- Something that has been omitted.

**absence** The state of being absent. The letter had arrived during his **absence**.



<u>blank</u>	A blank character used to separate successive words in writing or printing. My mind was a total <b>blank</b> .
cut	The way or style in which something especially a garment or someone s hair is cut. His <b>cut</b> in the lining revealed the hidden jewels.
<u>default</u>	Act of failing to meet a financial obligation. The <b>default</b> is fifty lines.
deletion	Any process whereby sounds or words are left out of spoken words or phrases. An editor s <b>deletion</b> s frequently upset young authors.
dereliction	The shameful failure to fulfil one's obligations. The prosecution team were guilty of <b>dereliction</b> of duty for failing to disclose evidence.
<u>disregard</u>	Willful lack of care and attention. Blatant <b>disregard</b> for the law.
elimination	The murder of a competitor. A global commitment to the <b>elimination</b> of nuclear weapons.
erasure	Deletion by an act of expunging or erasing. The <b>erasure</b> of prior history.
exception	An instance that does not conform to a rule or generalization. All her children were brilliant the only <b>exception</b> was her last child.
excision	Surgical removal of a body part or tissue. The <b>excision</b> of the carcinoma.
<u>exclusion</u>	A deliberate act of omission. <i>Exclusions</i> can be added to your policy.
failure	The action or state of not functioning. Their <b>failure</b> to comply with the basic rules.
forgetfulness	Tendency to forget. His <b>forgetfulness</b> increased as he grew older.
gap	A pass between mountain peaks. The media were bridging the <b>gap</b> between government and people.
<u>hiatus</u>	A break between two vowels coming together but not in the same syllable, as in the ear and cooperate. There was a brief <b>hiatus</b> in the war with France.
lacuna	An ornamental sunken panel in a ceiling or dome. The journal has filled a <b>lacuna</b> in Middle Eastern studies.



lapse	A brief or temporary failure of concentration, memory, or judgement. There was a considerable <b>lapse</b> of time between the two events.
leaving out	The act of departing.
<u>neglect</u>	The state of something that has been unused and neglected. The house was in a terrible state of <b>neglect</b> .
neglectfulness	The trait of neglecting responsibilities and lacking concern.
<u>negligence</u>	Failure to take proper care over something. His injury was due to the <b>negligence</b> of his employers.
oversight	Management by overseeing the performance or operation of a person or group. Effective <b>oversight</b> of the financial reporting process.
<u>skip</u>	A light bouncing step a skipping movement. <i>He moved with a strange dancing <b>skip</b>.</i>

# Associations of "Omission" (30 Words)

<u>ambiguity</u>	The quality of being open to more than one interpretation; inexactness. We can detect no <b>ambiguity</b> in this section of the Act.
<u>anachronism</u>	A thing belonging or appropriate to a period other than that in which it exists, especially a thing that is conspicuously old-fashioned. The town is a throwback to medieval times an <b>anachronism</b> that has survived the passing years.
antinomy	A contradiction between two statements that seem equally reasonable. There are not many short novels capable of accommodating bewildering antinomies.
blunder	Make a stupid or careless mistake; act or speak clumsily. We were <b>blunder</b> ing around in the darkness.
conflicting	In disagreement. There are <b>conflicting</b> accounts of what occurred.
<u>contradiction</u>	Opposition between two conflicting forces or ideas. The proposed new system suffers from a set of internal <b>contradiction</b> s.



<u>contradictory</u>	A contradictory proposition. Perfect and imperfect are <b>contradictory</b> terms.
dissonant	Unsuitable or unusual in combination; clashing. Jackson employs both harmonious and <b>dissonant</b> colour choices.
err	Wander from a direct course or at random. The judge had <b>err</b> ed in ruling that the evidence was inadmissible.
<u>error</u>	A failure of a defensive player to make an out when normal play would have sufficed. <i>Goods dispatched to your branch in error</i> .
<u>flawed</u>	Having or characterized by a fundamental weakness or imperfection. A <i>flawed</i> diamond.
inadvertence	The trait of forgetting or ignoring your responsibilities.
incompatibility	The relation between propositions that cannot both be true at the same time. Our different backgrounds had something to do with our <b>incompatibility</b> .
incongruity	The state of being incongruous; incompatibility. The <b>incongruity</b> of his fleshy face and skinny body disturbed her.
<u>inconsistency</u>	The fact or state of being inconsistent. The <b>inconsistency</b> between his expressed attitudes and his actual behaviour.
<u>incorrect</u>	Not in accord with established usage or procedure. <i>The doctor gave you <b>incorrect</b> advice.</i>
<u>irony</u>	A state of affairs or an event that seems deliberately contrary to what one expects and is often wryly amusing as a result. <i>Irony is wasted on the stupid.</i>
lapse	A failure to maintain a higher state. Tracing his <b>lapse</b> into petty crime.
misconceive	Judge or plan badly, typically on the basis of faulty understanding. <i>Criticism of the trade surplus in Washington is misconceived</i> .
misconception	An incorrect conception. Public <b>misconception</b> s about antibiotic use.
<u>misleading</u>	Designed to deceive or mislead either deliberately or inadvertently. Your article contains a number of <b>misleading</b> statements.
<u>miss</u>	Fail to catch (something thrown or dropped. <i>How many periods have you <b>miss</b>ed.</i>



misunderstand	Interpret in the wrong way. Don t <b>misunderstand</b> me I m not implying she should be working.
oversight	Management by overseeing the performance or operation of a person or group. Effective <b>oversight</b> of the financial reporting process.
<u>oxymoron</u>	A figure of speech in which apparently contradictory terms appear in conjunction (e.g. faith unfaithful kept him falsely true).
<u>paradox</u>	A seemingly absurd or contradictory statement or proposition which when investigated may prove to be well founded or true. <i>Parmenides was the original advocate of the philosophical power of</i> <i>paradox.</i>
repulsion	Intense aversion. <i>People talk about the case with a mixture of fascination and <b>repulsion</b>.</i>
slip	A fielder at slip. He <b>slip</b> ped me the key when nobody was looking.
solecism	A socially awkward or tactless act.
unsuited	Not right or appropriate. He was totally <b>unsuited</b> for the job.
