- *A long and eventful or adventurous journey or experience.*

*The Albigensian **crusades**.*
- journey** The act of traveling from one place to another.  
*An eight hour train **journey**.*
- journeying** The act of traveling from one place to another.
- pilgrimage** A pilgrim's journey.  
*His passion was opera and he made annual **pilgrimages** to Bayreuth.*
- quest** The act of searching for something.  
*A **quest** for wealth.*
- travels** Self-propelled movement.  
*He enjoyed selling but he hated the travel.*

**trek**

A haul of fish caught using a trek net.

*I was at the new flat waiting for my **trek** to arrive.*

**voyage**

An act of traveling by water.

*Writing a biography is a **voyage** of discovery.*

**wandering**

Travelling about without any clear destination.

*She followed him in his **wanderings** and looked after him.*

## Associations of "Odyssey" (30 Words)

<b>adventure</b>	Engage in daring or risky activity. <i>He <b>adventured</b> 300 in the purchase of land.</i>
<b>airline</b>	A pipe supplying air. <i><b>Airline</b> pilot.</i>
<b>arabia</b>	A peninsula between the Red Sea and the Persian Gulf; strategically important for its oil resources.
<b>circumnavigate</b>	Avoid dealing with (something difficult or unpleasant). <i>He helped her to <b>circumnavigate</b> a frozen puddle.</i>
<b>cruise</b>	A voyage on a ship or boat taken for pleasure or as a holiday and usually calling in at several places. <i>He <b>cruised</b> the gay bars of Los Angeles.</i>
<b>embark</b>	Proceed somewhere despite the risk of possible dangers. <i>He <b>embarked</b> for India in 1817.</i>
<b><u>expedition</u></b>	The people involved in an expedition. <i>The landlord shall remedy the defects with all possible <b>expedition</b>.</i>

<b>exploration</b>	To travel for the purpose of discovery. <i>An <b>exploration</b> of the African interior.</i>
<b>guided</b>	Conducted by a guide. <i>A <b>guided</b> missile.</i>
<b>international</b>	Any of several international socialist organizations. <i>An <b>international</b> agreement.</i>
<b>itinerary</b>	A guidebook for travelers. <i>We will send you an <b>itinerary</b>.</i>
<b>itinerate</b>	Travel from place to place, as for work. <i>Regular use of itinerating magistrates was made.</i>
<b>jaunt</b>	A short excursion or journey made for pleasure. <i>They went <b>jaunting</b> through Ireland.</i>
<b>journey</b>	Undertake a journey or trip. <i>They <b>journeyed</b> south.</i>
<b>mapping</b>	(mathematics) a mathematical relation such that each element of a given set (the domain of the function) is associated with an element of another set (the range of the function).
<b>navigation</b>	The passage of ships. <i>The channel will be open to <b>navigation</b> as soon as the ice melts.</i>
<b>outing</b>	A brief journey from home. <i>A family <b>outing</b> to Weston super Mare.</i>
<b>overland</b>	Travelling or done by land. <i>An <b>overland</b> trade route.</i>
<b>peregrination</b>	Traveling or wandering around. <i>She kept Aunt Ilsa company on her <b>peregrinations</b>.</i>
<b>portmanteau</b>	Consisting of or combining two or more aspects or qualities. <i>Podcast is a <b>portmanteau</b> a made up word coined from a combination of the words iPod and broadcast.</i>
<b>tour</b>	Make a tour of a certain place. <i>We <b>toured</b> the Provence this summer.</i>
<b>tourism</b>	The commercial organization and operation of holidays and visits to places of interest. <i>A national fund for the promotion of <b>tourism</b>.</i>
<b>travel</b>	Travel upon or across. <i>He <b>travelled</b> the world with the army.</i>
<b>traveler</b>	A person who changes location.
<b>traveling</b>	The act of going from one place to another.

Any venturesome undertaking especially one with an uncertain outcome.
