<b>cipher</b>	A person of no importance, especially one who does the bidding of others and seems to have no will of their own. <i>A pair of rock crystal goblets engraved with the <b>cipher</b> of Peter the Great.</i>
<b>cypher</b>	A mathematical element that when added to another number yields the same number.
<b>goose egg</b>	Web-footed long-necked typically gregarious migratory aquatic birds usually larger and less aquatic than ducks.
<b>nada</b>	A quantity of no importance.
<b>naught</b>	A quantity of no importance. <i>All my efforts led to <b>naught</b>.</i>
<b>nil</b>	Nothing, especially as the score in certain games; zero. <i>They beat us three <b>nil</b>.</i>
<b>nix</b>	A quantity of no importance.
<b>nothing</b>	A quantity of no importance. <i>It looked like <b>nothing</b> I had ever seen before.</i>
<b>zero</b>	A quantity of no importance.
<b>zilch</b>	A quantity of no importance. <i>I didn't hear <b>zilch</b> about it.</i>

Denoting something fastened by a zip.

*He s full of **zip**.*

**zippo**

A quantity of no importance.



## Null as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Null" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "null" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a set or matrix) having no elements, or only zeros as elements.*
- *Having no legal or binding force; invalid.*
- *Lacking distinctive qualities; having no positive substance or content.*
- *Lacking any legal or binding force.*
- *Having or associated with the value zero.*



### Synonyms of "Null" as an adjective (13 Words)

**blank**

Not written or printed on.

*A **blank** sheet of paper.*

**characterless**

Lacking distinct or individual characteristics; dull and uninteresting.

**colourless**

Weak in color; not colorful.

*Her **colourless** cheeks.*

<u>empty</u>	(of a set) containing no members or elements. <i>An <b>empty</b> room.</i>
<b>expressionless</b>	(of a person's face or voice) not conveying any emotion; unemotional. <i>Her face was <b>expressionless</b>.</i>
<b>inane</b>	Extremely silly or stupid. <i>Don't badger people with <b>inane</b> questions.</i>
<b>insipid</b>	Lacking taste or flavor or tang. <i>Many artists continued to churn out <b>insipid</b> shallow works.</i>
<u>invalid</u>	Having no cogency or legal force. <i><b>Invalid</b> reasoning.</i>
<b>lacking in character</b>	Nonexistent.
<b>null and void</b>	Lacking any legal or binding force.
<b>vacuous</b>	Devoid of significance or point. <i>A <b>vacuous</b> space.</i>
<u>vapid</u>	Offering nothing that is stimulating or challenging; bland. <i>A <b>vapid</b> smile.</i>
<u>void</u>	(of an office or position) vacant. <i>When West showed <b>void</b> he went into a huddle.</i>

- *His curiously null life.*





## Associations of "Null" (30 Words)

<b>abolish</b>	Do away with. <i>Slavery was <b>abolished</b> in the mid 19th century in America and in Russia.</i>
<b>abrogate</b>	Repeal or do away with (a law, right, or formal agreement). <i>A proposal to <b>abrogate</b> temporarily the right to strike.</i>
<b>abrogation</b>	The act of abrogating; an official or legal cancellation.
<b>annul</b>	Cancel officially. <i>Her first marriage was finally <b>annulled</b> by His Holiness.</i>
<u><b>dated</b></u>	Marked by features of the immediate and usually discounted past. <i>A <b>dated</b> expression.</i>
<u><b>destitute</b></u>	Poor enough to need help from others. <i>The charity cares for <b>destitute</b> children.</i>
<u><b>devoid</b></u>	Completely wanting or lacking. <i>The sentence was <b>devoid</b> of meaning.</i>
<u><b>empty</b></u>	A bottle or glass left empty of its contents. <i>An <b>empty</b> glass.</i>

<b>expired</b>	Having come to an end or become void after passage of a period of time. <i>An <b>expired</b> passport.</i>
<b>futilely</b>	In a futile and unproductive manner.
<b><u>invalid</u></b>	Remove (someone) from active service in the armed forces because of injury or illness. <i><b>Invalid</b> reasoning.</i>
<b><u>invalidate</u></b>	Make invalid for use. <i>A technical flaw in her papers <b>invalidated</b> her nomination.</i>
<b>misanthropy</b>	A disposition to dislike and mistrust other people. <i>The streak of <b>misanthropy</b> in his nature.</i>
<b>nihilism</b>	The belief that nothing in the world has a real existence.
<b>nil</b>	Nothing, especially as the score in certain games; zero. <i>His chance of survival was virtually <b>nil</b>.</i>
<b>nothing</b>	Not at all. <i>He had a series of <b>nothing</b> jobs.</i>
<b><u>nullify</u></b>	Make legally null and void; invalidate. <i>Insulin can block the release of the hormone and thereby <b>nullify</b> the effects of training.</i>
<b>off</b>	Located on the side of a vehicle that is normally furthest from the kerb offside. <i>We d been rather badly <b>off</b> for books.</i>
<b><u>override</u></b>	Counteract the normal operation of (an automatic gear shift in a vehicle). <i>This commitment should <b>override</b> all other considerations.</i>
<b>passe</b>	Out of fashion.
<b>repeal</b>	The act of abrogating; an official or legal cancellation. <i>The legislation was <b>repealed</b> five months later.</i>
<b>rescind</b>	Revoke, cancel, or repeal (a law, order, or agreement). <i>The government eventually <b>rescinded</b> the directive.</i>
<b><u>revoke</u></b>	(in bridge, whist, and other card games) fail to follow suit despite being able to do so. <i>He <b>revoked</b> the ban on smoking.</i>
<b><u>unfit</u></b>	Make unfit or unsuitable. <i><b>Unfit</b> for human consumption.</i>
<b><u>unsound</u></b>	Physically unsound or diseased. <i>This line of argument is <b>unsound</b>.</i>
<b><u>vacant</u></b>	(of a place) not occupied; empty. <i>The throne is never <b>vacant</b>.</i>

**vacate**

Leave (a job, post, or position) voluntarily.

*The Justices **vacated** a ruling by the federal appeals court.*

**vain**

Having or showing an excessively high opinion of one's appearance, abilities, or worth.

*The **vain** hope of finding work.*

**zero**

Adjust as by firing under test conditions the zero of a gun.

*A **zero** score.*

**zip**

Close with a zipper.

*He **zipped** up his waterproof.*
