### Definitions of "Ocean" as a noun

- *Anything apparently limitless in quantity or volume.*
- *A very large expanse or quantity.*
- *A large body of water constituting a principal part of the hydrosphere.*
- *The sea.*
- *A very large expanse of sea, in particular each of the main areas into which the sea is divided geographically.*

- a great amount** A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field.

- a lot** A parcel of land having fixed boundaries.
- a profusion** The property of being extremely abundant.
- an abundance** The ratio of the total mass of an element in the earth's crust to the total mass of the earth's crust; expressed as a percentage or in parts per million.
- plenty** (often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent.  
*It must have cost **plenty**.*

<b>quantities</b>	How much there is or how many there are of something that you can quantify. <i>He had a quantity of ammunition.</i>
<b>sea</b>	A roughly definable area of the sea. <i>A ban on dumping radioactive wastes in the <b>sea</b>.</i>
<b>the sea</b>	Turbulent water with swells of considerable size.

<b>algae</b>	Primitive chlorophyll-containing mainly aquatic eukaryotic organisms lacking true stems and roots and leaves.
<b>aquatic</b>	An aquatic plant or animal especially one suitable for a pond or aquarium. <i>The bay could support <b>aquatic</b> life.</i>
<b><u>archipelago</u></b>	A sea or stretch of water having many islands. <i>The Indonesian <b>archipelago</b>.</i>
<b>atoll</b>	A ring-shaped reef, island, or chain of islands formed of coral.
<b><u>beach</u></b>	Of an angler land a fish on a beach. <i>The ship <b>beached</b> near the port.</i>
<b><u>coast</u></b>	A slope down which sleds may coast. <i>Colchester <b>coasted</b> to victory.</i>
<b>coastal</b>	Of or relating to a coast. <i><b>Coastal</b> erosion.</i>

<b>coral</b>	Precious red coral used in jewellery. <i>A <b>coral</b> reef.</i>
<b>fisherman</b>	A person who catches fish for a living or for sport.
<b>foreshore</b>	The part of a shore between high- and low-water marks, or between the water and cultivated or developed land.
<b>island</b>	A traffic island. <i>The <b>island</b> of Crete.</i>
<b>isle</b>	A small island. <i>Crusoe s fabled <b>isle</b>.</i>
<b>islet</b>	A portion of tissue structurally distinct from surrounding tissues.
<b>kelp</b>	The calcined ashes of seaweed, used as a source of various salts. <i>A large bed of <b>kelp</b>.</i>
<b>lagoon</b>	An artificial pool for the treatment of effluent or to accommodate an overspill from surface drains during heavy rain.
<b>marine</b>	Relating to or characteristic of or occurring on or in the sea. <i><b>Marine</b> insurance.</i>
<b>maritime</b>	Relating to or involving ships or shipping or navigation or seamen. <i>A <b>maritime</b> museum.</i>
<b>nautical</b>	Of or concerning navigation, sailors, or the sea; maritime. <i><b>Nautical</b> charts.</i>
<b>offshore</b>	At sea some distance from the shore. <i><b>Offshore</b> oil reserves.</i>
<b>pool</b>	Something resembling a pool of liquid. <i>A car <b>pool</b>.</i>
<b>reef</b>	Reduce a sail by taking in a reef. <i><b>Reef</b> the sailboat s mast.</i>
<b>sailor</b>	A person whose job it is to work as a member of the crew of a commercial or naval ship or boat, especially one who is below the rank of officer. <i>Hawaii was an important stopping point for <b>sailors</b> to restock provisions.</i>
<b>sea</b>	Used to refer to waves as opposed to calm sea. <i>Heavy <b>seas</b>.</i>
<b>seabed</b>	The bottom of a sea or ocean.
<b>seashore</b>	The shore of a sea or ocean.
<b>seaweed</b>	Large algae growing in the sea or on rocks below the high-water mark. <i><b>Seaweed</b> glistened on the rocks.</i>
<b>shellfish</b>	Shellfish as food. <i>This species is harmful to marine <b>shellfish</b>.</i>

**underwater**

(of a loan) having a balance that exceeds the current market value of the loan.

**waterfront**
