- *Spare; unoccupied.*
- *Separated from a usual pair or set and therefore out of place or mismatched.*
- *An indefinite quantity more than that specified.*
- *Happening or occurring infrequently and irregularly; occasional.*
- *In the region of or somewhat more than a particular number or quantity.*
- *Denoting a single goal by which one side defeats another, especially where each side scores at least once.*

- *Of the remaining member of a pair.*
- *Different to what is usual or expected; strange.*
- *Not used up.*
- *(of whole numbers such as 3 and 5) having one left over as a remainder when divided by two.*
- *Not divisible by two.*
- *Of the remaining member of a pair, of socks e.g.*
- *Not easily explained.*

<b>different</b>	Distinctly separate from the first. <i>The car is <b>different</b> from anything else on the market.</i>
<b>eccentric</b>	(of an orbit) not circular. <i>He noted her <b>eccentric</b> appearance.</i>
<b>exceptional</b>	Surpassing what is common or usual or expected. <i>A child of <b>exceptional</b> ability.</i>
<b>extraordinary</b>	Very unusual or remarkable. <i>Enjoyed <b>extraordinary</b> popularity.</i>
<b>foreign</b>	Dealing with or relating to other countries. <i><b>Foreign</b> trade.</i>
<b>freakish</b>	Changeable. <i>A <b>freakish</b> extra toe.</i>
<b>free</b>	Not taken up by scheduled activities. <i><b>Free</b> oxygen.</i>
<b>funny</b>	Beyond or deviating from the usual or expected. <i>There was something <b>funny</b> going on.</i>
<b>idiosyncratic</b>	Relating to idiosyncrasy; peculiar or individual. <i>She emerged as one of the great <b>idiosyncratic</b> talents of the nineties.</i>

<b>incidental</b>	(sometimes followed by `to') minor or casual or subordinate in significance or nature or occurring as a chance concomitant or consequence. <i>Confusion <b>incidental</b> to a quick change.</i>
<b>incongruous</b>	Not in harmony or keeping with the surroundings or other aspects of something. <i><b>Incongruous</b> behavior.</i>
<b>irregular</b>	(of a surface or shape); not level or flat or symmetrical. <i><b>Irregular</b> hiring practices.</i>
<b>isolated</b>	Remote and separate physically or socially- W.H.Hudson. <i><b>Isolated</b> incidents of student unrest.</i>
<b>left</b>	Intended for the left hand. <i><b>Left</b> periodicals such as <i>Marxism Today</i>.</i>
<b>left over</b>	Being or located on or directed toward the side of the body to the west when facing north.
<b>leftover</b>	Remaining; surplus. <i>Yesterday's <b>leftover</b> bread.</i>
<b>mismatched</b>	Not fairly matched as opponents. <i>A pair of <b>mismatched</b> cops.</i>
<b>mysterious</b>	Of an obscure nature- Rachel. <i>She was <b>mysterious</b> about herself but said plenty about her husband.</i>
<b>mystifying</b>	Of an obscure nature. <i>A <b>mystifying</b> phenomenon.</i>
<b>not committed</b>	Bound or obligated, as under a pledge to a particular cause, action, or attitude.
<b>not divisible by two</b>	Capable of being or liable to be divided or separated.
<b>occasional</b>	Occurring, appearing, or done infrequently and irregularly. <i>An <b>occasional</b> table.</i>
<b>offbeat</b>	Unconventional; unusual. <i>The answer sums up his <b>offbeat</b> skewed vision of the world.</i>
<b>out of the ordinary</b>	Not worth considering as a possibility.
<b>out of the way</b>	Out of power; especially having been unsuccessful in an election.
<b>outlandish</b>	Foreign or alien. <i>Three wise <b>outlandish</b> kings.</i>
<b>part-time</b>	Involving less than the standard or customary time for an activity.

<b>peculiar</b>	Particular; special. <i>Stella thought the play <b>peculiar</b>.</i>
<b><u>periodic</u></b>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The <b>periodic</b> appearance of the seventeen year locust.</i>
<b>perplexing</b>	Completely baffling; very puzzling. <i>A <b>perplexing</b> problem.</i>
<b><u>puzzling</u></b>	Causing one to be puzzled; perplexing. <i>A <b>puzzling</b> statement.</i>
<b>quaint</b>	Attractively unusual or old-fashioned. <i><b>Quaint</b> dialect words.</i>
<b><u>quirky</u></b>	Informal terms; strikingly unconventional. <i>Her sense of humour was decidedly <b>quirky</b>.</i>
<b>random</b>	(of masonry) with stones of irregular size and shape. <i>A <b>random</b> choice.</i>
<b><u>rare</u></b>	Recurring only at long intervals. <i><b>Rare</b> books.</i>
<b><u>remaining</u></b>	Still existing, present, or in use; surviving. <i>Lilly was my last <b>remaining</b> close relative.</i>
<b>remarkable</b>	Worthy of notice. <i>A <b>remarkable</b> achievement.</i>
<b>rummy</b>	Beyond or deviating from the usual or expected.

