abolish	Do away with. <i>The tax was abolished in 1977.</i>
abrogate	Revoke formally. <i>A proposal to abrogate temporarily the right to strike.</i>
abrogation	The repeal or abolition of a law, right, or agreement.
annul	Declare invalid. <i>Her first marriage was finally annulled by His Holiness.</i>
cancel	A notation cancelling a previous sharp or flat. <i>A stamp franked and with an adhesive cancel.</i>
delete	Cut or eliminate. <i>You can use delete to remove a number of lines from your program.</i>
devoid	Entirely lacking or free from. <i>The sentence was devoid of meaning.</i>
embedded	(of an object) fixed firmly and deeply in a surrounding mass; implanted. <i>The embedded sentence has no overt introducer.</i>
exterminate	Kill (a pest). <i>Hitler wanted to exterminate the Jews Gypsies Communists and homosexuals of Europe.</i>
invalidate	Take away the legal force of or render ineffective. <i>Invalidate a contract.</i>
locate	Take up residence and become established. <i>Engineers were working to locate the fault.</i>
naught	Complete failure. <i>It was all for naught.</i>
nil	Non-existent. <i>Reduced to nil all the work we had done.</i>

no	A radioactive transuranic element synthesized by bombarding curium with carbon ions 7 isotopes are known. <i>Have you no decency.</i>
none	By no amount; not at all. <i>It is made none the easier by the differences in approach.</i>
nothing	Having no prospect of progress; of no value. <i>He looks nothing like the others.</i>
nowhere	An insignificant place. <i>A nowhere job.</i>
null	Combine a signal with another in order to create a null cancel out. <i>Null and void.</i>
nullify	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of. <i>Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.</i>
override	Prevail over. <i>This commitment should override all other considerations.</i>
recantation	A disavowal or taking back of a previous assertion. <i>Every writer interprets Galileo's recantation in a different way.</i>
reject	The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality. <i>His body could begin to reject the implanted heart.</i>
remove	Remove something concrete as by lifting pushing or taking off or remove something abstract. <i>An explanation that is far removed from the truth.</i>
repeal	The act of abrogating; an official or legal cancellation. <i>The House voted in favour of repeal.</i>
rescind	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually rescinded the directive.</i>
retraction	The act of pulling or holding or drawing a part back. <i>Prey are grasped between the jaws upon tongue retraction.</i>
revoke	Officially cancel (a decree, decision, or promise). <i>He revoked the ban on smoking.</i>
transience	The state or fact of lasting only for a short time; transitoriness. <i>The transience of life and happiness.</i>
withdrawal	The act of taking out money or other capital. <i>The withdrawal of French troops from Vietnam.</i>
zero	Adjust as by firing under test conditions the zero of a gun. <i>The goal is zero population growth.</i>
