**compulsively** In a compulsive manner.  
*She exercised **compulsively**.*

**obsessionally** In a compulsive manner.

<b><u>compulsive</u></b>	A person with a compulsive disposition someone who feels compelled to do certain things. <i>A <b>compulsive</b> liar.</i>
<b>crotchety</b>	Irritable. <i>He was tired and <b>crotchety</b>.</i>
<b>determined</b>	Determined or decided upon as by an authority. <i>Helen was a <b>determined</b> little girl.</i>
<b><u>disobedient</u></b>	Not obeying or complying with commands of those in authority. <i><b>Disobedient</b> children.</i>
<b><u>dogged</u></b>	Stubbornly unyielding. <i><b>Dogged</b> persistence.</i>
<b><u>enchantment</u></b>	A magical spell. <i>A world of mystery and <b>enchantment</b>.</i>
<b><u>fascination</u></b>	A feeling of great liking for something wonderful and unusual. <i>He held the children spellbound with magic tricks and other <b>fascinations</b>.</i>
<b><u>fetish</u></b>	An excessive and irrational devotion or commitment to a particular thing. <i>A man with a <b>fetish</b> for surgical masks.</i>
<b>froward</b>	Habitually disposed to disobedience and opposition.
<b>headstrong</b>	Habitually disposed to disobedience and opposition. <i>The <b>headstrong</b> impulsiveness of youth.</i>

<b>hidebound</b>	Stubbornly conservative and narrow-minded. <i>They are working to change <b>hidebound</b> corporate cultures.</i>
<b>intransigence</b>	The trait of being intransigent; stubbornly refusing to compromise. <i>In the face of government <b>intransigence</b> he resigned in disgust.</i>
<b>intransigent</b>	An intransigent person. <i>Her father had tried persuasion but she was <b>intransigent</b>.</i>
<b>obduracy</b>	Resoluteness by virtue of being unyielding and inflexible.
<b>obdurate</b>	Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing. <i>The child's misery would move even the most <b>obdurate</b> heart.</i>
<b>obstinate</b>	(of an unwelcome situation) very difficult to change or overcome. <i>Her <b>obstinate</b> determination to pursue a career in radio.</i>
<b>ornery</b>	Having a difficult and contrary disposition. <i>An <b>ornery</b> old military man.</i>
<b>persistence</b>	The property of a continuous and connected period of time. <i>The <b>persistence</b> of huge environmental problems.</i>
<b>persistent</b>	(of chemicals or radioactivity) remaining within the environment for a long time after introduction. <i><b>Persistent</b> leaves remain attached past maturity.</i>
<b>pertinacious</b>	Holding firmly to an opinion or a course of action. <i>He worked with a <b>pertinacious</b> resistance to interruptions.</i>
<b>pertinacity</b>	Persistent determination.
<b>pigheaded</b>	Obstinate and stupid.
<b>preoccupation</b>	The act of taking occupancy before someone else does. <i>Their main <b>preoccupation</b> was how to feed their families.</i>
<b>recalcitrant</b>	Having an obstinately uncooperative attitude towards authority or discipline. <i>The University suspended the most <b>recalcitrant</b> demonstrators.</i>
<b>relentless</b>	Never-ceasing. <i>A patient but <b>relentless</b> taskmaster.</i>
<b>stubborn</b>	Having or showing dogged determination not to change one's attitude or position on something, especially in spite of good arguments or reasons to do so. <i>A <b>stubborn</b> refusal to learn from experience.</i>
<b>tenacious</b>	Sticking together. <i>Men <b>tenacious</b> of opinion.</i>
<b>unrelenting</b>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i><b>Unrelenting</b> opponents.</i>

**unrepentant** Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing.  
*He was **unrepentant** and said that his comments were completely accurate.*

**unyielding** Stubbornly unyielding T S Eliot.  
*His **unyielding** faith.*
