compulsively In a compulsive manner.
*She exercised **compulsively**.*

obsessionally In a compulsive manner.

- *He is obsessively focused on his career.*
- *She worries obsessively about her impending motherhood.*

<u>compulsive</u>	A person with a compulsive disposition someone who feels compelled to do certain things. <i>A compulsive liar.</i>
crotchety	Irritable. <i>He was tired and crotchety.</i>
determined	Determined or decided upon as by an authority. <i>Helen was a determined little girl.</i>
<u>disobedient</u>	Not obeying or complying with commands of those in authority. <i>Disobedient children.</i>
<u>dogged</u>	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>Dogged persistence.</i>
<u>enchantment</u>	A magical spell. <i>A world of mystery and enchantment.</i>
<u>fascination</u>	A feeling of great liking for something wonderful and unusual. <i>He held the children spellbound with magic tricks and other fascinations.</i>
<u>fetish</u>	An excessive and irrational devotion or commitment to a particular thing. <i>A man with a fetish for surgical masks.</i>
froward	Habitually disposed to disobedience and opposition.
headstrong	Habitually disposed to disobedience and opposition. <i>The headstrong impulsiveness of youth.</i>

hidebound	Stubbornly conservative and narrow-minded. <i>They are working to change hidebound corporate cultures.</i>
intransigence	The trait of being intransigent; stubbornly refusing to compromise. <i>In the face of government intransigence he resigned in disgust.</i>
intransigent	An intransigent person. <i>Her father had tried persuasion but she was intransigent.</i>
obduracy	Resoluteness by virtue of being unyielding and inflexible.
obdurate	Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing. <i>The child's misery would move even the most obdurate heart.</i>
obstinate	(of an unwelcome situation) very difficult to change or overcome. <i>Her obstinate determination to pursue a career in radio.</i>
<u>ornery</u>	Having a difficult and contrary disposition. <i>An ornery old military man.</i>
persistence	The property of a continuous and connected period of time. <i>The persistence of huge environmental problems.</i>
persistent	(of chemicals or radioactivity) remaining within the environment for a long time after introduction. <i>Persistent leaves remain attached past maturity.</i>
pertinacious	Holding firmly to an opinion or a course of action. <i>He worked with a pertinacious resistance to interruptions.</i>
pertinacity	Persistent determination.
pigheaded	Obstinate and stupid.
<u>preoccupation</u>	The act of taking occupancy before someone else does. <i>Their main preoccupation was how to feed their families.</i>
recalcitrant	Having an obstinately uncooperative attitude towards authority or discipline. <i>The University suspended the most recalcitrant demonstrators.</i>
<u>relentless</u>	Never-ceasing. <i>A patient but relentless taskmaster.</i>
stubborn	Having or showing dogged determination not to change one's attitude or position on something, especially in spite of good arguments or reasons to do so. <i>A stubborn refusal to learn from experience.</i>
tenacious	Sticking together. <i>Men tenacious of opinion.</i>
<u>unrelenting</u>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i>Unrelenting opponents.</i>

unrepentant Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing.
*He was **unrepentant** and said that his comments were completely accurate.*

unyielding Stubbornly unyielding T S Eliot.
*His **unyielding** faith.*
