broad in the beam	Not detailed or specific.
<u>chubby</u>	Sufficiently fat so as to have a pleasing fullness of figure. <i>A chubby child.</i>
dumpy	Resembling a garbage dump. <i>A dumpy little dumpling of a woman.</i>
falstaffian	Of or resembling Falstaff.
flabby	(of a part of a person's body) soft, loose, and fleshy. <i>Flabby around the middle.</i>
heavy	Large and powerful especially designed for heavy loads or rough work. <i>A heavy smoker.</i>
large	Fairly large or important in effect influential. <i>A large family.</i>

meaty	Being on topic and prompting thought. <i>The tall meaty young man.</i>
of ample proportions	Fairly large.
overweight	Having more investment in a particular area than is normal or desirable. <i>An overweight lorry.</i>
<u>paunchy</u>	Having a large belly. <i>A slightly paunchy balding middle aged man.</i>
<u>plump</u>	Having a full rounded shape. <i>The berries were plump and sweet.</i>
portly	Of a stately or dignified appearance and manner. <i>Men are portly and women are stout.</i>
rotund	(of speech or literary style) sonorous; grandiloquent. <i>The rotund and reverberating phrase.</i>
<u>solid</u>	Of good quality and condition solidly built. <i>Carved out of solid rock.</i>
<u>stout</u>	Having rugged physical strength; inured to fatigue or hardships. <i>Men are portly and women are stout.</i>
weighty	Of great seriousness and importance. <i>A weighty argument.</i>

- *One in ten people surveyed were obese.*
- *A hugely obese young man.*

adipose	Composed of animal fat. <i>Adipose tissue constitutes the fat of meat.</i>
avaricious	Having or showing an extreme greed for wealth or material gain. <i>They are avaricious and will do anything for money.</i>
belly	A pig's belly as food especially as a traded commodity. <i>His fat belly stuck out over his trousers.</i>
blubber	Cry or whine with snuffling. <i>My six pack is quickly being covered in blubber.</i>
buxom	(of a woman) plump, with a full figure and large breasts. <i>A generation ago buxom actresses were popular.</i>
chubby	Plump and rounded. <i>A chubby child.</i>
dietary	Of or relating to the diet. <i>Dietary restrictions.</i>
fat	Containing much fat. <i>The hogs have been fattening.</i>
fatten	Make or become fat or fatter. <i>Irish cattle fatten up quickly.</i>
fatty	Containing or composed of fat. <i>Fatty degeneration of the liver.</i>
fleshy	Of or relating to or resembling flesh. <i>Her fleshy arms.</i>
gobble	Use a large amount of (something) very quickly. <i>This small department was gobbled up by the Ministry of Transport.</i>
heavy	Large and powerful especially designed for heavy loads or rough work. <i>Heavy taxes.</i>
hypodermic	A piston syringe that is fitted with a hypodermic needle for giving injections. <i>The hypodermics left strewn around the piazza.</i>
nutritious	Efficient as food; nourishing. <i>Home cooked burgers make a nutritious meal.</i>
obesity	The state of being grossly fat or overweight. <i>The problem of obesity among children.</i>
overeate	Overeat or eat immodestly make a pig of oneself. <i>If your friends overeate you're more likely to overeate too.</i>

overweight	Having more investment in a particular area than is normal or desirable. <i>We have overweighted the banking sector.</i>
paunch	Disembowel (an animal). <i>His body was powerful and square with the beginnings of a paunch.</i>
<u>paunchy</u>	Having a large or protruding belly. <i>A slightly paunchy balding middle aged man.</i>
<u>plump</u>	Make fat or plump. <i>I was running from the kitchen to the living room plumping the cushions and getting drinks in place.</i>
portly	Euphemisms for `fat. <i>A portly little man with a bowler hat.</i>
pudgy	Short and plump. <i>His pudgy fingers.</i>
reducing	Any process in which electrons are added to an atom or ion as by removing oxygen or adding hydrogen always occurs accompanied by oxidation of the reducing agent. <i>A doctor supervised her reducing.</i>
rotund	Full and rich. <i>Huge stoves held great rotund cauldrons.</i>
<u>stout</u>	A kind of strong, dark beer brewed with roasted malt or barley. <i>Stout walking boots.</i>
<u>swollen</u>	Characteristic of false pride; having an exaggerated sense of self-importance. <i>So swollen by victory that he was unfit for normal duty.</i>
tubby	Short and plump. <i>A small tubby man.</i>
<u>weight</u>	Assign a handicap weight to a horse. <i>His opinion carries great weight.</i>
