**mania** respond excessively and sometimes violently.

Many people suffering from **mania** do not think anything is wrong.

Something that is desired intensely.

**passion**Modern furniture is a particular **passion** of Bill s.

The mental state of being preoccupied by something.

preoccupation His preoccupation with politics.

ruling passion The reason for a court's judgment (as opposed to the decision itself.

duress Forcible restraint or imprisonment.
