annoying	Causing irritation or annoyance. Annoying habits.

awful	Inspiring reverential wonder or fear. This sea whose gently <b>awful</b> stirrings seem to speak of some hidden soul beneath.
detestable	Unequivocally detestable Edmund Burke. <i>Detestable vices.</i>
<u>disagreeable</u>	Not agreeing with your tastes or expectations. A <b>disagreeable</b> situation.
disgusting	Arousing revulsion or strong indignation. A <b>disgusting</b> smell.
displeasing	Causing annoyance or dissatisfaction; disagreeable. It was not entirely <b>displeasing</b> to be the centre of such a drama.
distasteful	Causing dislike or aversion; disagreeable or unpleasant. <i>He found such cynicism <b>distasteful</b>.</i>
distressing	Causing distress or worry or anxiety. Some very <b>distressing</b> news.
<u>dreadful</u>	Causing or involving great suffering, fear, or unhappiness; extremely bad or serious. <b>Dreadful</b> manners.
execrable	Deserving a curse. <i>Execrable</i> crimes.
hateful	Evoking or deserving hatred. A <b>hateful</b> thing to do.
horrible	Very unpleasant. The tea tasted <b>horrible</b> .
invidious	(of an action or situation) likely to arouse or incur resentment or anger in others. She d put herself in an <b>invidious</b> position.
irksome	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. What an <b>irksome</b> task the writing of long letters is.
irritating	Serving to stimulate or excite. An <b>irritating</b> child.
<u>miserable</u>	(of a person) wretchedly unhappy or uncomfortable. A <b>miserable</b> man in his late sixties.
<u>nasty</u>	Very bad or unpleasant. A <b>nasty</b> smell.
nauseating	Causing or able to cause nausea. Some <b>nauseating</b> sentimental ditty.



objectionable	Liable to objection or debate; used of something one might take exception to.
odious	Found the politician s views <b>objectionable</b> . Unequivocally detestable- Edmund Burke. <b>Odious</b> hypocrisy.
offensive	Morally offensive. The allegations made are deeply <b>offensive</b> to us.
repellent	Causing disgust or distaste. A water <b>repellent</b> fabric.
repugnant	Extremely distasteful; unacceptable. Cannibalism seems <b>repugnant</b> to us.
repulsive	Arousing intense distaste or disgust. A <b>repulsive</b> force.
<u>revolting</u>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. There was a <b>revolting</b> smell that lingered in the air.
terrible	Very unskilful. I was sick all night and felt <b>terrible</b> for two days.
<u>troublesome</u>	Causing difficulty or annoyance. A <b>troublesome</b> infection.
<u>uncomfortable</u>	Causing or feeling slight pain or physical discomfort. An <b>uncomfortable</b> silence.
<u>unpalatable</u>	Not pleasant or acceptable to the taste or mind. An <b>unpalatable</b> meal.
unsavoury	Disagreeable to taste, smell, or look at. An <b>unsavoury</b> reputation.
<u>vexatious</u>	Denoting an action or the bringer of an action that is brought without sufficient grounds for winning, purely to cause annoyance to the defendant. <i>The vexatious questions posed by software copyrights.</i>

# Associations of "Obnoxious" (30 Words)

aggravating	Making worse. She found him thoroughly <b>aggravating</b> and unprofessional.
annoying	The act of troubling or annoying someone. Tapping an <b>annoying</b> rhythm on his glass with his fork.
bother	Make confused or perplexed or puzzled. It <b>bother</b> ed me that I hadn t done anything.
bothersome	Causing irritation or annoyance. Aircraft noise is particularly <b>bothersome</b> near the airport.
brassy	Resembling the sound of a brass instrument. <i>Her <b>brassy</b> audacious exterior.</i>
detestable	Unequivocally detestable Edmund Burke. <i>Detestable vices.</i>
<u>disagreeable</u>	Not to your liking. Aspects of his work are <b>disagreeable</b> to him.
displeasing	Causing displeasure or lacking pleasing qualities. <i>Displeasing</i> news.
drone	A musical instrument or part of one sounding a continuous note of low pitch in particular also drone pipe a pipe in a bagpipe or also drone string a string in an instrument such as a hurdy gurdy or a sitar. <i>The</i> <b>drone</b> <i>rose by a third to A</i> .
galling	Causing irritation or annoyance. Found it <b>galling</b> to have to ask permission.
irritate	Cause inflammation or other discomfort in (a part of the body. <i>Irritate</i> the glands of a leaf.
irritating	Causing irritation to a body part. The substance may be <b>irritating</b> to eyes and skin.
<u>irritation</u>	The psychological state of being irritated or annoyed. Some chemicals cause a direct <b>irritation</b> to the skin leading to dermatitis.
libelous	Harmful and often untrue; tending to discredit or malign.
nuisance	A person or thing causing inconvenience or annoyance. It s a <b>nuisance</b> having all those people clomping through the house.
objectionable	Causing disapproval or protest. I find his theory <b>objectionable</b> in its racist undertones.
opprobrious	(of language) expressing scorn or criticism. <i>Opprobrious</i> remarks.



persiflage	Light and slightly contemptuous mockery or banter. An air of <b>persiflage</b> .
<u>pesky</u>	Causing irritation or annoyance. A <b>pesky</b> mosquito.
pique	Cause to feel resentment or indignation. <i>He left in a fit of <b>pique</b></i> .
repelling	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust.
ribald	A ribald person someone who uses vulgar and offensive language. <i>He was delighted at the <b>ribald</b> laughter that greeted his witticism.</i>
scurrilous	Humorously insulting. A very funny collection of bawdy and <b>scurrilous</b> writings.
<u>teasing</u>	Arousing sexual desire without intending to satisfy it. <i>The parody was just a form of <b>teasing</b></i> .
<u>tiresome</u>	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i>The <b>tiresome</b> chirping of a cricket.</i>
troublesome	Difficult to deal with. A <b>troublesome</b> infection.
unacceptable	Not adequate to give satisfaction. <i>Unacceptable</i> behaviour.
<u>unpalatable</u>	Not pleasant to taste. An <b>unpalatable</b> meal.
<u>unsavory</u>	Morally offensive. An <b>unsavory</b> reputation.
vexing	Causing irritation or annoyance. The most <b>vexing</b> questions for policymakers.
