Obedient as an Adjective

Definitions of "Obedient" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “obedient” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Complying or willing to comply with an order or request; submissive to another's authority.*
- *Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority.*
- *Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority.*



Synonyms of "Obedient" as an adjective (4 Words)

acquiescent Ready to accept something without protest, or to do what someone else wants.

*His **acquiescent** mood.*

amenable Readily reacting to suggestions and influences.
*Someone **amenable** to the instruction of others.*

compliant Having the property of compliance.
*Children **compliant** with the parental will.*

tractable Responsive to suggestions and influences.
***Tractable** young minds.*



Usage Examples of "Obedient" as an adjective

- *A docile and obedient dog.*
- *The obedient colonies...are heavily taxed; the refractory remain unburdened.*
- *Obedient children.*
- *Children are taught to be obedient to their parents.*
- *An obedient soldier.*
- *A little man obedient to his wife.*



Associations of "Obedient" (30 Words)

acquiescent	Willing to carry out the orders or wishes of another without protest. <i>Too acquiescent to challenge authority.</i>
agreeable	Willing to agree to something. <i>Agreeable to the plan.</i>
allegiant	Steadfast in devotion (especially to your lawful monarch or government). <i>It is impossible to be allegiant to two opposing forces.</i>
amenable	Open and responsive to suggestion; easily persuaded or controlled. <i>The tumor was not amenable to surgical treatment.</i>
bowed	Of a stringed instrument; sounded by stroking with a bow.
butler	English poet (1612-1680).
compliant	Meeting or in accordance with rules or standards. <i>Food that is compliant with safety regulations.</i>

conformable	Quick to comply-Shakespeare. <i>Plans conformable with your wishes.</i>
controllable	Capable of being controlled. <i>The glider was fully controllable.</i>
<u>docile</u>	Willing to be taught or led or supervised or directed. <i>A gentle old horse docile and obedient.</i>
dutiful	Willingly obedient out of a sense of duty and respect. <i>A dutiful child.</i>
enslave	Make (someone) a slave. <i>They were enslaved by their need to take drugs.</i>
factotum	A servant employed to do a variety of jobs. <i>He was employed as the general factotum.</i>
follow	Accept and follow the leadership or command or guidance of. <i>He follows Aristotle in believing this.</i>
footman	A man employed as a servant in a large establishment (as a palace) to run errands and do chores.
<u>housekeeper</u>	A person employed to perform cleaning and other domestic tasks in a hotel or institution.
<u>loyal</u>	Unwavering in devotion to friend or vow or cause- Campaign song for William Henry Harrison. <i>Loyal subjects.</i>
loyalty	The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action. <i>His extreme loyalty to the Crown.</i>
<u>malleable</u>	Capable of being shaped or bent or drawn out. <i>A malleable metal can be beaten into a sheet.</i>
<u>manageable</u>	Capable of being managed or controlled. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and manageable.</i>
<u>obedience</u>	The trait of being willing to obey. <i>Vows of poverty chastity and obedience.</i>
<u>obey</u>	Submit to the authority of (someone) or comply with (a law). <i>When the order was repeated he refused to obey.</i>
<u>servant</u>	A person who performs duties for others, especially a person employed in a house on domestic duties or as a personal attendant. <i>The state cannot be a servant of the church.</i>
submissive	Abjectly submissive characteristic of a slave or servant S H Adams. <i>Replacing troublemakers with more submissive people.</i>

subservience Abject or cringing submissiveness.
*Blind **subservience** to authority.*

subservient Abjectly submissive; characteristic of a slave or servant.
*She has become submissive and **subservient**.*

tame Make less strong or intense; soften.
*Wild rabbits can be kept in captivity and eventually **tamed**.*

tractability The trait of being easily persuaded.

tractable Readily reacting to suggestions and influences.
*She has always been **tractable** and obedient even as a child.*

willing The act of making a choice.
*He was quite **willing** to compromise.*
