of circular openings.</i>

<b>pesky</b>	Causing trouble; annoying. <i>A <b>pesky</b> younger brother.</i>
<b>ping</b>	Hit with a pinging noise. <i>The <b>ping</b> of the oven timer.</i>
<b>poignancy</b>	The quality of evoking a keen sense of sadness or regret; pathos. <i>A moment of extraordinary <b>poignancy</b>.</i>
<b>poke</b>	Poke or thrust abruptly. <i>She gave the fire a <b>poke</b>.</i>
<b>prickle</b>	A short pointed outgrowth on the bark or epidermis of a plant; a small thorn. <i>Kathleen felt a <b>prickle</b> of excitement.</i>
<b>punch</b>	Drive forcibly as if by a punch. <i>The nail <b>punched</b> through the wall.</i>
<b>pushing</b>	The act of applying force in order to move something away. <i>The <b>pushing</b> is good exercise.</i>
<b>spiny</b>	Full of or covered with prickles. <i>A <b>spiny</b> problem.</i>
<b>stab</b>	Stab or pierce. <i>She felt a <b>stab</b> of jealousy.</i>
<b>stick</b>	Come or be in close contact with stick or hold together and resist separation. <i>Fever left him weak on his <b>sticks</b>.</i>
<b>sting</b>	Cause a sharp or stinging pain or discomfort. <i>I recalled the <b>sting</b> of his betrayal.</i>
<b>thump</b>	Hit or strike heavily, especially with the fist or a blunt implement. <i>The bag landed on the floor with a <b>thump</b>.</i>
<b>twinge</b>	(of a part of the body) suffer a sudden, sharp localized pain. <i><b>Twinges</b> of conscience.</i>
<b>wartime</b>	A period of time during which there is armed conflict. <i>Britain s <b>wartime</b> defences.</i>
<b>wasp</b>	A solitary winged insect with a narrow waist mostly distantly related to the social wasps and including many parasitic kinds.
<b>wound</b>	Inflict a wound on. <i>A knife <b>wound</b>.</i>
