### Definitions of "Nullify" as a verb

- *Make of no use or value; cancel out.*
- *Declare invalid.*
- *Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of.*
- *Show to be invalid.*
- *Make legally null and void; invalidate.*

### Synonyms of "Nullify" as a verb (14 Words)

<b>annul</b>	Cancel officially. <i>The contract was <b>annulled</b>.</i>
<b>avoid</b>	Refrain from doing something. <i>This route <b>avoids</b> downtown Boston.</i>
<b>cancel out</b>	Declare null and void; make ineffective.
<b>declare null and void</b>	Designate (a trump suit or no-trump) with the final bid of a hand.

### invalidate

Take away the legal force of or render ineffective.  
*A technical flaw in her papers **invalidated** her nomination.*

### **make of no use or value**

Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages.

### **negate**

Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of.  
*This action will **negate** the effect of my efforts.*

### **neutralise**

Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of.

### neutralize

Make (an acidic or alkaline substance) chemically neutral.  
*Impatience at his frailty began to **neutralize** her fear.*

### **quash**

Put down by force or intimidation.  
*His conviction was **quashed** on appeal.*

### **render ineffective**

Give an interpretation or rendition of.

### **render invalid**

Give or supply.

### **render null and void**

Coat with plastic or cement.

### void

Declare invalid.  
*The concert hall was **voided** of the audience.*

## Usage Examples of "Nullify" as a verb

- *Insulin can block the release of the hormone and thereby nullify the effects of training.*
- *Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.*

## Associations of "Nullify" (30 Words)

### **abnegation**

Self-denial.  
***Abnegation** of political power.*

### **abolish**

Do away with.  
*Slavery was **abolished** in the mid 19th century in America and in Russia.*

### **abrogate**

Evade (a responsibility or duty).  
*A proposal to **abrogate** temporarily the right to strike.*

### **abrogation**

The repeal or abolition of a law, right, or agreement.

### annihilate

Kill in large numbers.  
*The stronger force **annihilated** its opponent virtually without loss.*

### **annul**

Declare invalid.  
*Her first marriage was finally **annulled** by His Holiness.*

### belie

(of an appearance) fail to give a true impression of (something).  
*His lively alert manner **belied** his years.*

<b><u>cancel</u></b>	A notation cancelling a previous sharp or flat. <i>His visa had been <b>cancelled</b>.</i>
<b><u>contradict</u></b>	Be in contradiction with. <i>The survey appears to <b>contradict</b> the industry's claims.</i>
<b><u>counterbalance</u></b>	Equality of distribution. <i>The sitter's weight <b>counterbalances</b> the tilting pressure on the backrest.</i>
<b><u>deny</u></b>	Deny formally an allegation of fact by the opposing party in a legal suit. <i>The servants are ordered to <b>deny</b> him.</i>
<b><u>disavow</u></b>	Refuse to acknowledge; disclaim knowledge of; responsibility for, or association with. <i>The union leaders resisted pressure to <b>disavow</b> picket line violence.</i>
<b><u>exterminate</u></b>	Destroy completely, as if down to the roots. <i>They use poison to <b>exterminate</b> moles.</i>
<b><u>invalidate</u></b>	Make invalid for use. <i>A technical flaw in her papers <b>invalidated</b> her nomination.</i>
<b><u>negate</u></b>	Deny the existence of. <i>Alcohol <b>negates</b> the effects of the drug.</i>
<b><u>neutralize</u></b>	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of. <i>Her optimism <b>neutralizes</b> his gloom.</i>
<b><u>override</u></b>	Prevail over. <i>Health considerations <b>override</b> financial concerns.</i>
<b><u>rebuff</u></b>	A deliberate discourteous act (usually as an expression of anger or disapproval). <i>Callers phoning a chatline need have no fear of <b>rebuff</b>.</i>
<b><u>refusal</u></b>	An expression of unwillingness to accept or grant an offer or request. <i>Dollar Girl hit several fences and had a <b>refusal</b>.</i>
<b><u>reject</u></b>	The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality. <i>An application to hold a pop concert at the club was <b>rejected</b>.</i>
<b><u>rejection</u></b>	The speech act of rejecting. <i>His proposals were met with <b>rejection</b>.</i>
<b><u>renunciation</u></b>	The formal rejection of something, typically a belief, claim, or course of action. <i>A <b>renunciation</b> of violence.</i>
<b><u>repeal</u></b>	Cancel officially. <i>The legislation was <b>repealed</b> five months later.</i>
<b><u>repudiate</u></b>	Reject as untrue, unfounded, or unjust. <i>She has <b>repudiated</b> policies associated with previous party leaders.</i>

<b>repudiation</b>	Refusal to fulfil or discharge an agreement, obligation, or debt. <i>A <b>repudiation</b> of left wing political ideas.</i>
<b>rescind</b>	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually <b>rescinded</b> the directive.</i>
<b>rescission</b>	(law) the act of rescinding; the cancellation of a contract and the return of the parties to the positions they would have had if the contract had not been made. <i>The plaintiff agreed to the <b>rescission</b> of the agreement.</i>
<b>revocable</b>	Capable of being revoked or annulled. <i>A <b>revocable</b> settlement.</i>
<u>revoke</u>	Cancel officially. <i>He <b>revoked</b> the ban on smoking.</i>
<u>veto</u>	A rejection by right of veto. <i>I <b>vetoed</b> the idea of a holiday.</i>
