- *Spare; unoccupied.*
- *Separated from a usual pair or set and therefore out of place or mismatched.*
- *An indefinite quantity more than that specified.*
- *Happening or occurring infrequently and irregularly; occasional.*
- *In the region of or somewhat more than a particular number or quantity.*
- *Denoting a single goal by which one side defeats another, especially where each side scores at least once.*

- *Of the remaining member of a pair.*
- *Different to what is usual or expected; strange.*
- *Not used up.*
- *(of whole numbers such as 3 and 5) having one left over as a remainder when divided by two.*
- *Not divisible by two.*
- *Of the remaining member of a pair, of socks e.g.*
- *Not easily explained.*

extraordinary	Very unusual or remarkable. <i>Enjoyed extraordinary popularity.</i>
foreign	Dealing with or relating to other countries. <i>Foreign trade.</i>
freakish	Changeable. <i>A freakish extra toe.</i>
free	Not taken up by scheduled activities. <i>Free oxygen.</i>
funny	Beyond or deviating from the usual or expected. <i>There was something funny going on.</i>
idiosyncratic	Relating to idiosyncrasy; peculiar or individual. <i>She emerged as one of the great idiosyncratic talents of the nineties.</i>

incidental	(sometimes followed by `to') minor or casual or subordinate in significance or nature or occurring as a chance concomitant or consequence. <i>Confusion incidental to a quick change.</i>
<u>incongruous</u>	Not in harmony or keeping with the surroundings or other aspects of something. <i>Incongruous behavior.</i>
<u>irregular</u>	(of a surface or shape); not level or flat or symmetrical. <i>Irregular hiring practices.</i>
isolated	Remote and separate physically or socially- W.H.Hudson. <i>Isolated incidents of student unrest.</i>
left	Intended for the left hand. <i>Left periodicals such as <i>Marxism Today</i>.</i>
left over	Being or located on or directed toward the side of the body to the west when facing north.
leftover	Remaining; surplus. <i>Yesterday's leftover bread.</i>
mismatched	Not fairly matched as opponents. <i>A pair of mismatched cops.</i>
mysterious	Of an obscure nature- Rachel. <i>She was mysterious about herself but said plenty about her husband.</i>
mystifying	Of an obscure nature. <i>A mystifying phenomenon.</i>
not committed	Bound or obligated, as under a pledge to a particular cause, action, or attitude.
not divisible by two	Capable of being or liable to be divided or separated.
occasional	Occurring, appearing, or done infrequently and irregularly. <i>An occasional table.</i>
offbeat	Unconventional; unusual. <i>The answer sums up his offbeat skewed vision of the world.</i>
out of the ordinary	Not worth considering as a possibility.
out of the way	Out of power; especially having been unsuccessful in an election.
outlandish	Foreign or alien. <i>Three wise outlandish kings.</i>
part-time	Involving less than the standard or customary time for an activity.

peculiar	Particular; special. <i>Stella thought the play peculiar.</i>
<u>periodic</u>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The periodic appearance of the seventeen year locust.</i>
perplexing	Completely baffling; very puzzling. <i>A perplexing problem.</i>
<u>puzzling</u>	Causing one to be puzzled; perplexing. <i>A puzzling statement.</i>
quaint	Attractively unusual or old-fashioned. <i>Quaint dialect words.</i>
<u>quirky</u>	Informal terms; strikingly unconventional. <i>Her sense of humour was decidedly quirky.</i>
random	(of masonry) with stones of irregular size and shape. <i>A random choice.</i>
<u>rare</u>	Recurring only at long intervals. <i>Rare books.</i>
<u>remaining</u>	Still existing, present, or in use; surviving. <i>Lilly was my last remaining close relative.</i>
remarkable	Worthy of notice. <i>A remarkable achievement.</i>
rummy	Beyond or deviating from the usual or expected.
seasonal	Fluctuating or restricted according to the season or time of year. <i>There are companies whose markets are seasonal.</i>
<u>singular</u>	Relating to or of the nature of singularity. <i>She always thought of herself as singular as his only daughter.</i>
<u>spare</u>	Additional to what is required for ordinary use. <i>A spare bearded figure.</i>
<u>sporadic</u>	Recurring in scattered and irregular or unpredictable instances. <i>Sporadic fighting broke out.</i>
strange	Slightly or undefinably unwell or ill at ease. <i>A strange exaltation that was indefinable.</i>
unaccountable	(of a person, organization, or institution) not required or expected to justify actions or decisions; not responsible for results or consequences. <i>A powerful and unaccountable institution.</i>
uncanny	Strange or mysterious, especially in an unsettling way. <i>Stumps had uncanny shapes as of monstrous creatures.</i>

