- *Leave out or exclude (someone or something), either intentionally or forgetfully.*
- *Prevent from being included or considered or accepted.*
- *Leave undone or leave out.*

| <b>fail</b>            | Fail to do something leave something undone.<br><i>We must not <b>fail</b> his obligation to the victims of the Holocaust.</i>                                      |
| <b>fail to include</b> | Be unsuccessful.  |
| <b>fail to mention</b> | Be unable.  |
| <b><u>forget</u></b>   | Forget to do something.<br><i>Don t <b>forget</b> to call the chairman of the board to the meeting.</i>   |
| <b>leave off</b>       | Act or be so as to become in a specified state.   |
| <b>leave out</b>       | Transmit (knowledge or skills).   |
| <b><u>miss</u></b>     | Fail to hit, reach, or come into contact with (something aimed at).<br><i>Don t <b>miss</b> the chance to visit the breathtaking Dolomites.</i>                     |
| <b>miss out</b>        | Fail to experience.   |
| <b><u>neglect</u></b>  | Not pay proper attention to; disregard.<br><i>He <b>neglects</b> his children.</i>  |
| <b>overleap</b>        | Defeat (oneself) by going too far.<br><i>A stream that any five years child might <b>overleap</b>.</i>  |
| <b><u>overlook</u></b> | Look down on.<br><i>The chateau <b>overlooks</b> fields of corn and olive trees.</i>  |
| <b>pass over</b>       | Pass over across or through.  |
| <b>pretermitt</b>      | Leave undone or leave out.<br><i>The pleasant musical evenings were now entirely <b>pretermitted</b>.</i>   |
