<b>conquest</b>	A territory which has been subjugated by military force. <i>The <b>conquest</b> of inflation.</i>
<b><u>craft</u></b>	An aircraft or spaceship. <i>The <b>craft</b> of cobbling.</i>
<b>day job</b>	A period of opportunity.
<b><u>diversion</u></b>	A turning aside (of your course or attention or concern). <i>A <b>diversion</b> from the main highway.</i>
<b>divertissement</b>	A short dance within a ballet that displays a dancer's technical skill without advancing the plot or character development. <i>The intellectual <b>divertissements</b> of working men.</i>
<b>employment</b>	The occupation for which you are paid. <i>Economies can be made by the full <b>employment</b> of existing facilities.</i>
<b>entertainment</b>	An event, performance, or activity designed to entertain others. <i>The suite provides the setting for <b>entertainment</b> on the grand scale.</i>
<b><u>field</u></b>	The force exerted or potentially exerted in a field. <i>A <b>field</b> of corn.</i>
<b>habitation</b>	The fact of living in a particular place. <i>He studied the creation and <b>inhabitation</b> and demise of the colony.</i>
<b><u>hobby</u></b>	An early type of bicycle without pedals, propelled by pushing the feet against the ground. <i>Her hobbies are reading and gardening.</i>
<b>inhabitation</b>	The act of dwelling in or living permanently in a place (said of both animals and men). <i>He studied the creation and <b>inhabitation</b> and demise of the colony.</i>
<b>interest</b>	The selfish pursuit of one's own welfare self interest. <i>He counts reading among his <b>interests</b>.</i>
<b>invasion</b>	Any entry into an area not previously occupied. <i>An <b>invasion</b> of locusts.</i>
<b>job</b>	A workplace as in the expression on the job. <i>This feature allows your computer to queue print <b>jobs</b>.</i>
<b>lease</b>	Property that is leased or rented out or let. <i>A six month <b>lease</b> on a shop.</i>
<b>leisure activity</b>	Time available for ease and relaxation.

<b>line</b>	Space for one line of print one column wide and 1 14 inch deep used to measure advertising. <i>I ve got Inspector Jackson on the <b>line</b> for you.</i>
<b>line of business</b>	A conductor for transmitting electrical or optical signals or electric power.
<b>line of work</b>	A formation of people or things one behind another.
<b>living in</b>	People who are still living.
<b>military control</b>	The military forces of a nation.
<b>métier</b>	An asset of special worth or utility.
<b>occupancy</b>	The proportion of hotel or office accommodation occupied or used. <i>70 per cent <b>occupancy</b> is needed to give a profit.</i>
<b>overrunning</b>	Too much production or more than expected.
<b>pastime</b>	An activity that someone does regularly for enjoyment rather than work; a hobby. <i>Sailing is her favorite <b>pastime</b>.</i>
<b>position</b>	A condition or position in which you find yourself. <i>Moved from third to fifth <b>position</b>.</i>
<b>post</b>	The system whereby messages are transmitted via the post office. <i>Is there any <b>post</b> for me.</i>
<b><u>profession</u></b>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>A <b>profession</b> of disagreement.</i>
<b><u>province</u></b>	A principal administrative division of a country or empire. <i>It was his <b>province</b> to take care of himself.</i>
<b>pursuit</b>	A diversion that occupies one's time and thoughts (usually pleasantly). <i>Those whose business is the <b>pursuit</b> of knowledge.</i>
<b>recreation</b>	Activity done for enjoyment when one is not working. <i>For <b>recreation</b> he wrote poetry and solved crossword puzzles.</i>
<b><u>residence</u></b>	The fact of living in a particular place. <i>The palace was designated the official <b>residence</b> of the head of state.</i>
<b>residency</b>	The fact of living in a place. <i>He made contact with the KGB <b>residency</b> in Aden.</i>
<b>seizure</b>	A sudden attack of illness, especially a stroke or an epileptic fit. <i>The <b>seizure</b> of the Assembly building.</i>
<b>situation</b>	A set of circumstances in which one finds oneself; a state of affairs. <i>The unpleasant <b>situation</b> or position of having to choose between two evils.</i>

<b>skill</b>	Ability to produce solutions in some problem domain. <i>The <b>skill</b> of a well trained boxer.</i>
<b>subjection</b>	The act of conquering. <i>The country s <b>subjection</b> to European colonialism.</i>
<b><u>subjugation</u></b>	The act of subjugating by cruelty. <i>The fear of human <b>subjugation</b> by technology.</i>
<b>takeover</b>	A change by sale or merger in the controlling interest of a corporation. <i>A company threatened with <b>takeover</b>.</i>
<b>tenancy</b>	Possession of land or property as a tenant. <i>Holding took over the <b>tenancy</b> of the farm.</i>
<b>tenure</b>	Guaranteed permanent employment especially as a teacher or lecturer after a probationary period security of tenure. <i><b>Tenure</b> for university staff has been abolished.</i>
<b><u>trade</u></b>	A trade wind. <i>Players can demand a <b>trade</b> after five years of service.</i>
<b>vocation</b>	The particular occupation for which you are trained. <i>Not all of us have a <b>vocation</b> to be nurses or doctors.</i>
<b>walk of life</b>	A slow gait of a horse in which two feet are always on the ground.
<b>work</b>	A place where work is done. <i>A lot of people are out of <b>work</b>.</i>

<b>headhunter</b>	A savage who cuts off and preserves the heads of enemies as trophies. <i>A <b>headhunter</b> offering you a wonderful new position at a higher salary.</i>

<b>plumber</b>	A craftsman who installs and repairs pipes and fixtures and appliances.
<b>profession</b>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>After <b>profession</b> she taught in Maidenhead.</i>
<b>recruiter</b>	An official who enlists personnel for military service. <i>A <b>recruiter</b> will schedule you for an interview.</i>
<b>salesclerk</b>	A salesperson in a store.
<b>salesman</b>	A man whose job involves selling or promoting commercial products, either in a shop or visiting locations to get orders. <i>An insurance <b>salesman</b>.</i>

<b>subcontract</b>	Work under a subcontract engage in a subcontract. <i><b>Subcontract</b> work.</i>
<b>subcontractor</b>	Someone who enters into a subcontract with the primary contractor.
