
Obstruction as a Noun

- A thing that impedes or prevents passage or progress; an obstacle or blockage.
- Any structure that makes progress difficult.
- Blockage of a bodily passage, especially the gut.
- The physical condition of blocking or filling a passage with an obstruction.
- The action of obstructing or the state of being obstructed.
- The action of deliberately hindering the police in their duties.
- (in various sports) the action of unlawfully obstructing a player in the opposing team.
