raising	Helping someone grow up to be an accepted member of the community. <i>A raising of the land resulting from volcanic activity.</i>
rearing	The properties acquired as a consequence of the way you were treated as a child.
tending	The work of providing treatment for or attending to someone or something.
training	The action of teaching a person or animal a particular skill or type of behaviour. <i>In service training for staff.</i>
<u>upbringing</u>	The treatment and instruction received by a child from its parents throughout its childhood. <i>He was a countryman by upbringing.</i>

<u>forward</u>	Send (a letter or email) on to a further destination. <i>Forward my mail.</i>
<u>foster</u>	Bring up under fosterage of children. <i>The teacher s task is to foster learning.</i>
<u>fuel</u>	Supply or power an industrial plant vehicle or machine with fuel. <i>Petrol may have been used to fuel the fire.</i>
<u>further</u>	Promote the growth of. <i>He had depended on using them to further his own career.</i>
help	Help to some food help with food or drink. <i>Just help yourself if you need anything.</i>

strengthen	Give a healthy elasticity to. <i>His body strengthened.</i>
support	Be the physical support of carry the weight of. <i>The scholarship supported me when I was in college.</i>

mongrel	An inferior dog or one of mixed breed. <i>She s a particularly intelligent mongrel with a lot of collie in her.</i>
mounting	The action of mounting something. <i>He pulled the curtain rail from its mounting.</i>
overindulgence	Excessive indulgence. <i>The child was spoiled by overindulgence.</i>
<u>parent</u>	Be or act as a parent to a child. <i>The parents of the bride.</i>
pregnant	(of a woman or female animal) having a child or young developing in the uterus. <i>A silence pregnant with suspense.</i>
produce	Bring onto the market or release. <i>These chemicals produce a noxious vapor.</i>
propagation	The action of widely spreading and promoting an idea, theory, etc. <i>Asexual propagation is the primary mode of reproduction.</i>

raise	Raise the level or amount of something. <i>They raised pigs and kept a pony.</i>
raising	Increasing in quantity or value. <i>A cost raising increase in the basic wage rate.</i>
rearing	Rearing on left hind leg with forelegs elevated and head usually in profile.
reproduction	Copy that is not the original; something that has been copied. <i>The design was changed to allow louder reproduction.</i>
skyrocket	Shoot up abruptly, like a rocket. <i>The cost of the welfare system has skyrocketed.</i>
spawn	Lay spawn. <i>A supplier of spawn for shiitake mushrooms.</i>
upbringing	Helping someone grow up to be an accepted member of the community. <i>He was a countryman by upbringing.</i>
uplift	A rise of land to a higher elevation (as in the process of mountain building). <i>The refreshing smell of essential oils like lavender and peppermint can instantly uplift your mood.</i>
