absence of bias	Failure to be present.
absence of prejudice	The time interval during which something or somebody is away.
detachment	The state of being objective or aloof. <i>A truck containing a detachment of villagers.</i>
<u>disinterest</u>	Tolerance attributable to a lack of involvement. <i>I do not claim any scholarly disinterest with this book.</i>
disinterestedness	Freedom from bias or from selfish motives.
dispassion	Lack of strong emotion or personal feelings. <i>Scientists need to maintain their dispassion and objectivity.</i>
dispassionateness	Objectivity and detachment.
fair-mindedness	Ability to make judgments free from discrimination or dishonesty.

fairness

The quality of having light-coloured hair or a pale complexion.
*The maiden allows her **fairness** to lead her to trouble.*

impartiality

An inclination to weigh both views or opinions equally.
*Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure **impartiality** in the judging process.*

justice

A public official authorized to decide questions brought before a court of justice.
*A concern for **justice** peace and genuine respect for people.*

justness

The quality of being just or fair.
*It was performed with **justness** and beauty.*

neutrality

Nonparticipation in a dispute or war.
*The clinical **neutrality** of the description.*

objectiveness

Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices.

Associations of "Objectivity" (30 Words)

achromatic	Relating to, using, or denoting lenses that transmit light without separating it into constituent colours. <i>Achromatic microscopes.</i>
asexual	(of a person) having no sexual feelings or desires, or not sexually attracted to anyone. <i>An asexual spore.</i>
balance	A weight that balances another weight. <i>He took what he wanted and I got the balance.</i>
contextual	Depending on or relating to the circumstances that form the setting for an event, statement, or idea. <i>They have limited practice in working out the meaning of unfamiliar material from contextual clues.</i>
counterbalance	A weight that balances another weight. <i>The extra cost of mail order may be counterbalanced by its convenience.</i>
disinterest	Lack of interest in something. <i>I do not claim any scholarly disinterest with this book.</i>
disinterested	Not influenced by considerations of personal advantage. <i>A banker is under an obligation to give disinterested advice.</i>
dispassion	Lack of strong emotion or personal feelings. <i>Try to look upon the war with dispassion and detachment.</i>
dispassionate	Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice. <i>She dealt with life's disasters in a calm dispassionate way.</i>
empiricism	(philosophy) the doctrine that knowledge derives from experience.
equilibrium	A calm state of mind. <i>Ice is in equilibrium with water.</i>
equipoise	Balance or counterbalance (something). <i>This temporary equipoise of power.</i>
equity	A branch of law that developed alongside common law and is concerned with fairness and justice, formerly administered in special courts. <i>He owns 62% of the group's equity.</i>
even	Make or become even. <i>Had a fifty-fifty or even chance.</i>
fair	Without favoring one party in a fair evenhanded manner. <i>A fair referee.</i>

impartial	Treating all rivals or disputants equally. <i>The impartial eye of a scientist.</i>
impartiality	Equal treatment of all rivals or disputants; fairness. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure impartiality in the judging process.</i>
impersonal	Having no personal preference. <i>An impersonal corporation.</i>
intermediate	A person at an intermediate level of knowledge or skill. <i>An intermediate course.</i>
justice	A public official authorized to decide questions brought before a court of justice. <i>A concern for justice peace and genuine respect for people.</i>
materialism	A tendency to consider material possessions and physical comfort as more important than spiritual values. <i>They hated the sinful materialism of the wicked city.</i>
median	Denoting the middle term or mean of the middle two terms of a series arranged in order of magnitude For example the median number of the series 55 62 76 85 93 is 76. <i>The median value of 17 20 and 36 is 20.</i>
neutral	An electrically neutral point terminal conductor or wire. <i>Neutral soil conditions.</i>
neutrality	Tolerance attributable to a lack of involvement. <i>During the war Switzerland maintained its neutrality.</i>
positivism	A humanistic religious system founded on positivism.
rationalism	The theological doctrine that human reason rather than divine revelation establishes religious truth. <i>Scientific rationalism.</i>
symmetry	The property of being isotropic; having the same value when measured in different directions. <i>The overall symmetry makes the poem pleasant to the ear.</i>
unbiased	Showing no prejudice for or against something; impartial. <i>They give clear unbiased advice.</i>
unprejudiced	Not having or showing a dislike or distrust based on fixed or preconceived ideas. <i>An unprejudiced reading of the New Testament.</i>
utilitarianism	The doctrine that an action is right in so far as it promotes happiness, and that the greatest happiness of the greatest number should be the guiding principle of conduct.
