<b>accept</b>	Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>The cow <b>accepted</b> the bull.</i>
<b>accept orders from</b>	Consider or hold as true.
<b>acquiesce in</b>	To agree or express agreement.
<b>act in accordance with</b>	Perform an action, or work out or perform (an action).
<b>act on</b>	Play a role or part.
<b>adhere to</b>	Be compatible or in accordance with.
<b>agree to</b>	Consent or assent to a condition or agree to do something.
<b>be dutiful to</b>	Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.
<b>carry follow the orders of</b>	Pass on a communication.

<b>carry out</b>	Behave in a certain manner.
<b>carry out the orders of</b>	Secure the passage or adoption (of bills and motions).
<b>comply with</b>	Act in accordance with someone's rules, commands, or wishes.
<b>conform to</b>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions.
<b>consent to</b>	Give an affirmative reply to; respond favorably to.
<b>discharge</b>	Go off or discharge. <i>He <b>discharged</b> his resentment in the harmless form of memoirs.</i>
<b>do what someone says</b>	Behave in a certain manner; show a certain behavior; conduct or comport oneself.
<b>execute</b>	Carry out the legalities of. <i>The President <b>executed</b> the treaty.</i>
<b>follow</b>	Accept and follow the leadership or command or guidance of. <i>They <b>follow</b> their March show with four UK dates next month.</i>
<b><u>fulfil</u></b>	Carry out (a duty or role) as required, promised, or expected. <i>Arts grants go to young people who say they wish to <b>fulfil</b> themselves.</i>
<b>heed</b>	Pay close attention to give heed to. <i>He should have <b>heeded</b> the warnings.</i>
<b>implement</b>	Ensure observance of laws and rules. <i>The scheme to <b>implement</b> student loans.</i>
<b>keep to</b>	Stick to correctly or closely.
<b>meet</b>	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>In the final group match England will <b>meet</b> the Australians.</i>
<b><u>observe</u></b>	Observe with care or pay close attention to. <i>Relations gather to <b>observe</b> the funeral rites.</i>
<b>perform</b>	Give a performance of something. <i>The car <b>performs</b> well at low speeds.</i>
<b>put into effect</b>	Arrange thoughts, ideas, temporal events.
<b>respect</b>	Show respect towards. <i>She was <b>respected</b> by everyone she worked with.</i>
<b>stick to</b>	Stick to firmly.
<b>take orders from</b>	Take into one's possession.

- *The officer was convicted for refusing to obey orders.*
- *The universe was complex but it obeyed certain rules.*

<b>abidance</b>	Acting according to certain accepted standards.
<b>acquiesce</b>	To agree or express agreement. <i>Sara <b>acquiesced</b> in his decision.</i>
<b><u>admiration</u></b>	A feeling of delighted approval and liking. <i>A small token in <b>admiration</b> of your works.</i>
<b><u>adoration</u></b>	A feeling of profound love and admiration. <i>It was enough to earn him the <b>adoration</b> of the fans.</i>
<b><u>amenable</u></b>	Responsive to suggestions and influences. <i>Someone <b>amenable</b> to the instruction of others.</i>
<b>compliance</b>	Acting according to certain accepted standards. <i>The ways in which the state maintains order and <b>compliance</b>.</i>
<b><u>conformity</u></b>	Compliance with standards, rules, or laws. <i>These changes are intended to ensure <b>conformity</b> between all schemes.</i>
<b><u>deference</u></b>	A courteous expression (by word or deed) of esteem or regard. <i>In <b>deference</b> to your wishes.</i>
<b><u>enjoin</u></b>	Issue an injunction. <i>The code <b>enjoined</b> members to trade fairly.</i>
<b>follow</b>	Follow in or as if in pursuit. <i>Her bad deed <b>followed</b> her and haunted her dreams all her life.</i>
<b><u>gladly</u></b>	In a willing manner. <i>I would have <b>gladly</b> paid for it.</i>
<b><u>homage</u></b>	Respectful deference. <i>Daniel s films were a <b>homage</b> to her.</i>
<b>injunction</b>	(law) a judicial remedy issued in order to prohibit a party from doing or continuing to do a certain activity. <i><b>Injunction</b> were formerly obtained by writ but now by a judicial order.</i>
<b><u>obedience</u></b>	Behavior intended to please your parents. <i><b>Obedience</b> to moral standards.</i>
<b><u>obedient</u></b>	Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority. <i><b>Obedient</b> children.</i>
<b>obeisance</b>	The act of obeying; dutiful or submissive behavior with respect to another person. <i>She made a deep <b>obeisance</b>.</i>

<b>reverence</b>	Regard with feelings of respect and reverence consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of. <i>The messenger made his <b>reverence</b>.</i>
<b>reverent</b>	Feeling or showing profound respect or veneration. <i>A <b>reverent</b> silence.</i>
<b>reverential</b>	Of the nature of, due to, or characterized by reverence. <i>Their names are always mentioned in <b>reverential</b> tones.</i>
<b>slavish</b>	Abjectly submissive; characteristic of a slave or servant- S.H.Adams. <i>A <b>slavish</b> adherence to protocol.</i>
<b>subjection</b>	The act of conquering. <i>The country's <b>subjection</b> to European colonialism.</i>
<b>submission</b>	Something (manuscripts or architectural plans and models or estimates or works of art of all genres etc.) submitted for the judgment of others (as in a competition). <i>They were forced into <b>submission</b>.</i>
<b>submissive</b>	Abjectly submissive characteristic of a slave or servant S H Adams. <i>A <b>submissive</b> almost sheeplike people.</i>
<b>subservience</b>	The condition of being something that is useful in reaching an end or carrying out a plan. <i>All his actions were in <b>subservience</b> to the general plan.</i>
<b>subservient</b>	Prepared to obey others unquestioningly. <i>She has become submissive and <b>subservient</b>.</i>
<b>succumb</b>	Be fatally overwhelmed. <i>We cannot merely give up and <b>succumb</b> to despair.</i>
<b>venerate</b>	Regard with great respect; revere. <i>Philip of Beverley was <b>venerated</b> as a saint.</i>
<b>veneration</b>	A feeling of profound respect for someone or something. <i>His respect for the law bordered on <b>veneration</b>.</i>
<b>willing</b>	Disposed or inclined toward. <i>A <b>willing</b> participant.</i>
<b>willingly</b>	Readily; of one's own free will. <i>I <b>willingly</b> accept.</i>
