Omit as a Verb

Definitions of "Omit" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “omit” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Fail or neglect to do.*
- *Leave out or exclude (someone or something), either intentionally or forgetfully.*
- *Prevent from being included or considered or accepted.*
- *Leave undone or leave out.*

Synonyms of "Omit" as a verb (28 Words)

cross out	Fold so as to resemble a cross.
cut	Cut off the testicles of male animals such as horses. <i>Cook cut the ball back to him.</i>
delete	Wipe out digitally or magnetically recorded information. <i>If one important gene is deleted from an animal s DNA other genes can stand in.</i>
dispense with	Administer or bestow, as in small portions.

drop	Score a goal by a drop kick. <i>He dropped a lot of acid in the Sixties.</i>
<u>elide</u>	Leave or strike out. <i>This vowel is usually elided before a single consonant.</i>
eliminate	Eliminate from the body. <i>A policy that would eliminate inflation.</i>
<u>erase</u>	Remove all traces of; destroy or obliterate. <i>The Turks erased the Armenians in 1915.</i>
except	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are excepted from control.</i>
exclude	Put out or expel from a place. <i>This policy excludes people who have a criminal record from entering the country.</i>
<u>expunge</u>	Obliterate or remove completely (something unwanted or unpleasant). <i>The kind of man that could expunge an unsatisfactory incident from his memory.</i>
fail	Fail to do something leave something undone. <i>We must not fail his obligation to the victims of the Holocaust.</i>
fail to include	Be unsuccessful.
fail to mention	Be unable.
<u>forget</u>	Forget to do something. <i>Don t forget to call the chairman of the board to the meeting.</i>
leave off	Act or be so as to become in a specified state.
leave out	Transmit (knowledge or skills).
<u>miss</u>	Fail to hit, reach, or come into contact with (something aimed at). <i>Don t miss the chance to visit the breathtaking Dolomites.</i>
miss out	Fail to experience.
<u>neglect</u>	Not pay proper attention to; disregard. <i>He neglects his children.</i>
overleap	Defeat (oneself) by going too far. <i>A stream that any five years child might overleap.</i>
<u>overlook</u>	Look down on. <i>The chateau overlooks fields of corn and olive trees.</i>
pass over	Pass over across or through.
pretermitt	Leave undone or leave out. <i>The pleasant musical evenings were now entirely pretermitted.</i>

rub out	Scrape or rub as if to relieve itching.
shut out	Prevent from entering shut out.
strike out	Smooth with a strickle.
take out	Take something or somebody with oneself somewhere.

Usage Examples of "Omit" as a verb

- *He was omitted from the second Test.*
- *He modestly omits to mention that he was a pole-vault champion.*

additionally	Used to introduce a new fact or argument. <i>Brokers finance themselves additionally by short term borrowing.</i>
barring	The act of excluding someone by a negative vote or veto.
besides	Making an additional point; anyway. <i>I m capable of doing the work and a lot more besides.</i>
condone	Excuse, overlook, or make allowances for; be lenient with. <i>She condoned her husband s occasional infidelities.</i>
decriminalize	Stop treating (something) as illegal or as a criminal offence. <i>A battle to decriminalize cannabis.</i>
devoid	Entirely lacking or free from. <i>Lisa kept her voice devoid of emotion.</i>
elimination	Analysis of a problem into alternative possibilities followed by the systematic rejection of unacceptable alternatives. <i>After the initial elimination rounds 16 boys qualified for the final.</i>
except	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are excepted from control.</i>
exclude	Deny (someone) access to a place, group, or privilege. <i>The unruly student was excluded from the game.</i>
exclusion	An item or eventuality specifically not covered by an insurance policy or other contract. <i>Exclusions can be added to your policy.</i>
exemption	The action of freeing or state of being free from an obligation or liability imposed on others. <i>Additional exemptions are allowed for each dependent.</i>

extra	Excessive or extravagant. <i>She matched her outfit to her car because she s extra.</i>
forgive	Stop blaming or grant forgiveness. <i>He had never found it easy to forgive and forget.</i>
instead	On the contrary. <i>Used English terms instead of Latin ones.</i>
introspect	Reflect on one's own thoughts and feelings. <i>What they don t do is introspect much about the reasons for their plight.</i>
irrelevant	Not connected with or relevant to something. <i>Theory can sometimes be hastily dismissed as irrelevant to the classroom.</i>
leave	Leave unchanged or undisturbed or refrain from taking. <i>She was granted leave to speak.</i>
lose	Miss from one s possessions lose sight of. <i>The painting loses something in this light.</i>
mislay	Place (something) where one cannot find it again. <i>I seem to have mislaid my car keys.</i>
misplace	Place or position wrongly; put in the wrong position. <i>Crewe came back into the game when Strachan misplaced a pass in the midfield.</i>
miss	Fail to experience. <i>The motor began missing and investigation found a cracked cylinder head.</i>
neglect	The trait of neglecting responsibilities and lacking concern. <i>He neglected to write to her.</i>
obviate	Avoid or prevent (something undesirable). <i>The presence of roller blinds obviated the need for curtains.</i>
other	Not the same one or ones already mentioned or implied- the White Queen. <i>Any other person would tell the truth.</i>
otherwise	In other respects or ways. <i>An otherwise totally black cat with a single white whisker.</i>
out	Of the ball in tennis and similar games outside the designated playing area. <i>The tide was going out.</i>
overlook	A commanding position or view. <i>The overlook to the townsite.</i>
redefine	Give a new or different definition to. <i>The role of the Emperor was redefined.</i>
unabridged	(used of texts) not shortened. <i>An unabridged edition.</i>
