## Objectify as a Verb

### Definitions of "Objectify" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “objectify” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Degrade to the status of a mere object.*
- *Make external or objective, or give reality to.*
- *Make impersonal or present as an object.*
- *Express (something abstract) in a concrete form.*

- exteriorise** Make external or objective, or give reality to.

- externalise** Regard as objective.
- externalize** Express (a thought or feeling) in words or actions.

<b>automat</b>	A cafeteria in which food and drink were obtained from slot machines.
<b>brand</b>	To accuse or condemn or openly or formally or brand as disgraceful. <i>The firm will market computer software under its own <b>brand</b>.</i>
<b>capacity</b>	The amount of information (in bytes) that can be stored on a disk drive. <i>Among his gifts is his <b>capacity</b> for true altruism.</i>
<b>commercialization</b>	The act of commercializing something; involving something in commerce. <i>My father considered the <b>commercialization</b> of Christmas to be a sacrilege.</i>
<b>commodity</b>	A useful or valuable thing. <i><b>Commodity</b> markets.</i>
<b>consequence</b>	Importance or relevance. <i>His decision had depressing <b>consequences</b> for business.</i>
<u><b>consumer</b></u>	A person who uses goods or services. <i><b>Consumer</b> demand.</i>
<u><b>deliverable</b></u>	A thing able to be provided, especially as a product of a development process. <i>Under this contract the <b>deliverables</b> include both software and hardware.</i>
<b>disposal</b>	The action or process of getting rid of something. <i><b>Disposals</b> of fixed and non current assets.</i>
<b>externalize</b>	Project (a mental image or process) on to a figure outside oneself. <i>Language <b>externalizes</b> our thoughts.</i>
<b>freshness</b>	(with reference to wind) the quality of being cool and fairly strong. <i>She has retained the <b>freshness</b> of face that was there at her debut.</i>
<b>fungible</b>	(of goods contracted for without an individual specimen being specified) replaceable by another identical item; mutually interchangeable. <i>It is by no means the world s only <b>fungible</b> commodity.</i>
<b>grocery</b>	Items of food sold in a grocery or supermarket. <i>The <b>grocery</b> store included a meat market.</i>
<b>infomercial</b>	A television commercial presented in the form of a short documentary.

<b>item</b>	Used to introduce each item in a list. <i>She had several <b>items</b> on her shopping list.</i>
<b>making</b>	Usually plural the components needed for making or doing something. <i>The <b>making</b> of measurements.</i>
<b>manufacturer</b>	A person or company that makes goods for sale. <i>The <b>manufacturers</b> supply the goods to the distribution centre.</i>
<b>marketable</b>	Fit to be offered for sale. <i>The flotation will make the shares <b>marketable</b>.</i>
<b>marrow</b>	The plant of the gourd family which produces marrows. <i>Such men were the <b>marrow</b> of the organization.</i>
<b>merchandise</b>	Trade or traffic in (something), especially inappropriately. <i>Anyone who is not of that Guild may not <b>merchandise</b> with them.</i>
<b><u>portfolio</u></b>	Denoting or engaged in an employment pattern which involves a succession of short-term contracts and part-time work, rather than the more traditional model of a single job for life. <i>He took on the Foreign Affairs <b>portfolio</b>.</i>
<b>product</b>	A person whose character and identity have been formed by a particular period or situation. <i>His reaction was the <b>product</b> of hunger and fatigue.</i>
<b>promotional</b>	Of or relating to serving as publicity. <i>She was on a <b>promotional</b> tour for her books.</i>
<b>salable</b>	Capable of being sold; fit for sale.
<b>squander</b>	Spend extravagantly. <i>100m of taxpayers money has been <b>squandered</b> on administering the tax.</i>
<b>stuff</b>	Fill with a stuffing while cooking. <i><b>Stuff</b> the diet.</i>
<b>thing</b>	Used to express one's disapproval of or contempt for something. <i><b>Things</b> haven't gone entirely to plan.</i>
<b>trading</b>	The action or activity of buying and selling goods and services. <i><b>Trading</b> profits leapt.</i>
<b>vendible</b>	Fit to be offered for sale.
<b>ware</b>	Articles of the same kind or material usually used in combination silverware software. <i>Crystal <b>ware</b>.</i>