uncommon	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind. <i>She was kind to an uncommon degree.</i>
unconventional	Not conventional or conformist. <i>Her unconventional dress and hair style.</i>

unmated	Not mated sexually.
unoccupied	Not seized and controlled. <i>Unoccupied France.</i>
unpaired	Not arranged in pairs. <i>Unpaired socks.</i>
untypical	Not representative of a group, class, or type. <i>He considers the film untypical of college movies.</i>
unusual	Not usual or common or ordinary. <i>Cruel and unusual punishment.</i>
<u>weird</u>	Very strange; bizarre. <i>The three weird sisters.</i>
zany	Ludicrous, foolish. <i>A zany sense of humor.</i>

<u>cryptic</u>	Having a puzzling terseness. <i>Cryptic plumage is thought to minimize predation.</i>
<u>eccentric</u>	A disc or wheel mounted eccentrically on a revolving shaft in order to transform rotation into backward and forward motion e g a cam in an internal combustion engine. <i>Eccentric circles.</i>
eerie	Suggestive of the supernatural; mysterious. <i>An eerie feeling of <i>deja vu</i>.</i>
exception	Grounds for adverse criticism. <i>He always plays top tunes and tonight was no exception.</i>
foible	The part of a sword blade from the middle to the point. <i>They have to tolerate each other's little foibles.</i>

oddity	A strange attitude or habit. <i>Realizing the oddity of the remark he retracted it.</i>
outlandish	Looking or sounding bizarre or unfamiliar. <i>Outlandish brightly coloured clothes.</i>
peculiar	Characteristic of one only; distinctive or special. <i>A peculiar hobby of stuffing and mounting bats.</i>
peerless	Unequaled; unrivalled. <i>A peerless cartoonist.</i>
quaint	Very strange or unusual; odd or even incongruous in character or appearance. <i>A quaint old custom.</i>

quirk	A peculiar aspect of a person's character or behaviour. <i>Wry humour put a slight quirk in his mouth.</i>
sibylline	Having a secret or hidden meaning. <i>Thoroughly sibylline in most of his pronouncements.</i>
specialization	(biology) the structural adaptation of some body part for a particular function. <i>The division and specialization of labour.</i>
strange	Not previously visited, seen, or encountered; unfamiliar or alien. <i>A harsh accent that was strange to his ears.</i>
surreal	Having the qualities of surrealism bizarre. <i>The incongruous imagery in surreal art and literature.</i>
unaccountable	(of a person, organization, or institution) not required or expected to justify actions or decisions; not responsible for results or consequences. <i>There are enormous risks in leaving such agencies uncontrolled and unaccountable.</i>
uncanny	Suggesting the operation of supernatural influences. <i>Stumps had uncanny shapes as of monstrous creatures.</i>
uncommon	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind J R Lowell. <i>An uncommon liking for money.</i>
unearthly	Unreasonably early or inconvenient. <i>A job which involves getting up at an unearthly hour.</i>
unexampled	Having no previous example or precedent or parallel. <i>A time of unexampled prosperity.</i>
unnatural	Contrary to the ordinary course of nature; abnormal. <i>An unnatural death.</i>
unprecedented	Having no precedent; novel. <i>The government took the unprecedented step of releasing confidential correspondence.</i>
unusual	Remarkable or interesting because different from or better than others. <i>A man of unusual ability.</i>
weird	Strikingly odd or unusual. <i>Weird inhuman sounds.</i>