<b>unconventional</b>	Not conventional or conformist. <i>Her <b>unconventional</b> dress and hair style.</i>
<b><u>uneven</u></b>	Not divisible by two. <i>The floors are cracked and <b>uneven</b>.</i>
<b><u>unexpected</u></b>	Not expected or anticipated. <i><b>Unexpected</b> news.</i>
<b>unexpended</b>	Not spent. <i><b>Unexpended</b> funds.</i>
<b><u>unfamiliar</u></b>	Not having knowledge or experience of. <i>His voice was <b>unfamiliar</b> to her.</i>
<b><u>unmatched</u></b>	Eminent beyond or above comparison. <i>He has a talent <b>unmatched</b> by any other politician.</i>
<b>unmated</b>	Not mated sexually.
<b>unoccupied</b>	Not seized and controlled. <i><b>Unoccupied</b> France.</i>
<b>unpaired</b>	Not arranged in pairs. <i><b>Unpaired</b> socks.</i>
<b>untypical</b>	Not representative of a group, class, or type. <i>He considers the film <b>untypical</b> of college movies.</i>
<b>unusual</b>	Not usual or common or ordinary. <i>Cruel and <b>unusual</b> punishment.</i>
<b><u>weird</u></b>	Very strange; bizarre. <i>The three <b>weird</b> sisters.</i>
<b>zany</b>	Ludicrous, foolish. <i>A <b>zany</b> sense of humor.</i>

<b>bizarre</b>	Very strange or unusual. <i>A <b>bizarre</b> situation.</i>
<b><u>cryptic</u></b>	Having a puzzling terseness. <i><b>Cryptic</b> plumage is thought to minimize predation.</i>
<b><u>eccentric</u></b>	A disc or wheel mounted eccentrically on a revolving shaft in order to transform rotation into backward and forward motion e g a cam in an internal combustion engine. <i><b>Eccentric</b> circles.</i>
<b>eerie</b>	Suggestive of the supernatural; mysterious. <i>An <b>eerie</b> feeling of <i>deja vu</i>.</i>
<b>exception</b>	Grounds for adverse criticism. <i>He always plays top tunes and tonight was no <b>exception</b>.</i>
<b>foible</b>	The part of a sword blade from the middle to the point. <i>They have to tolerate each other's little <b>foibles</b>.</i>
<b><u>grotesque</u></b>	Art characterized by an incongruous mixture of parts of humans and animals interwoven with plants. <i>A figure wearing a <b>grotesque</b> mask.</i>
<b>inscrutable</b>	Of an obscure nature. <i>The <b>inscrutable</b> workings of Providence.</i>
<b>matchless</b>	Eminent beyond or above comparison. <i>The Parthenon has a <b>matchless</b> beauty.</i>
<b>mysterious</b>	Having an import not apparent to the senses nor obvious to the intelligence; beyond ordinary understanding. <i>His colleague had vanished in <b>mysterious</b> circumstances.</i>
<b>oddity</b>	A strange attitude or habit. <i>Realizing the <b>oddity</b> of the remark he retracted it.</i>
<b>outlandish</b>	Looking or sounding bizarre or unfamiliar. <i><b>Outlandish</b> brightly coloured clothes.</i>
<b>peculiar</b>	Characteristic of one only; distinctive or special. <i>A <b>peculiar</b> hobby of stuffing and mounting bats.</i>
<b>peerless</b>	Unequaled; unrivalled. <i>A <b>peerless</b> cartoonist.</i>
<b>quaint</b>	Very strange or unusual; odd or even incongruous in character or appearance. <i>A <b>quaint</b> old custom.</i>

<b>quirk</b>	A peculiar aspect of a person's character or behaviour. <i>Wry humour put a slight <b>quirk</b> in his mouth.</i>
<b>sibylline</b>	Having a secret or hidden meaning. <i>Thoroughly <b>sibylline</b> in most of his pronouncements.</i>
<b>specialization</b>	(biology) the structural adaptation of some body part for a particular function. <i>The division and <b>specialization</b> of labour.</i>
<b>strange</b>	Not previously visited, seen, or encountered; unfamiliar or alien. <i>A harsh accent that was <b>strange</b> to his ears.</i>
<b>surreal</b>	Having the qualities of surrealism bizarre. <i>The incongruous imagery in <b>surreal</b> art and literature.</i>
<b>unaccountable</b>	(of a person, organization, or institution) not required or expected to justify actions or decisions; not responsible for results or consequences. <i>There are enormous risks in leaving such agencies uncontrolled and <b>unaccountable</b>.</i>
<b>uncanny</b>	Suggesting the operation of supernatural influences. <i>Stumps had <b>uncanny</b> shapes as of monstrous creatures.</i>
<b>uncommon</b>	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind J R Lowell. <i>An <b>uncommon</b> liking for money.</i>
<b>unearthly</b>	Unreasonably early or inconvenient. <i>A job which involves getting up at an <b>unearthly</b> hour.</i>
<b>unexampled</b>	Having no previous example or precedent or parallel. <i>A time of <b>unexampled</b> prosperity.</i>
<b>unnatural</b>	Contrary to the ordinary course of nature; abnormal. <i>An <b>unnatural</b> death.</i>
<b>unprecedented</b>	Having no precedent; novel. <i>The government took the <b>unprecedented</b> step of releasing confidential correspondence.</i>
<b>unusual</b>	Remarkable or interesting because different from or better than others. <i>A man of <b>unusual</b> ability.</i>
<b>weird</b>	Strikingly odd or unusual. <i><b>Weird</b> inhuman sounds.</i>
