Definitions of "Nullify" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “nullify” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Make of no use or value; cancel out.*
- *Declare invalid.*
- *Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of.*
- *Show to be invalid.*
- *Make legally null and void; invalidate.*

Synonyms of "Nullify" as a verb (14 Words)

annul	Cancel officially. <i>The contract was annulled.</i>
avoid	Refrain from doing something. <i>This route avoids downtown Boston.</i>
cancel out	Declare null and void; make ineffective.
declare null and void	Designate (a trump suit or no-trump) with the final bid of a hand.

invalidate

Take away the legal force of or render ineffective.
*A technical flaw in her papers **invalidated** her nomination.*

make of no use or value

Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages.

negate

Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of.
*This action will **negate** the effect of my efforts.*

neutralise

Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of.

neutralize

Make (an acidic or alkaline substance) chemically neutral.
*Impatience at his frailty began to **neutralize** her fear.*

quash

Put down by force or intimidation.
*His conviction was **quashed** on appeal.*

render ineffective

Give an interpretation or rendition of.

render invalid

Give or supply.

render null and void

Coat with plastic or cement.

void

Declare invalid.
*The concert hall was **voided** of the audience.*

Usage Examples of "Nullify" as a verb

- *Insulin can block the release of the hormone and thereby nullify the effects of training.*
- *Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.*

Associations of "Nullify" (30 Words)

abnegation

Self-denial.
***Abnegation** of political power.*

abolish

Do away with.
*Slavery was **abolished** in the mid 19th century in America and in Russia.*

abrogate

Evade (a responsibility or duty).
*A proposal to **abrogate** temporarily the right to strike.*

abrogation

The repeal or abolition of a law, right, or agreement.

annihilate

Kill in large numbers.
*The stronger force **annihilated** its opponent virtually without loss.*

annul

Declare invalid.
*Her first marriage was finally **annulled** by His Holiness.*

belie

(of an appearance) fail to give a true impression of (something).
*His lively alert manner **belied** his years.*

<u>cancel</u>	A notation cancelling a previous sharp or flat. <i>His visa had been cancelled.</i>
<u>contradict</u>	Be in contradiction with. <i>The survey appears to contradict the industry's claims.</i>
<u>counterbalance</u>	Equality of distribution. <i>The sitter's weight counterbalances the tilting pressure on the backrest.</i>
<u>deny</u>	Deny formally an allegation of fact by the opposing party in a legal suit. <i>The servants are ordered to deny him.</i>
<u>disavow</u>	Refuse to acknowledge; disclaim knowledge of; responsibility for, or association with. <i>The union leaders resisted pressure to disavow picket line violence.</i>
<u>exterminate</u>	Destroy completely, as if down to the roots. <i>They use poison to exterminate moles.</i>
<u>invalidate</u>	Make invalid for use. <i>A technical flaw in her papers invalidated her nomination.</i>
<u>negate</u>	Deny the existence of. <i>Alcohol negates the effects of the drug.</i>
<u>neutralize</u>	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of. <i>Her optimism neutralizes his gloom.</i>
<u>override</u>	Prevail over. <i>Health considerations override financial concerns.</i>
<u>rebuff</u>	A deliberate discourteous act (usually as an expression of anger or disapproval). <i>Callers phoning a chatline need have no fear of rebuff.</i>
<u>refusal</u>	An expression of unwillingness to accept or grant an offer or request. <i>Dollar Girl hit several fences and had a refusal.</i>
<u>reject</u>	The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality. <i>An application to hold a pop concert at the club was rejected.</i>
<u>rejection</u>	The speech act of rejecting. <i>His proposals were met with rejection.</i>
<u>renunciation</u>	The formal rejection of something, typically a belief, claim, or course of action. <i>A renunciation of violence.</i>
<u>repeal</u>	Cancel officially. <i>The legislation was repealed five months later.</i>
<u>repudiate</u>	Reject as untrue, unfounded, or unjust. <i>She has repudiated policies associated with previous party leaders.</i>

repudiation	Refusal to fulfil or discharge an agreement, obligation, or debt. <i>A repudiation of left wing political ideas.</i>
rescind	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually rescinded the directive.</i>
rescission	(law) the act of rescinding; the cancellation of a contract and the return of the parties to the positions they would have had if the contract had not been made. <i>The plaintiff agreed to the rescission of the agreement.</i>
revocable	Capable of being revoked or annulled. <i>A revocable settlement.</i>
<u>revoke</u>	Cancel officially. <i>He revoked the ban on smoking.</i>
<u>veto</u>	A rejection by right of veto. <i>I vetoed the idea of a holiday.</i>
