### **discharge**

A substance that has been discharged.

*The **discharge** of pus.*

The action or state of paying no attention to something.

*Blatant **disregard** for the law.*

<b>exoneration</b>	The action of officially absolving someone from blame; vindication. <i>The defendants eventual <b>exoneration</b>.</i>
<b>extinction</b>	No longer in existence. <i>He joined the chorus of those predicting the <b>extinction</b> of newsprint.</i>
<b>free pardon</b>	People who are free.
<b>general pardon</b>	A fact about the whole (as opposed to particular.
<b>inconspicuousness</b>	The quality of being not easily seen.
<b>insensibility</b>	Unconsciousness. <i>He drank until he was in a state of total <b>insensibility</b>.</i>
<b>insignificance</b>	The quality of having little or no significance. <i>He is aware of his own <b>insignificance</b> within the bigger picture.</i>
<b>lack of fame</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of honour</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of recognition</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of renown</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>limbo</b>	The state of being disregarded or forgotten. <i>The legal battle could leave the club in <b>limbo</b> until next year.</i>
<b>neglect</b>	The state of something that has been unused and neglected. <i>She was accused of child <b>neglect</b>.</i>
<b>nihility</b>	The state of nonexistence.
<b>nothingness</b>	The state of nonexistence. <i>The fear of the total <b>nothingness</b> of death.</i>
<b>nullity</b>	The state of being legally void or invalid, especially with reference to a marriage.
<b>obliviousness</b>	Total forgetfulness.
<b>obscurity</b>	The quality of being unclear or abstruse and hard to understand. <i>Poems of impenetrable <b>obscurity</b>.</i>
<b>release</b>	A document effecting a release of property money etc. <i>His current album <b>release</b> has topped the charts for six months.</i>
<b>reprieve</b>	The act of reprieving; postponing or remitting punishment. <i>A mother who faced eviction has been given a <b>reprieve</b>.</i>
<b>senselessness</b>	Total lack of meaning or ideas.
<b>stupefaction</b>	The action of stupefying; making dull or lethargic. <i>The professor was noted for his <b>stupefaction</b> of the students.</i>

stupor

The feeling of distress and disbelief that you have when something bad happens accidentally.

*Someone stole his wallet while he was in a drunken **stupor**.*

twilight

The period of the evening when twilight is visible between daylight and darkness.

*A pleasant walk in the woods at **twilight**.*

unconsciousness

The state of being unconscious.

*Someone gave me a crack across the head and I slipped into **unconsciousness**.*

unimportance

The state of being humble and unimportant.

*The relative **unimportance** of wider kin ties in British culture.*

vacuum

A vacuum cleaner.

*The political **vacuum** left by the death of the Emperor.*

void

An emptiness caused by the loss of something.

*The black **void** of space.*

## Associations of "Oblivion" (30 Words)

<b>amnesia</b>	Partial or total loss of memory. <i>They were suffering from <b>amnesia</b>.</i>
<b>bipolar</b>	Of a person suffering from bipolar disorder. <i>A sharply <b>bipolar</b> division of affluent and underclass.</i>
<b>coma</b>	(astronomy) the luminous cloud of particles surrounding the frozen nucleus of a comet; forms as the comet approaches the sun and is warmed. <i>After the film I settled into a <b>coma</b>.</i>
<b>dementia</b>	Mental deterioration of organic or functional origin.

<b>epilepsy</b>	A neurological disorder marked by sudden recurrent episodes of sensory disturbance, loss of consciousness, or convulsions, associated with abnormal electrical activity in the brain.
<b>forgetful</b>	Deficient in retentiveness or range. <i><b>Forgetful</b> of her responsibilities.</i>
<b>forgetfulness</b>	Lapse of memory. <i>His <b>forgetfulness</b> increased as he grew older.</i>
<b>frenetic</b>	Fast and energetic in a rather wild and uncontrolled way. <i>A <b>frenetic</b> pace of activity.</i>
<b>frenzy</b>	State of violent mental agitation. <i>Doreen worked herself into a <b>frenzy</b> of rage.</i>
<b>hallucination</b>	A mistaken or unfounded opinion or idea. <i>He refused to believe that the angel was a <b>hallucination</b>.</i>
<b>hysteria</b>	State of violent mental agitation. <i>The anti Semitic <b>hysteria</b> of the 1890s.</i>
<b>hysterical</b>	Extremely funny. <i>During <b>hysterical</b> conditions various functions of the human body are disordered.</i>
<b>illness</b>	A disease or period of sickness affecting the body or mind. <i>I ve never missed a day s work through <b>illness</b>.</i>
<b>impairment</b>	Damage that results in a reduction of strength or quality. <i>Hearing <b>impairment</b>.</i>
<b>insane</b>	Extremely foolish; irrational. <i><b>Insane</b> laughter.</i>
<b>limbo</b>	The state of being disregarded or forgotten. <i>The legal battle could leave the club in <b>limbo</b> until next year.</i>
<b>mania</b>	An irrational but irresistible motive for a belief or action. <i>He had a <b>mania</b> for automobiles.</i>
<b>manic</b>	(in psychiatry) relating to or affected by mania. <i>Outbursts of drunken violence and <b>manic</b> activity and creativity.</i>
<b>migraine</b>	A recurrent throbbing headache that typically affects one side of the head and is often accompanied by nausea and disturbed vision. <i>An attack of <b>migraine</b>.</i>
<b>neurosis</b>	A relatively mild mental illness that is not caused by organic disease, involving symptoms of stress (depression, anxiety, obsessive behaviour, hypochondria) but not a radical loss of touch with reality. <i>Freud s two stage account of <b>neurosis</b>.</i>

<b><u>paranoia</u></b>	Unjustified suspicion and mistrust of other people. <i>Mild <b>paranoia</b> afflicts all prime ministers.</i>
<b><u>paranoid</u></b>	A person who is paranoid. <i><b>Paranoid</b> schizophrenia.</i>
<b>psychiatrist</b>	A physician who specializes in psychiatry.
<b>psychosis</b>	A severe mental disorder in which thought and emotions are so impaired that contact is lost with external reality. <i>They were suffering from a <b>psychosis</b>.</i>
<b>schizophrenia</b>	Any of several psychotic disorders characterized by distortions of reality and disturbances of thought and language and withdrawal from social contact. <i>Gibraltar s <b>schizophrenia</b> continues to be fed by colonial pride.</i>
<b><u>senile</u></b>	(of a condition) characteristic of or caused by old age. <i><b>Senile</b> decay.</i>
<b>stun</b>	Make senseless or dizzy by or as if by a blow. <i>The community was <b>stunned</b> by the tragedy.</i>
<b><u>traumatic</u></b>	Psychologically painful. <i>Few experiences are more <b>traumatic</b> than losing a child.</i>
<b>unmindful</b>	Not conscious or aware. <i>While thus <b>unmindful</b> of his steps he stumbled.</i>
<b><u>vertigo</u></b>	A reeling sensation; a feeling that you are about to fall.
