## Synonyms of "Objectivity" as a noun (14 Words)

<b>absence of bias</b>	Failure to be present.
<b>absence of prejudice</b>	The time interval during which something or somebody is away.
<b>detachment</b>	The state of being objective or aloof. <i>A truck containing a <b>detachment</b> of villagers.</i>
<b><u>disinterest</u></b>	Tolerance attributable to a lack of involvement. <i>I do not claim any scholarly <b>disinterest</b> with this book.</i>
<b>disinterestedness</b>	Freedom from bias or from selfish motives.
<b>dispassion</b>	Lack of strong emotion or personal feelings. <i>Scientists need to maintain their <b>dispassion</b> and objectivity.</i>
<b>dispassionateness</b>	Objectivity and detachment.
<b>fair-mindedness</b>	Ability to make judgments free from discrimination or dishonesty.

**fairness**

The quality of having light-coloured hair or a pale complexion.  
*The maiden allows her **fairness** to lead her to trouble.*

**impartiality**

An inclination to weigh both views or opinions equally.  
*Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure **impartiality** in the judging process.*

**justice**

A public official authorized to decide questions brought before a court of justice.  
*A concern for **justice** peace and genuine respect for people.*

**justness**

The quality of being just or fair.  
*It was performed with **justness** and beauty.*

**neutrality**

Nonparticipation in a dispute or war.  
*The clinical **neutrality** of the description.*

**objectiveness**

Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices.

## Associations of "Objectivity" (30 Words)

<b>achromatic</b>	Relating to, using, or denoting lenses that transmit light without separating it into constituent colours. <i><b>Achromatic</b> microscopes.</i>
<b>asexual</b>	(of a person) having no sexual feelings or desires, or not sexually attracted to anyone. <i>An <b>asexual</b> spore.</i>
<b>balance</b>	A weight that balances another weight. <i>He took what he wanted and I got the <b>balance</b>.</i>
<b>contextual</b>	Depending on or relating to the circumstances that form the setting for an event, statement, or idea. <i>They have limited practice in working out the meaning of unfamiliar material from <b>contextual</b> clues.</i>
<b>counterbalance</b>	A weight that balances another weight. <i>The extra cost of mail order may be <b>counterbalanced</b> by its convenience.</i>
<b>disinterest</b>	Lack of interest in something. <i>I do not claim any scholarly <b>disinterest</b> with this book.</i>
<b>disinterested</b>	Not influenced by considerations of personal advantage. <i>A banker is under an obligation to give <b>disinterested</b> advice.</i>
<b>dispassion</b>	Lack of strong emotion or personal feelings. <i>Try to look upon the war with <b>dispassion</b> and detachment.</i>
<b>dispassionate</b>	Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice. <i>She dealt with life's disasters in a calm <b>dispassionate</b> way.</i>
<b>empiricism</b>	(philosophy) the doctrine that knowledge derives from experience.
<b>equilibrium</b>	A calm state of mind. <i>Ice is in <b>equilibrium</b> with water.</i>
<b>equipoise</b>	Balance or counterbalance (something). <i>This temporary <b>equipoise</b> of power.</i>
<b>equity</b>	A branch of law that developed alongside common law and is concerned with fairness and justice, formerly administered in special courts. <i>He owns 62% of the group's <b>equity</b>.</i>
<b>even</b>	Make or become even. <i>Had a fifty-fifty or <b>even</b> chance.</i>
<b>fair</b>	Without favoring one party in a fair evenhanded manner. <i>A <b>fair</b> referee.</i>

<b>impartial</b>	Treating all rivals or disputants equally. <i>The <b>impartial</b> eye of a scientist.</i>
<b>impartiality</b>	Equal treatment of all rivals or disputants; fairness. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure <b>impartiality</b> in the judging process.</i>
<b>impersonal</b>	Having no personal preference. <i>An <b>impersonal</b> corporation.</i>
<b>intermediate</b>	A person at an intermediate level of knowledge or skill. <i>An <b>intermediate</b> course.</i>
<b>justice</b>	A public official authorized to decide questions brought before a court of justice. <i>A concern for <b>justice</b> peace and genuine respect for people.</i>
<b>materialism</b>	A tendency to consider material possessions and physical comfort as more important than spiritual values. <i>They hated the sinful <b>materialism</b> of the wicked city.</i>
<b>median</b>	Denoting the middle term or mean of the middle two terms of a series arranged in order of magnitude For example the median number of the series 55 62 76 85 93 is 76. <i>The <b>median</b> value of 17 20 and 36 is 20.</i>
<b>neutral</b>	An electrically neutral point terminal conductor or wire. <i><b>Neutral</b> soil conditions.</i>
<b>neutrality</b>	Tolerance attributable to a lack of involvement. <i>During the war Switzerland maintained its <b>neutrality</b>.</i>
<b>positivism</b>	A humanistic religious system founded on positivism.
<b>rationalism</b>	The theological doctrine that human reason rather than divine revelation establishes religious truth. <i>Scientific <b>rationalism</b>.</i>
<b>symmetry</b>	The property of being isotropic; having the same value when measured in different directions. <i>The overall <b>symmetry</b> makes the poem pleasant to the ear.</i>
<b>unbiased</b>	Showing no prejudice for or against something; impartial. <i>They give clear <b>unbiased</b> advice.</i>
<b>unprejudiced</b>	Not having or showing a dislike or distrust based on fixed or preconceived ideas. <i>An <b>unprejudiced</b> reading of the New Testament.</i>
<b>utilitarianism</b>	The doctrine that an action is right in so far as it promotes happiness, and that the greatest happiness of the greatest number should be the guiding principle of conduct.
