controlling	Able to control or determine policy. A controlling interest in the firm.
dominating	Used of a height or viewpoint. D day is considered the dominating event of the war in Europe.
excessive	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>He was drinking excessive amounts of brandy</i> .

<u>gripping</u>	Capable of arousing and holding the attention. A gripping TV thriller.	
<u>haunting</u>	Having a deeply disquieting or disturbing effect-Charles Lee. <i>Haunting memories.</i>	
in the grip of	Currently fashionable.	
<u>inescapable</u>	Impossible to avoid or evade. Political reform was inescapable .	
<u>neurotic</u>	Having, caused by, or relating to neurosis. <i>He seemed a neurotic self obsessed character.</i>	
obsessional	Characterized by or constituting an obsession. People with chronic obsessional behaviour.	
obsessive about	Characterized by or constituting an obsession.	
preoccupied by	Having or showing excessive or compulsive concern with something.	
preoccupied with	Deeply absorbed in thought.	
single-minded about On the move.		
tormenting	Inflicting severe physical or mental suffering. <i>Peace from his tormenting thoughts.</i>

hidebound	Unwilling or unable to change because of tradition or convention.
	They are working to change hidebound corporate cultures.
intransigence	The trait of being intransigent; stubbornly refusing to compromise. In the face of government intransigence he resigned in disgust.
intransigent	An intransigent person. An intransigent conservative opposed to every liberal tendency.
obduracy	Resoluteness by virtue of being unyielding and inflexible.
obdurate	Stubbornly refusing to change one's opinion or course of action. The child s misery would move even the most obdurate heart.
obstinate	Stubbornly refusing to change one's opinion or chosen course of action, despite attempts to persuade one to do so. Her obstinate determination to pursue a career in radio.
<u>ornery</u>	Bad-tempered or difficult to deal with. An ornery old military man.
persistence	The continued or prolonged existence of something. The persistence of huge environmental problems.
persistent	Continuing firmly or obstinately in an opinion or course of action in spite of difficulty or opposition. Persistent rain will affect many areas.
pertinacious	Stubbornly unyielding- T.S.Eliot. <i>He worked with a pertinacious resistance to interruptions.</i>
pertinacity	Persistent determination.
pigheaded	Obstinate and stupid.
preoccupation	The act of taking occupancy before someone else does. Their main preoccupation was how to feed their families.
recalcitrant	A person with an obstinately uncooperative attitude. A stiff necked recalcitrant and troublemaker.
<u>relentless</u>	Harsh or inflexible. A patient but relentless taskmaster.
stubborn	Difficult to move, remove, or cure. The removal of stubborn screws.
tenacious	Good at remembering. A tenacious local legend.
<u>unrelenting</u>	Punishingly harsh. The heat was unrelenting .
