<u>compulsive</u>	A person with a compulsive disposition someone who feels compelled to do certain things. A <b>compulsive</b> liar.
crotchety	Irritable. <i>He was tired and <b>crotchety</b>.</i>
determined	Determined or decided upon as by an authority. Helen was a <b>determined</b> little girl.
<u>disobedient</u>	Not obeying or complying with commands of those in authority. <i>Disobedient children.</i>
<u>dogged</u>	Stubbornly unyielding. <b>Dogged</b> persistence.
<u>enchantment</u>	A magical spell. A world of mystery and <b>enchantment</b> .
<u>fascination</u>	A feeling of great liking for something wonderful and unusual. <i>He held the children spellbound with magic tricks and other fascinations</i> .
<u>fetish</u>	An excessive and irrational devotion or commitment to a particular thing. <i>A man with a <b>fetish</b> for surgical masks.</i>
froward	Habitually disposed to disobedience and opposition.
headstrong	Habitually disposed to disobedience and opposition. The <b>headstrong</b> impulsiveness of youth.



hidebound	Stubbornly conservative and narrow-minded. They are working to change <b>hidebound</b> corporate cultures.
intransigence	The trait of being intransigent; stubbornly refusing to compromise. In the face of government <b>intransigence</b> he resigned in disgust.
intransigent	An intransigent person. Her father had tried persuasion but she was <b>intransigent</b> .
obduracy	Resoluteness by virtue of being unyielding and inflexible.
obdurate	Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing. The child s misery would move even the most <b>obdurate</b> heart.
obstinate	(of an unwelcome situation) very difficult to change or overcome. <i>Her <b>obstinate</b> determination to pursue a career in radio.</i>
<u>ornery</u>	Having a difficult and contrary disposition. An <b>ornery</b> old military man.
persistence	The property of a continuous and connected period of time. The <b>persistence</b> of huge environmental problems.
persistent	(of chemicals or radioactivity) remaining within the environment for a long time after introduction. <b>Persistent</b> leaves remain attached past maturity.
pertinacious	Holding firmly to an opinion or a course of action. <i>He worked with a <b>pertinacious</b> resistance to interruptions.</i>
pertinacity	Persistent determination.
pigheaded	Obstinate and stupid.
preoccupation	The act of taking occupancy before someone else does. Their main <b>preoccupation</b> was how to feed their families.
recalcitrant	Having an obstinately uncooperative attitude towards authority or discipline. The University suspended the most <b>recalcitrant</b> demonstrators.
<u>relentless</u>	Never-ceasing. A patient but <b>relentless</b> taskmaster.
stubborn	Having or showing dogged determination not to change one's attitude or position on something, especially in spite of good arguments or reasons to do so. A <b>stubborn</b> refusal to learn from experience.
tenacious	Sticking together. Men <b>tenacious</b> of opinion.
<u>unrelenting</u>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <b>Unrelenting</b> opponents.
